

SCHAUPP GIVES OUT STATEMENT

Committee Vote For Upton, Switched To Metschan

Dissatisfaction with the action of the "perfect 36" committee, which met in Portland last Friday and Saturday, has been widespread in Klamath Falls, and republicans have been freely stating that they look for an independent candidate to enter the race and that they will not support Metschan.

Probably the greatest amount of dissatisfaction heard comes from those who were in favor of the principles of the platform as outlined by the late George Joseph, party's primary nominee, and from those who wish a candidate to enter the race with those principles as his platform, although hundreds of others say they do not approve of Metschan.

Letter Received
Yesterday the following open letter was received from Arthur Schaupp, Klamath state republican central committeeman, in which he states that he voted for Metschan only after he had received the 20 ballots necessary to nominate him and to second the nomination.

Mr. Schaupp stated to me Monday, in the office of the clerk of the circuit court in front of a group of persons, during a recess in the trial of Winfield H. Cahill:

For Open Ballot
"I was one of the first to speak in favor of an open ballot. I am not afraid to let people know how I voted."

Replying to a query as to how he did vote, he said, "I nominated Upton and stayed with him. That was all I could do until we could see what we could do."

Did you stay with him until the last ballot? I asked.

"Until nearly the last," Schaupp stated.

Letter Is Printed
Following the conversation jokes were passed as to whether or not committeemen had receipts for their hotel bills and other jokes were made.

In the following letter Mr. Schaupp indicates that he did not cast his vote for Metschan until he was nominated, and then only to second the nomination. To make Mr. Schaupp's action perfectly clear, the letter follows:

Klamath Falls, Ore.,
July 26, 1930.
To the Editors of The Klamath News and The Evening Herald, Klamath Falls, Ore.
Gentlemen:

The issues of your papers, dated July 25, carried a statement entitled "Metschan Gets Schaupp's Vote." The substance of the article was as follows: "Schaupp nominated Jay H. Upton, Bend, state senator from this district, for the governorship. He stated that he voted for Upton until toward the last when he switched his vote to Metschan."

I do not remember ever having made a statement to that effect and especially to anyone representing your paper. I did state to a great many of my friends that, after Metschan had been nominated, I seconded the motion to make the nomination unanimous.

The records will show that I nominated Senator Jay H. Upton, an eastern Oregon man, for governor, and I had seen no reason for changing my vote up to the time of the nomination. However, after Metschan had been nominated and was the choice of a majority of the committee, he was then and is now my choice.

I was the first committeeman to protest against a written ballot, as opposed to an open vote, and, as stated in your article, I voted for an open ballot. It was

Powder Explosion Seriously Burns Ten Ohio Miners

TILTONVILLE, Ohio, Aug. 1. (AP)—An explosion of powder in the Red Bird mine here today seriously burned ten men, and the fate of several other miners was undetermined.

Eighteen men were believed to have gone into the workings to get tools they left there following a fall of stone Wednesday. The mine had not been operated since the stone fell.

The injured men were badly burned and at the Martins Ferry hospital the hospital superintendent said at least two would die.

The powder was contained in a keg one of the men was carrying from the mine. A spark from an electric wire was believed to have ignited it.

Ambulances were rushed to the mine from Martins Ferry and other points. Tiltonville is six miles north of Wheeling, W. Va.

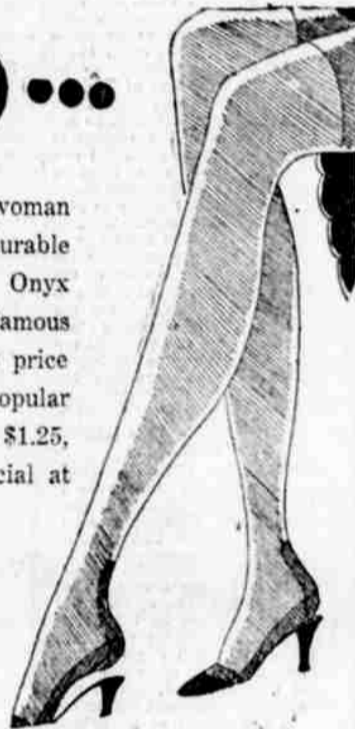

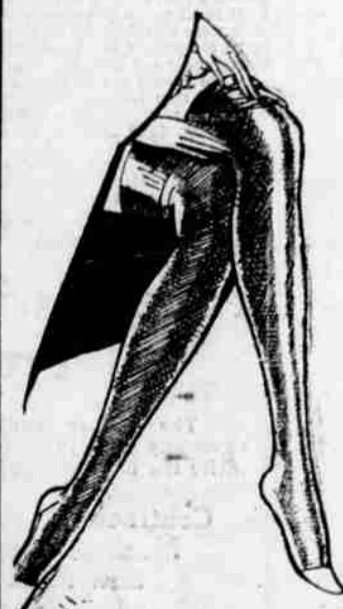
