Veteran Publisher Dies at Nashville

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 12. (AP)—Edward R. Stahman, publisher of the Nashville Banner, died today after an extended illness. He was 87 years old. His illness began in March, 1929, as the result of overwork, and he was forced to take his first vacation. His final relapse occurred a week ago, and up to that time he had kept in close touch with affairs. He was intensely interested in the campaign of his friend, Cordell Hull, who last Thursday was given the democratic nomination for U. S. Senator.

As a newspaper publisher, Mr. Stahman was fearless and never wavered in his bitter political and business fights, despite threats of personal violence made against him.

NEW ORDINANCE COMES BEFORE CITY COUNCIL

Milk Dealers May Have To Grade Products Before Selling

A new city milk ordinance which divides raw milk into four grades and pasteurized into three grades for selling purposes was passed to second reading by the city council last night.

The ordinance divides "milk," certain "milk products," "milk producer," pasteurization, prohibits sale of adulterated and misbranded milk and milk products; requiring permits and licenses for sale of milk and milk products; regulating the inspection of dairy farms and milk plants; the test & grading, labeling, placarding, pasteurization, re-grading, distribution, sale and denaturing of milk and milk products; provides for establishment of milk grades, regulates construction of future dairies and milk plants, provides a penalty for violation of the ordinance and provides for the repeal of the old milk ordinance.

There was no discussion on the matter, but members of the council asked for individual copies in order that they may study the ordinance before it is adopted.

Accept Assessment Roll

The proposed assessment roll of city lighting unit 2 to the amount of \$29,574.23 was accepted by the council and the city attorney was authorized to prepare resolutions setting the date for hearing of objections to the assessment.

Fire Marshal to Visit

Mayor T. B. Watters reported that the fire marshal will arrive in Klamath Falls from Portland within a short time to make a survey of the city and make suggestions on equipment needed by the city fire department. It is believed by the council that another fire station will be included among the marshal's suggestions.

Report On Sidewalks

It was reported that a number of property holders are slow in having their paved sidewalks installed, notwithstanding that orders have been sent from the police judge's office to owners of all property which require new walks. A. W. St. App, city attorney, was authorized to draw up an ordinance ordering in the walks.

Will Move Equipment

Councilman Butler asked what is to be done with all the building equipment left in the rear of the Oregon bank building on Tenth street. The mayor said it was his understanding that N. E. Berry, upon his last visit to this city, agreed to move the equipment if construction on the new hotel is not started within 30 days.

Request Street Site

A permit was allowed the Central Labor council to block off Tenth avenue from Second to Third streets for use of a carnival company which will be here August 27, 28, 29, 30 and September 1, providing there are no objections from property holders.

Fire Chiefs To Meet

A letter was read and placed on file which announced the 27th annual convention of the Pacific Coast Fire Chiefs at Oakland, Calif., September 1, 2, 3, 4.

Adopt New Code

The ordinance adopting the 1926 edition of the Pacific Coast Building Official's conference was adopted unanimously.

Applications

A permit was allowed to A. J. Connolly to operate a pool hall on Main street between Ninth and Tenth streets upon recommendation of the police committee.

Applications from T. N. Cline to operate a hamburger stand at 631 South Sixth street, E. R. Johnson for a hamburger stand at 806 Main street and George F. Hogan for a rooming house at 920 Klamath avenue were referred to the police committee. Ten building permits were allowed, which totaled \$19,150.
