## JOE SWINDLER KNOCKED OUT IN 7TH ROUND

Young Peter Jackson of  
Portland Lands Hay  
Maker on Chief

Young Peter Jackson, 182, Portland, colored heavyweight, knocked Joe Swindler, 175, Chiloquin, in the seventh round of a scheduled 10 round main event last night at the Chiloquin arena. It was the high light of a card featured by plenty of action all the way through.

Swindler had the edge on the early rounds but the colored boy's ruggedness was too much for the fighting chief of police. After being on the canvas in the sixth round from a volley of body punches, the bell saved the officer. Only his gameness sent him out for the fatal seventh. He carried the fight after the bell rang and seemed OK, when suddenly Jackson whipped out a right to jaw and left rip to mid-section and it was all over for the pride of Chiloquin. In the writer's opinion, it seemed that Joe's legs went back on him. It was a good scrap, both boys going their best at all times.

Davies Nods Hensaker  
The semi windup showed Flash Davies, 135, at his best when he smothered Red Hensaker, 145, with his speed and won every round. Red kept trying at all times but the Shiek of Chiloquin had one of his good nights and showed real championship form, winning easily. If Davies was consistent in boxing like he showed against the rugged Red Head he certainly would hold his own against a lot of good boys. It was a pleasing fight to the cash customers.

Amos Shadley, 130, of Sprague River, had an easy time in stopping Lefty Louie, 140, of Chiloquin in less than a round. Shadley carried too many guns for his opponent.

A Show Stealer  
One of the best bouts of the evening was staged in the curtain raiser. Mark Willis, 130, Chiloquin, and Chico Oting, 131, Reno, Nev., fought four hectic rounds to a draw. Willis hit the canvas in the third round but showed gameness in arising at the count of nine just as the gong sounded. This green youngster, this being his first ring appearance, came out strong for the final round and almost tore Chico's head off. The fans were standing on their feet when the bell rang. Referee Lyon Howe ruled both hands a popular draw decision. This Willis, with plenty of coaching, has in him the makings of a good boy.

It was a good card and the house was good. Much credit is due Matchmaker Howe on handling the card.

## Seven Miners Die When Timbers of Colliery Crash

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 9. (AP)—Caught in a fall of timbers and debris in the Gilberton Colliery of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron company last night, seven miners were killed and 16 others injured.

Three of those who escaped with their lives were injured so severely they may not recover, hospital physicians said today.

Twenty-three men were working in the third level, about 1900 feet below the surface, when the accident occurred, due, investigators believed, to a sudden collapse of timbering. The dead and severely injured were buried under tons of dirt, coal and dirt, while the others escaped the full force of the avalanche.

The Colliery, 10 miles from Pottsville, has been closed for several months and new rails were being placed in the slope preparatory to resuming operations Monday.

## Cubs Alone Uphold Traditions Of West Against Invasion of Clubs From Over Alleghanies

Another east-west warfare is on in full blast in the major leagues and if the opening day's results are any criterion then the eastern clubs are due to see their percentage column rise several notches.

Ten games were played in the inter-sectional combat yesterday with the western teams able to salvage only one of the conflicts. The Chicago Cubs kept their section of the country from being completely white washed by defeating the Boston Braves, 5 to 1. Home runs by Clarence Blain and Charley Grimm coupled with effective pitching by Guy Bush gave the champions the game. Boston's single run was the result of Walter Berger's twenty-eighth home run.

George Pipiras and Harry Rice put together some effective hitting and batting, respectively, to give the Yankees a 5 to 3 decision over the Browns. Pipiras held the Browns hitless for five innings and then gave only five while Rice accounted for three runs with a single, home run and Red Sox on balls.

The Red Sox, aided by a six run rally in the first inning, defeated Detroit 8 to 6, to break the Tigers six-game winning streak.

LONDON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Six men who hope to bring back to England from America the Westchester polo cup after the international matches in September left here today. They sail from Southampton later today aboard the Aquitania.
