MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, Aug. 9. (AP)—Family patent and pastry flours have advanced another 20c, according to quotations of the Superior Flour company.

Heavier receipts and lighter demand imparted a weaker tone to the butter market. The opinion prevails that the recent advances have been too rapid.

The egg market was fairly steady, with top grades bringing full quotations. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

The peach market is showing a firmer undertone, in spite of heavy truckloadings at Portland. California shippers are advancing their prices a trifle and shipments are comparatively light. Elbertas from Yakima will not move in volume for at least two weeks yet, due to crop failure in the lower Yakima valley.

New-crop onions from the Shermore, Oregon, district are expected next week. Local potatoes are in liberal supply, prohibiting sale of many Washington potatoes. Yakima shippers have advanced their prices a bit, to \$1.00 per cwt. plus bags, for fall delivery of combination grade Nette Gems. San Francisco is taking several cars of Yakima potatoes this week.

Walla Walla tomatoes continue to bring a substantial premium over stock from The Dalles. The Dalles tomatoes declined 5-10c per box.

Citizen Makes Confession

Mr. Editor:—I would like to make a public confession, since I have always felt, and endeavored to discharge by responsibilities as a citizen.

Instead of reading the new Charter, which has long been in my hands, I took the easier way, and went to the meeting Wednesday evening for enlightenment. I went favorably inclined, but came away doubtful. Then feeling ashamed of myself, I did, after several had asked my opinion of the thing I had not yet examined, go to it and to my surprise found that many of the things I am hearing are not true.

First, as to the autocratic powers of the City Manager: Chapter four, article one, section 103 "The city manager shall be accountable to the Commission for his actions, conduct and management of the business." No employment of the City Manager for a definite term shall ever be made, but he may be discharged at the pleasure of the Commission. My thought was: They might have promised it to him for a year on condition of good behavior, but the Charter doesn't permit it. Section 47, Article One, Chapter Three states: "The City Manager shall be elected by the Commission, who may remove him with or without cause." That seems to me to be pretty much of a safeguard, and when you remember that the Commissioners are selected by the various wards on a non-partisan basis, that is we will go to the polls, not to elect a Democrat or Republican, but a good—the very best citizen we know to keep hands on the City Manager, with absolute power to discharge him at will, with or without cause—honestly I think we citizens have the long end of the rope. So I say I am honestly and heartily for the new Charter, which I believe to be crucial at this time, when, if our city is to grow and prosper as it should and will under proper management, there must be inaugurated a policy of economy. Taxes may be lowered along with rents and prices. Why I can now buy property in Portland, relatively as well or better located, for from a half to two thirds of prevailing prices here.

Prices and rents are high because taxes are high, and taxes are high because of inefficient management, and remember this is our corporation. If you have stock in an industrial corporation and expenses are out of all proportion to income, you insist upon competent management. Just as interested tax payers now suggest, by this new Charter, for the good of every home here. Let us be honest and fair; Do our duty next Tuesday, and then see to it that the very best managers be elected Commissioners, and then let us not howl until we are hurt, and even then not blame others if we ourselves are at fault.

The only questionable thing I noted was the placing of clerkship on the City Treasurer, who I think in that office alone will have a full one man's job, but doubtless he or she will have a deputy or assistant, and the strain thus be relieved. I fear, because of lack of personal investigation of this new Charter, since so many have acknowledged to me that they have not read it and are relying on what they hear about it for their conclusions, may be defeated. If it does carry I think it will be due to the good women of our city, who are less partisan than men and better sense the need.—(Just as I believe the good women of Oregon will be responsible for sending to Salem, in the near future, the best business manager the State has ever had)—and with this new Charter and the non-partisan method of electing City Commissioners, I believe the women will see to it that we have a city government commensurate with the importance of what is to be the second city of our State, if we now rise to the height of our opportunities.

With reference to the Wednesday night's meeting: The statement was made there that the committee of fifteen had delegated to one man, well paid, the preparation of the new Charter. I have talked with several, including the Chairman, who assure me that the committee was divided into sections and these studied the various forms of city government, for weeks, and then met together and compared notes and agreed upon this as the best; and since examining it for myself, I heartily concur. We must remember that some attorneys who are wenders at the bar are failures elsewhere. You may have noted that the Chief Justice of the California Supreme Court recently said: "In all my 25 years experience I have never yet known an attorney who was a good witness." So we need to be careful whose testimony we follow.

As to printed arguments,—to be more exact I should say, articles or advertisements,—pro and con, it occurs to me that if I had been the beneficiary of corporate interests to the extent that I believe a certain former editor here was, I would certainly feel that I lived in a glass house, and would not throw stones. Let me in conclusion express the hope that no one will for the sake of controversy, reply to this, but if any one has a real argument to present on the opposite side, I shall be glad to hear or read it.
