Coast Guardsmen Report Monoplane Plunges in Ocean

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31. (AP)—The identity of a large monoplane reported by coast guardsmen as having burst into flames and plunged into the ocean near Point Reyes, 30 miles north of here, remained a mystery today.

Coast guardsmen reported the craft appeared shortly after 9 o'clock last night, heading toward San Francisco and flying only 200 feet above the water. A forty-mile northwest wind was blowing. Reaching "Boatlegger's Cove" the plane seemingly caught fire and plunged, guardsmen said.

A preliminary check of Pacific coast airports failed to disclose any plane missing. A life saving crew put out from Point Reyes to search for the wreckage.
