## GAS PLANS FOR THIS CITY TOLD

There will be built an attractive mission type building to house the gas equipment. Liquefied natural gas, which will be served here, is different from manufactured gas in that no dirt or soot comes from the gas plant. Liquefied natural gas is the modern fuel and is a development of years of research by Standard Oil company.

### In discussing the bringing of liquefied natural gas to Klamath Falls, Mr. Aitchison stated, "We are pleased to announce that gas service will place Klamath Falls on a parity with other growing cities. Gas service has been a little slow in coming but fortunately its arrival is coincident with the latest development of liquefied natural gas, which is the modern fuel. All over the west the day of cutting wood and bringing in coal and taking out the ashes is passing, and in their place is coming natural gas, a clean, hot fuel from which there is no dirt."

### Make City Survey

The actual streets of the town where the gas mains will be laid down have not been determined. This will be based upon visits to be made by representatives of Natural Gas Corporation of Oregon to housewives to ascertain how many want gas service. The engineers will then map out the distribution system in accordance with the housewives' requirements.

### Offices are to be established by Natural Gas Corporation of Oregon, where modern gas appliances, stoves and hot water heaters are to be exhibited. Women demonstrators to acquaint housewives with the use of these appliances will be part of the organization.

### Supplies Here

Extensive preparations are already under way for the construction of the distributing system and gas plant. Pipe for the distributing system is already on the ground where the construction depot will be located. Other supplies and necessary equipment have been ordered and are enroute from the east. Supervisory forces of the construction crews are being assembled in San Francisco and as soon as materials arrive the men will be put to work assembling and laying pipe.

### T. E. Bartlett, commercial manager of the company, was also in Klamath Falls Monday with Mr. Aitchison looking over the Klamath territory. E. M. Lindsey, who is chief construction engineer in charge of all Oregon construction work, was also in the city yesterday checking over the proposed plans for this city and laying out initial construction plans.

## Huckleberry Crop Is Nearly Depleted

The berry crop on Huckleberry mountain in the Crater Lake forest reserve is about exhausted, according to word reaching this city, but until the past week the supply has been plentiful and the berries large and juicy in spite of lack of rain. The bushes grow so thickly among the timber of the mountainside they are almost impenetrable. Each year hundreds of people pitch camps near the mountain's summit either to secure berries for their own winter supply or to put on the market. This year merchants have been paying between one dollar and \$1.50 a gallon for the huckleberries.
