COUPLE HELD IN DEATH OF CAR SALESMAN

Authorities at Seattle Doubt Story Told by Thomas Kuchin

SEATTLE, Aug. 14, (AP)—Charged with first degree murder, Thomas Kuchin, alias Thomas Walsh, of Seattle, was being held here for Mason county authorities in connection with the death of Shelton, Wash. Monday of Charles Bray, 48, salesman for an automobile company. The warrant was sworn to by J. W. Graham, Mason county prosecuting attorney. Kuchin denied the charge.

Mrs. Betty Walsh, at whose home in Seattle Kuchin said he had lived, was also held for questioning by Mason county authorities. Kuchin and Mrs. Walsh were to be taken to Shelton today by Sheriff W. A. Tucker.

Heat Blamed for Death—Bray, who went to Shelton with Kuchin, authorities said, to complete purchase of the automobile agency for which he was working, collapsed and died, his death being attributed to an acute stomach attack brought on by the heat.

Graham said he began an investigation after he had received an anonymous telephone call asking what had become of the \$5,400 which Bray was supposed to have had with him. Graham awaited, he said, Kuchin's announced return to Shelton to complete funeral arrangements and when he failed to appear, swore out the warrant for his arrest.

The prosecutor also demanded an autopsy and the dead man's stomach, lungs and brain were sent to Albert Jacobson, Seattle city chemist, for analysis.

Kuchin was arrested yesterday in western Washington. Officers said he was driving east.

I. C. C. Examiner To Hear Case of Oregon Railroads

PORTLAND, Aug. 14, (AP)—An interstate commerce commission examiner will arrive here September 4 to conduct hearings on petitions of the Oregon Electric and Southern Pacific railroads, 40 mile lumber line extending from Independence to the coast range summit at Valsetz.

The Oregon Electric last April, announced it had contracted with Cobbs and Mitchell company, owners, to buy the Valley and Siletz and planned to connect it by constructing a 2 1/2 mile link with the Oregon Electric at Orville station. Application was made to the interstate commerce commission.

The Valley and Siletz for nearly two decades has been a spur line from the Southern Pacific line through the connection at Independence and the Southern Pacific opposed the Oregon Electric extension.

117 AIR OFFENDERS—WASHINGTON.—The aeronautic branch of the U. S. department of commerce tried 117 violators of air commerce relations during the second quarter of this year. This number is a 55 per cent increase over the first quarter of the year. Fifty-three were assessed and paid fines; 20 were reprimanded, 43 licenses were suspended, 12 revoked and five licenses were denied. In 24 cases the flyers were dismissed.

FOG LANDING—LONDON.—A successful landing in a heavy fog was accomplished here by the pilot of a new landing instrument. The pilot flew above the fog and away from the field. While he was away a captive balloon was raised above the fog level. Coming back to the balloon, which marked the field, and by an angle indicator, reached the ground and leveled off to a landing by the aid of a weighted indicator.
