Thoughts We've Been Thinking

Klamath Falls Will Go Merrily Along Regardless of Charter Election...

It proved good hot weather sport for a number who were vigorously for the charter...

The city remains as is—the present charter prevails, and everybody is happy and ready to join in united effort to advance Klamath—make her the best city—which she has been for years—on the coast.

OREGON as a state witnesses again the political game being played in its ruthless manner. The state commission has removed Harold Clifford, the best man Oregon has ever had at the head of its fish and game, because another was slated for the job.

Clifford's record in protecting the wild life and propagating fish for the streams of the state stands against his challengers. No proof was given that he was anything but an exceptional official. Yet he had to go because the game machine had so decreed.

Harry Poole of Klamath Falls and Lush Wright of Union county not only dissented from the opinion of the other members of the commission, but both Poole and Wright took a stand for Clifford that was firm and sound. These communitarians do not want to see the department plunged into petty political whirlpools; they do not want to see a good official removed just to make room for a pet of other members of the commission. But they were outvoted.

THE governor should give the commission a working over. Let it undergo a complete reorganization. Its trial of Clifford and the unfair manner in which that trial was decided warrants a general house cleaning in the fish and game department.

Chinese Steamers Crash Off Coast

TOKYO, Aug. 13, (AP)—Seventy-nine persons were missing as the result of a collision between the Chinese steamers Tang On and Lien Hsiang in a heavy fog off the tip of the Shantung peninsula (China). Renzo News Agency dispatches from Dairen said today.

The Tang On, a twin screw steamer of British registry, sank immediately after the collision. All passengers and crew were believed lost. The Lien Hsiang was disabled in the crash.

The Tang On was bound from Tsingtao to Newchwang. She was 255 feet long, 42 feet beam and was built in 1924 at Hong-Kong. Available shipping records list a steamer Lienheng, but no Lien Hsiang. Lloyd's registry of shipping says the Lienheng, of Chinese registry, is 250 feet long and 36 feet beam.

Voters Reject Proposed Change of Charter by Nearly Five to One Vote

ENDURANCE TEAM SETS NEW RECORD

JACKSON AND O'BRIEN ON WAY TO ESTABLISH NEW TIME

1,000 HOURS IN AIR LATEST OBJECTIVE

With Motor Working Perfectly And Both Men in Good Spirits There is No Thought of Landing; Light Rain Marks Record Passing.

LAMBERT ST. LOUIS FIELD, St. Louis, Aug. 13 (AP)—The veteran endurance team, Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, flew through rain and the threat of a storm today to a new world's record for sustained flight. They officially regained the record at 9:52 a. m. (C. S. T.) when they had been up 554 hours and 41 minutes, slightly more than 23 days.

The new mark exceeded by one full hour the record established last July 4 at Chicago by Kenneth and John Hunter, Illinois farm boys, who after several attempts had wrested the flight championship from Jackson and O'Brien. The latter pair set a 429 record July 31, 1929.

ANTI-HOOVER CANDIDATE NOMINATED IN NEBRASKA

(By The Associated Press) Nebraska Republicans gave Senator George W. Norris, veteran insurgent and outstanding foe of Herbert Hoover, the senatorial nomination in Tuesday's primary. Norris, who left his party to campaign two years ago for Alfred E. Smith, democratic presidential nominee, was gaining steadily over William M. Stebbins, "regular" candidate, in the stiff contest he had had in his 18 years of senate service.
