

RODEO EVENTS START TONIGHT AT CHILOQUIN

Boxing Card, Racing Events and Dance On Program

Big things in the entertainment line are planned at Chilquin this week-end. Friday night a 32-round boxing card will be presented under the management of Jack Crim. Saturday is the first day of the two-day rodeo and horse racing program. Saturday night is the rodeo dance with prizes to the best-dressed cowboy and cowgirl present.

Sunday morning the Bonanza baseball team, champions of the Southern Klamath League, will meet an "All-Stars" Indian team at 11 a. m. The "All-Stars" are members of other teams which the Bonanza team defeated to win the championship.

Parade on Sunday
In addition, Sunday is the final day of the rodeo and race meet, and awards will be made that day, and a street parade will be held at 1 p. m. One Pendleton roundup judge will assist in the judging. Saturday the riders will qualify and Sunday will be the final day of the rodeo.

All kinds of races, Indian races,

relay races, track races, chariot races, will be held.
Over 100 of the best bucking horses in the northwest will appear, including the famous mule, China Boy, who hasn't been ridden in the eight years he has been in rodeo circles, and Dare Devil, in rodeos for five years and never ridden.

Offer Riders Reward
George Metz, prominent Klamath Falls jeweler, has donated a cup for the team winning the championship baseball game Sunday.

The rodeo association has offered \$10 a minute to anyone who will ride the mule, China Boy. Yesterday it was stated that Jack Duke, president of the Oregon Bank and Trust company, who is said to have ridden in earlier days, may attempt to ride China Boy. Other Klamath bankers are said to be behind Mr. Duke's promise.

Today a 16-page official program will come off the press. The race and rodeo program, the line-ups of the baseball teams and the full program of entertainment is contained in the attractive program.

Accident in Hay Field Responsible For Goode's Death

Details of the death of Rev. Wilmer Elsworth Goode which occurred Thursday about noon on a farm near Macdoel, Calif., were obtained here today. Rev. Goode has been in the Methodist ministry for over 30 years. He was 66 years old when he died. Horace, hitched to a binder, became frightened, throwing Mr. Goode from the machine and causing fatal injuries.

As Rev. Goode and his grandson, Wilmer Holmes, were getting ready to unhitch the team from the binder at noon, the

horses became frightened and started to run. Mr. Goode was thrown from the machine and into it. He received fractures of the bones in the chest and internal injuries from which he died a short time later in Macdoel.

Born in Iowa
Rev. Goode has been pastor of the Macdoel and Dorris churches for several years. He was born in Iowa on January 28, 1864.

He is survived by his wife, Aura Goode; three sons, Morie and Elsworth, Jr., of Macdoel, and Arthur of Prospect, Ore.; and four daughters, Mrs. H. C. Young and Mrs. Maude Holmes of Macdoel, Mrs. Bertha Candy of Medford and Mrs. Marie Milligan of Richmond, Calif. 18
