

FIRE DESTROYS ENTIRE BLOCK IN VANCOUVER

Washington City Visited By Disastrous Blaze At Early Hour

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 1. (AP)—Fire, accompanied by a series of explosions, completely wiped out business block of Vancouver, Washington, early today.

Starting, it is believed, in a restaurant at 104 1/2 Third street, flames spread to an adjoining garage and within a few minutes had enveloped several buildings, most of which were wooden frame blocks.

Taxi Drivers Heard Blast

Taxi drivers employed by Bud Smith reported that an explosion at about 2 o'clock in the vicinity of the Mayflower restaurant, gave them the first inkling of the fire. By the time they had called for help it had spread to the taxi office and garage. Considerable gasoline stored in the garage is believed to have been responsible for subsequent explosions.

By 2:30 o'clock the blaze was reported out of control and Chief George Wiegall telephoned to Portland for help. Two engine companies, Number 14 and Number 8, under the supervision of Battalion Chief Willis Smith answered the call. Solers from Vancouver barracks were also called out with the post fire department.

Lights Of City Out

All electric lights of the city were out for half an hour after several high tension line poles had started burning and the service was out until repairs could be made.

With the aid of the Portland and Vancouver barracks equipment, the blaze was held within the block bounded by Washington, Main and Third and Fourth streets. While live cinders were blown to adjacent buildings, no new fires were started, it was said.

The block burned was known as the Williams and Bud Smith block, although there were several buildings containing stores and offices that were entirely gutted. One of the first to go was the Knight hotel.

No casualties were reported. Among the business establishments were the Mayflower restaurant, the Ross harness shop, the P. M. Elwell real estate office, the Anderson barber shop, Bud Smith garage.
