

# PORTLAND WINS SIX IN A ROW FROM INDIANS

## Seattle Gets Last Game Of Series; Angels In Second Place

Los Angeles took two games from the San Francisco Missions yesterday, to maintain its place in second position in the Pacific Coast League, only one game now behind the leading Hollywood stars. The Angels won the series, 3 to 2.

San Francisco won one and dropped one in the double-header with the Stars, to hold third place, and stay two games behind the leaders.

The Angels won the morning game 13 to 1, and the afternoon game 6 to 2. In the morning they hit Herman Pillette hard and often, and the Missions played bad ball in the field. The southern team was pushed harder in the afternoon, facing Bert Cole in the box for the Missions. Cole put up a strong battle until the ninth, when Sigafos clinched the affair with a homer, scoring Skiff.

**Seals-Actors Split**  
At Los Angeles, Hollywood dropped the first game, 12 to 3, to San Francisco, but came back to win the second, 7 to 4. Jess Hill and Earl Wheeler each got a homer in both games, and twelve homers were hit during the two sessions. San Francisco took the series for the week, four games to two.

Sacramento took the series from the Oaks, five to two, and won both games yesterday, the morning session 4 to 3, and the afternoon affair 4 to 2. Two of the smallest Sunday crowds of the season witnessed the games. The Senators had to hunch four hits in the third inning of the morning session to overcome the Oaks two-run lead. Tony Freitas having allowed four hits and two runs in the first two frames, Ed Bryan pitched himself to an easy victory in the afternoon, keeping eight hits well scattered. The Senators scored all their runs off Hurst.

**Indian Win One**  
After losing the first game to Portland in ten innings, 4 to 3, Seattle finally broke into the winning column by taking a six-inning game, 10 to 2, which was called by agreement to enable Seattle to catch a train. Seattle took only the one game in the series, Portland winning six straight victories.

## Miniature Course Creates New Field For Raw Materials

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11. (AP)—These baby golf courses sprouting around the United States now number 25,000, and represent the incredible value of \$125,000,000 in investment.

This is the estimate compiled by the commerce department, which finds 15,000 of them have sprang into existence since last January.

Primarily the government's commercial sharps have been investigating the subject by reason of the demand the miniature golf establishments are creating for materials of various kinds, all during a period when demand for substances is a matter of general concern. The courses promise to consume in the aggregate very respectable quantities of cotton, through their use of duck and canvas for enclosures. They use, also, the products of a dozen industries.

## Hack Setting New Home Run Record

CHICAGO, Aug. 1. (AP)—Just five more home runs—and 44 games in which to get them—and Hack Wilson of the Cubs, will have set a new National league record for round-trip blows.

The pudgy Cub outfielder yesterday laced Boston Brave pitching for three homers in a double header, to give him a total of 39 for the season, and equal his 1929 record. The league record of 43 was set last year by Chuck Klein of the Phillies, who today was ten behind Wilson.

## Temporary Mail Route Established

Establishment of a temporary star route service from Klamath Falls to Lakeview, to commence August 11, has been announced from the local postoffice. Departmental instructions covering the service state that it will be daily from Klamath Falls to Lakeview, leaving Klamath Falls at 8 a. m., and arriving at Lakeview at noon.

Announcement of the service brings to conclusion efforts of the Lake county chamber of commerce to have the former service re-established. It was discontinued on July 1st, with the letting of the new mail contracts. Mail will be carried by the Red Ball stage line of this city.

## Father Kills Self And Three Children

BURNABY, B. C., Aug. 11. (AP)—Three little children and their father were dead today after the latter, Otto Zeller, placed them in a stump hole with him on a highway near their home, and set off a charge of dynamite. The triple murder and suicide occurred last night.

At least one of the three murdered children had been warned of his fate several days ago. It was discovered when a friend said the child had told him of the father's intention to kill them all. Neighbors said Zeller's wife left him recently. The children were between two and seven years old.

## Grantham Takes Them Both Ways

George Grantham of the Pittsburgh Pirates is one of the few "turn around" hitters left in baseball. There have been a number in the past and a few present-day ones. Frank Frisch of the Cards being one. A "turn around" hitter is one who bats left hand against right hand pitchers and right hand against southpaws.

"When I started out," said Grantham, "I felt that I simply couldn't hit left-handed pitchers, so I switched over to the other side of the plate and went at them right-handed. And I did pretty well, too. I can hit right-handed better than I can left-handed right now, but the trouble is I can't get hold of the ball so well. And besides, it mixes me up in taking my stride to first base. I hit left-handed mainly to get the use of my speed. When I shift over to the other side of the plate I lose a step.

"But even now I make the shift once in a while for luck. When a southpaw has my number and I know it, I feel that I've got nothing to lose, so I shift to the right side of the plate and see what happens."

## Brooklyn Robins Strike Path Of Thorns on Western Front

Once again the Brooklyn Robins are finding the pathward through the western half of the National league circuit a thorny road to travel in their quest of the championship pennant.

On their last swing through the West, the pace-setting Robins failed to break even, dropping seven of their thirteen games, and if the results at St. Louis the last three days are any criterion, then Brooklyn's pennant hopes are due to receive a severe jolt before the Robins return to Flatbush.

**Lose Double Header**  
The second and third blow in two days was handed the Robins yesterday when the Cardinals took a double header, the first 8 to 2, and the nightcap 4 to 0. The double defeat while the Cubs were winning two gave the Brooklyn just one game advantage over the league champions. Burleigh Grimes pitched steady ball in the first, but Wild Bill Hallahan was brilliant in the closing contest. He let the Robins down with five hits and fanned 12, striking out seven of the nine men that faced him in the third, fourth and fifth innings.

The Cubs took the measure of the Robins, 6 to 0 and 11 to 1. A pair of highly polished pitching performances by Charlie Root and Pat Malone, and Hack Wilson's home run bat accounted for Chicago's triumph. Root set the Braves down with three hits in the opener, while Wilson blasted out his 37th and 38th home runs. Malone produced a five-hit game in the second, while Hack was sending his 39th homer over the wall.

**Phils Take Two**  
The lowly Phillies also won a double-header, taking the Cincinnati Reds into camp by the scores of 18 to 0 and 4 to 3. Four Red hurlers were touched for 21 safeties in the first, while Collins had the edge over Rixey in the nightcap.

Turning on the Cleveland Indians, the Washington Senators managed to hold onto second place in the American league by a margin of two points by slugging out an 18 to 6 victory. Eleven runs in the eighth inning accounted for the large score.

The Yankees kept pace with the Senators in a home run festival with the St. Louis Browns, the New Yorkers winning 14 to 11. Babe Ruth connected with his 42nd of the year, while Combs, Goslin and Blue also rapped out circuit blows.

Eari Whitehall chalked up his ninth straight victory for Detroit as the Tigers turned back the Boston Red Sox 4 to 2.

Perlick, in a recent appearance here, lost a close decision to Jack (Kid) Berg of England and should give Suarez a bitter argument all the way.

At Braves Field tonight, Jimmy Braddock, Jersey City slugger, meets Babe Hunt, Ponca City, Okla., heavyweight, in the headliner while at Spokane, Wash., on Wednesday, Maxie Rosenbloom, the Harlan town, who is recognized as world's light heavyweight champion in this state, battles Nate Brown of Philadelphia in a six rounder.

## Blaze Destroys New C. N. R. Pier At Vancouver, B. C.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 11. (AP)—The new million dollar Canadian National railway pier here was a blackened ruin today, after one of the most sensational fires in this port. Damage to the structure and freight awaiting coastwise vessels was estimated by government officials at \$1,250,000. Origin of the blaze was unknown.

While firemen battled the raging flames, which several times spread to a nearby ferry wharf, one of the crowd of spectators, James Cathcart, fell dead as a result of a heart attack. All nearby streets were crowded by on-lookers, including many holiday visitors.

A watchman, who discovered the fire, barely escaped the rush of flames as he ran for aid. No ships were moored at the pier.
