MARKET QUOTATIONS
PORTLAND, Aug. 12. (AP)—Cantaloupes, peaches and tomatoes are the center of activity on the wholesale market.

California peaches are plentiful and the movement fairly active at steady prices. Demand is good for the best J. H. Hales, but less active for Elberta and Elbertas. Most Elbertas are reported of only fair quality.

Motortruck receipts of more than 2500 boxes of tomatoes from the Dallas and other Columbia river districts is the heaviest of the season. The supply exceeds the demand and prices reached their season's low at about 40c a box for the best stock.

The egg and butter markets were steady, with eggs particularly firm.

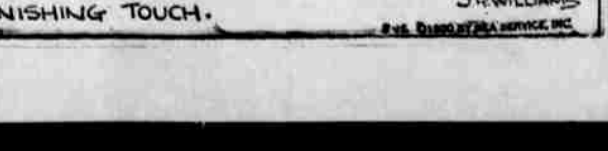
