We Are Shot. NO! We Are Challenged

Bring forth the horse pistols and let's give battle, and let the bloody gore fall where it may.

Again we are taken back to the days of our youth, when the trumpets blared, and the torchlights flared, and the professional politician and office seeker harrangued, all in the interest of the "Deer Peepul" whose votes they sought.

But this is 1930, the industrial age, when the people are ousting the political gang and replacing them with modern business management, and adopting City Manager Charters. So, we will have to respectfully decline the challenge.

You see we are just ordinary citizens who have been forced to spend most of our time at WORK in the stores, mills and factories. We are just voters and not trained politicians. Many of us have not even been to college, but we do vote and pay taxes.

Mass meetings are a thing of the past and the old time boss and political ring are fast disappearing, along with the "Town meeting" form of government, and the political caucus and packed convention. Only a few cities are still burdened with them, and they are making a desperate but losing fight to retain their power and dictation.

We have the newspapers, magazines and unlimited sources of information, so the public are better informed today than at any time in the history of the country. They are interested in an intelligent discussion of matters of public policy, based on facts, but are perfectly able to form their own conclusions without dictation.

We wondered why W. C. MacRea was so active in opposition to this charter. Now we know, as he has told us himself that he wants to be mayor. We presume that he has the support of the Anti-Charter League. This would be following precedent. A League is formed for some camouflaged purpose, and immediately a slate is formed and the political spoils are parceled out among the faithful gang. Evidently Mr. MacRea didn't stay long enough in Dayton to become very well informed about the city. Dayton, Ohio, has a population of 152,559, before the last census. It adopted the City Manager charter in 1914. It has had four managers, and F. O. Eichelberger is the present manager at a salary of \$9600. So much for that.

We had expected that there might have been some honest points of disagreement on the merits of the City Manager charter, which we could discuss for the benefit of the readers, but the opposition seems to have run out of material. Only five points have been raised and these objections were so silly and ridiculous that the writer undoubtedly felt ashamed after putting them in print. Of course, a person who is so evidently unfamiliar with even the contents of the present charter, which has been the law of the city for 17 years, is hardly competent to discuss the merits of any form of government.

The city manager plan spreads fastest in regions which know most about it, and where the people have seen it work. This should be conclusive evidence of its merit. For example, it was adopted in Dayton in 1913 and has spread rapidly over Ohio and now twenty-three cities of that state have it. It got an early start in three small cities in Michigan in 1914 and now 43 places all over Michigan have adopted it. Likewise in Texas (thirty-one cities), California (thirty-three cities), and in Virginia, where it now governs one-fifth of the population of the state including every city over 25,000 population except Richmond.

Four hundred cities in the following states are operating under the City Manager charter and like it:

Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

With this evidence of its popularity, isn't it worth while to give it serious consideration in Klamath Falls?
