National Guard Arsenal Receives Heavy Equipment

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 14, (AP)-Since July 1 the Oregon National Guard has received from the Federal government about \$500,000 worth of new and heatier equip-ment for the arsenal at Camp

ment for the arsenal at Camp Clackamas, for the use of the 215th Field Artillery regiment, in addition to this, it was said at National Guard headquarters to-day. 4551,260 worth of new equipment has been received. Included in the equipment re-ceived since July 1 are 16 new 155-millimeter howitaers. These are propelled by five-ton tractors and 36 of these have been receiv-ed. Also there are soveral thous-and doldhars worth of delicate in-struments used in articlery opera-tions. The Howitzers repl lighter 75-millimeter gams forms--ly meed. ly used.






