## KENTWORTH TO MEET ROWBOAT IN MAIN BOUT

### Tex Accedes to Cry of Fans for Return Engagement

According to the demands of many fans that Jack Kentworth be given another chance at Steamboat Jackson, Joe Richter staff has arranged for these boys to topline a card at the Legion arena Wednesday evening, August 20. This bout is a natural and one that will meet with the approval of every fan at the ringside when Steamboat put the finishing touches to a hard fight early in the 9th round by knocking the plucky Portland boy out. That fight is still talked about as one of the greatest bouts ever staged in Klamath Falls.

This boy Steamboat has been coming right along since the first of the year. He has won his last three bouts by the knockout route and is gaining a firmer hold upon the affections of the public. Steamboat is not a flashy fighter. He is dogged, boring in type, capable of taking a lot of punishment and always waiting for an opportunity to plant a haymaker. In his fight with Kentworth he found the Portland boy's weak spot and kept working on that until it brought the desired result. He took many a hard rap while doing it but such is the life of a fighter.

Just why Jackson is always a short-ender on the betting is a matter of discussion. True, he was but a preliminary fighter up to a few months ago. Then came his memorable fight with Tex (Kid) Evans in which he showed that he was a real fighter. This rallied for a better break and he was matched with Dave Jackson and then Sammy Langford. These boys were a little too fast at boxing and Steamboat lost one and took a draw in the other. He fought some more preliminaries and then came his bout with Jack Breedlove at Chiloquin. Steamboat demonstrated that he is a dangerous wallop when the tough Bond boy took the count in the final round of their 10-round bout. His next knockout was scored over young Barkus by the Jack Dempsey special. But his greatest triumph was the Kayo administered to Jack Kentworth. The latter has a reputation in the big centers so this victory put a long feather in Steamboat's cap.

**Kentworth Has Alibi**  
Kentworth is a game boy and a clever fighter. He has the same alibi offered by other fighters who are unaccustomed to the high and rarer atmosphere of Klamath Falls. So he is coming to the city Saturday and will try to get his wind in shape for the grueling contest awaiting him. He is also bringing his manager and hopes to reverse the count. Steamboat gave him his first setback and it is burning him up to speak. Another thing that is adding fuel to Jack's desire to reverse the decision is that Andy Divodi, crack eastern fighter, is on the coast and he wants a chance at him. So the cash customers are in line for one of the sweetest fights ever staged under the management of Tex Bickertstaff. One of the boys will be counted out and neither will admit that he is to be the one.

**Heavies to Battle**  
Of unusual interest is the semi final six round bout between Dick Reed and Freddy Walters. Those who saw the last card will not forget the fast work of this big youth from the south who took Jack Foley so handily. Speed and punch are two attributes of this boy that make him dangerous to any opponent.

And Dick Reed is taking this bout seriously. The big fellow is out on the road every morning and then goes to the pavilion in the afternoon to box six hard rounds with his sparring partners. It will be up to Dick to exercise skill for Walters means business when he steps into the ring. Both of them fast for their size and capable of hitting hard and fast, this should be the best heavy bout of the season.

**Thirty Fast Rounds**  
In the curtain raiser Jesse Copeland, Chiloquin and Louis Webster, Dorris meet at 140 pounds, they are to go four rounds or less. Pat McCoy and Almos Shadley, heavyweights, will furnish plenty of excitement in their four-round bout. Terry Kileen and Soldier Wallingford complete thirty rounds of milling by fighters who please.

All the boys work out after 5:00 p. m. at the Legion arena. Fans are welcome.

## HARD HITTING ROBINS' ONLY PENNANT HOPE

### Flatbush Team Comes To Life and Pounds Out Victory Over Cubs

As long as the Brooklyn Robins can keep on slugging the ball, the collapse of their pennant hopes, which has been rumored every time they have lost more than one or two games in a row, seems unlikely. Supporters of their rivals, principally the Chicago Cubs, were beginning to celebrate the Brooklyn downfall after the Robins had lost five straight games and had dropped the opener of the current "crucial" series as Chicago dug its sixth straight.

**Slugging Reappears**  
But the Robins slugging reappeared yesterday and showed that there still is plenty of life in the flatbush team. A game behind and apparently headed for a worse position, the Robins overcame all their ills in a virtual tie for the lead. Today the Cub margin is only two points instead of the hoped for two games as the result of the 15 to 3 beating inflicted by Brooklyn yesterday.

The Cubs made 16 blows, one of them Hack Wilson's 40th home run, but with little effect. It took a homer by Fred Lindstrom with Crits on base in the third to give the Giants a 7 to 6 victory over Cincinnati. The Pirates came from behind to win their fourth straight, 8 to 4, from Philadelphia.

**American Leaders Win**  
The three American league leaders failed to produce any change in their standing. Philadelphia, Washington and New York all coming out ahead of their western rivals. The champion Athletics made it three straight over Cleveland by a 7 to 2 score as George Earnshaw won his 15th victory of the year. Washington's Senators piled up an early lead of five runs off their old mate, Garland Braxton, then kept the Chicago White Sox from turning their 14 hits into runs to win by a 7 to 4 count.

The New York Yankees put on a similar performance, scoring seven runs in the first five frames to offset a sudden weakness on the part of George Pigeas and defeat Detroit, 10 to 8.

Down at the bottom of the standing, the St. Louis Browns reversed the previous day's decision, beating the Boston Red Sox, 7 to 2, and gaining a tie in games with Chicago for sixth place. Goose Goslin again took the day's honors, driving in four runs with a home run and two singles.

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## HOLLYWOOD UP TWO RUNGS ON COAST LADDER

### Wins from Indians While Angels Fall Before Sacramento

The Hollywood Stars were two rungs on top of the Pacific coast league ladder today, winning the second of the weekly series from Seattle last night, while Los Angeles, trailing one behind, lost to the Senators, and San Francisco, in third place, lost to Portland.

As a result of yesterday's and last night's play, Hollywood's lead seemed assured for this week, at least, with Los Angeles and San Francisco's Seals fighting it out for second and third, the results to depend on the kind of baseball produced by the lower half teams.

**Indians Lose 8-5**  
Playing in Los Angeles, Hollywood gave Seattle a 3 to 2 trimming. Seattle provided a scare for the leaders when the northern team scored five runs in the fifth.

Roy Chesterfield held Los Angeles to six hits allowing the Senators to win 7 to 2 in last night's game at Sacramento, thus putting the Angels two games behind Hollywood, but still in second place. The Seals scored nine runs in the first inning of their game with Portland in San Francisco, but failed to hold the lead, and the Beavers won 12 to 10. Both teams had eighteen hits.

The San Francisco Missions, playing Oakland last night, took twelve hits off the Oaks to win 5 to 1. Johnny Monroe's home run helped the final score for the Missions.
