PORTLAND MAN
NOMINATED FOR
GOVERNOR POST

Joseph Platform Subscribed to by 3,527 Earnest Oregon Citizens at Municipal Auditorium in Portland; Meier Promises Business Administration if Elected; Nomination Made by Unanimous Ballot.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8 (AP)—With the nomination last night of Julius L. Meier, Portland merchant, as independent candidate for governor, the Oregon electorate will have three candidates to choose from when they go to the polls to elect a governor in November.

Phil Metschan, Portland, hotel man, was chosen as the republican candidate at a recent meeting of the state central committee. This was the first time in the history of the state a republican candidate has been named in that manner and resulted from the death of Senator George W. Joseph, who was nominated in the May primaries. Edward W. Bailey, Junction City, was nominated in the primaries as the democratic standard bearer.

Senator Joseph was elected on a platform of free speech, municipal and public development of hydro-electric power and the abolition of the public service commission.

Committee "Scrapped" Platform When the Republican Central Committee nominated Metschan, followers of Joseph charged it had "scrapped" the platform which won the support of more than 50,000 voters in the primary election and immediately announced they would place an independent candidate in the field. Meier's nomination last night was the outgrowth of that announcement.

Meier formerly was associated with Joseph in a Portland law firm, and previous to the Republican state convention had agreed to become a candidate for the nomination, when the state committee failed to endorse the Joseph platform, however, he withdrew from the race. (Continued on Page Twelve)

BALTIMORE, Aug. 8. (AP)—Nephews and nieces who yesterday believed they had attended the funeral of their uncle, came back from the cemetery to find they had buried a stranger. They discovered their uncle alive and well and standing at the intersection of a busy street.

Police to whom they appealed for relief were only able to change health department records to show an unknown man had been buried. The coroner could do no more, and told them there was no way to recover funeral expenses.

Last Monday a man was found dead in Carroll park, and Charles Hower identified it as William L. Lewis, an uncle who had lived with him for 15 years. The identification was confirmed by other nephews and nieces.

Governor Horton
Wins Nomination
In Tennessee Race

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 8. (AP)—Governor Henry H. Horton strengthened his hold on re-nomination for another two-year term as 1859 precincts out of 2251 today gave him an unofficial majority in yesterday's democratic primary of more than 35,000 over L. E. Gwynn, Memphis attorney. The vote stood: Horton 125,582; Gwynn 89,412.

Representative Cordell Hull, former chairman of the democratic national committee, won the democratic nomination for the six year United States senatorial term by a plurality of approximately 54,000 over Andrew L. Todd, Memphis capitalist. The unofficial count from 1789 precincts was, Hull 120,963; Todd 66,328.

Davis W. Doddson, Nashville educator, the third candidate, received only scattered support.

Institution Made
Brooms Sell Fast

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8. (AP)—So extensive is the demand for brooms made at the state employment institution for the blind in Portland that the supply is completely exhausted with orders waiting. Superintendent Roberts reported to the state board of control today. To meet the situation, the board has authorized Thomas Gold, former manager of the factory, to go to Kansas and Oklahoma to buy four or five carloads of broom corn for use during the winter.

Bond Theft Trio
Taken by Police

CHICAGO, Aug. 8. (AP)—The Chicago Daily Times today said three members of an alleged \$1,000,000 international bond theft ring have been seized in Loop hotels by detectives, and that the leader was running into a trap set for him by authorities.

The Daily Times said one of its reporters discovered the three under arrest have been held incommunicado in a local police station since Saturday. It reported they are Stanley McCormick, Leo Morgan and R. W. Hampton, alias Bacon of Indianapolis, Ind.

Forecaster Says Change Coming Middle of Next Week

PRESSURE CONDITION
IN FAR NORTH AIDS

No Immediate Relief Promised But Weightman Says Pressure Condition Is Usually Followed By Showers and Lower Temperature in Upper Mississippi Valley.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8. (AP)—The weather bureau said today "some hope is in sight" for a break in the prolonged drought.

R. H. Weightman, forecaster, explained no immediate relief was in sight, but added existing pressure conditions in the far north were generally followed in the course of a few days by showers and lower temperatures in the upper Mississippi valley and Plain states. He said alleviation for the corn and wheat belt might come about the middle of next week.

In the meantime President Hoover and government officials went forward with plans for the relief of areas where distress has become acute.

Pending receipt of definite information from the agriculture department Monday on the damage done and threatened, the president called three members of the federal farm board and its general counsel, Stanley Reed, to the White House for a conference. (Continued on Page Twelve)

SHALLOCK SAYS
NEW PLAN BESTProminent Lumberman
Gives Endorsement to
Manager Plan

Much discussion is being heard both for and against the city charter and open meetings are being held to pick it to pieces and see what it is made of. Opinion varies, many are in favor of the new charter and many are against it. Voters are being asked to carefully study both sides of the question and to thoroughly read the copy of the charter sent them before they cast their vote in Tuesday's election.

Schallock for Plan
Fred Schallock, one of the best known lumbermen in the city and one who is known to carefully weigh his opinions, stated today that he heartily endorsed the new plan.

"After a thorough study of the new charter I feel that the city manager form of government is the most practical method of administering the city's affairs from the standpoint of efficiency and economy. The employment of a trained executive, whose entire actions are controlled by a council composed of representative citizens of the city, would place the city on a parity with privately managed corporations who employ a trained executive controlled by the board of directors. I heartily endorse the new plan." were the statements issued by Mr. Schallock.

Drew Up Charter
Claude McCulloch, one of the committee members who recommended the city manager form of government for Klamath Falls, spent a great deal of his time drawing up the charter and saved the city much expense in doing so.

NEGRO PAIR

Crowd of 1,000 Persons Storms Jail In Town Of Indiana

YOUTHS ACCUSED OF
ATTACKS ON WHITES

Thomas Shipp, 19, and Abe Smith, 19, said to have shot Claude Deeter and Attacked His Girl Companion on Lonely Road East of Marion.

MARION, Ind., Aug. 8. (AP)—A frenzied mob of 1,000 persons which stormed the Grant county jail late last night snatched two negroes from their cells and hung them on the courthouse square.

The victims of the mob's fury were Thomas Shipp, 18, accused of fatally shooting Claude Deeter, 23, of Fairmount, Ind., and Abe Smith, 19, who police said admitted attacking Deeter's girl companion after the shooting on a lonely country road east of here.

Using sledge hammers after they were driven off once by use of tear gas bombs, members of the mob smashed a hole in the masonry beside the jail door and broke their way through two steel doors to reach the cells of the negroes.

Clothing Torn From Body

Shipp's clothing was torn from his body by the maddened men, and he was borne in a blanket to the courthouse yard and hanged from the bars of a window in the building.

Smith, borne from the jail by a group of men after they had knocked him unconscious with their fists and hammers was thrown on the ground where a horde of screaming women trampled on him and tore his body with their finger nails. (Continued on Page Twelve)

Mead Advocates
Unit Development
Of Columbia Basin

SEATTLE, Aug. 8. (AP)—Early development of the Columbia basin project in Eastern Washington on a unit basis was advocated by Dr. Elwood Mead, United States commissioner of reclamation, in an address before the Engineers club here last night.

Dr. Mead favored bringing in units aggregating 100,000 to 200,000 acres, preferably with power generated at the same time the land is irrigated, to help pay construction costs. It was desirable, he said, to formulate a program of construction which "would not bring panic to farmers of the Middle West, with threats of enormous new acreages of land, and with an initial outlay which will not frighten congress, which must provide the money."

Dr. Mead and his party, who have just completed an extensive tour of the Columbia basin, planned to visit Tacoma today and proceed from there to Portland.
