Food For Thought

We quote from the advertisement of the Anti-Manager League:

"Why are the records so kept from inspection of the public, and what is the motive back of this form of government? If the Police Records are kept secret, why not all other public records? (Sec. 110 Page 40.)"

We wonder whether the writer of the above is ignorant or whether this is a mild form of attempt at misrepresentation. If he is familiar with the provisions of the present charter he should know that the section referred to above is identical with that already in our present charter. The criminal records of the Police Department while always accessible to duly elected officials of the city, are never open to the public. One reason is that it is only the criminal or crook who is interested in what the police know about him, and it is the criminal who would be benefited by broadcasting this information. No matter what the result of the election this provision will continue to be the rule of the police department, the same as it now is and has been in all cities.

"That the city manager fixes all salaries except his own and municipal judge?"

Yes, the Manager determines the salaries or wages to be paid the employees of the city. However his authority in this respect is considerably limited and restricted. The Council and Budget Committee annually determines the amount that may be expended for each specific purpose in every department, and the Manager or other employee is prohibited from expending any greater amount than the budget allows. So you see the above provision is not as dangerous as the Anti-Manager League would have you believe. It is just their weak attempt to try and scare you.

"That the commissioners may import their city manager, and he in turn may import all other officers, policemen, firemen, street commissioner and health officer?"

The commissioners undoubtedly will hire an outside man who is trained in city affairs, and who would be ambitious to succeed so that he may advance to a larger city and a more important position. As to the police and fire department, the new charter provides for Civil Service in these departments the same as all modern city governments. This insures a man, entering this particularly specialized work, a permanent position as long as he makes good and follows the Civil Service rules. The new Charter also provides that preference shall be given to residents in the employment of all labor for the city and that the prevailing wage shall be paid. This is just protection to all employees of the city.

There will be no "passing the buck" as the city manager will be given sufficient authority to permit him to get results. If he does not make good, it will be just too bad for him.
