ST. PAUL PLAY ATTRACTS MANY TITLE SEEKERS

\$10,000 Prize Money is Strong Magnet For Golf Players

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 15. (AP)—The long trek for gold and glory over the Koller county golf course today saw 150 entries waiting for a generous crop of birds, but willing to take what the fates may give in St. Paul's first open golf tournament.

One round of 18 holes was on today, and another similar round will be played Saturday. The low sixty scorers and ties will go into the 36-hole final match Sunday to determine how the \$10,000 prize money offered by the St. Paul Junior association will be divided. After four days of practice rounds over the course, which is considered one of the best public layouts in the country, the sharpshooters of the professionals felt that something around 250 for the 72 holes would take the first money, \$2,500.

Many Leaders Present
Many of the leaders in the national open, played at Interlachen, Minneapolis in July, will be among today's starters.

Missing from the list are Bobby Jones, national open champion; MacDonald Smith, runner-up, and Leo Diegel, P. G. A. champion.

The persistent money winners were favored to win the St. Paul open. Johnny Farrell, Quaker Ridge, N. Y., who clipped five strokes from par to card 47 in a practice round over the par 72 course, was the leading favorite. However, Gene Sarazen has taken a liking to the course, as has Harry Cooper of Glen Elgin, Ill., and Horton Smith of Cragston, N. Y.

Armour Tries Course
Tommy Armour of Detroit had his first look at the course yesterday. He was in the course late yesterday, playing two balls nearly all the way around, but he expressed the opinion that something right around 280 to 285 would win. If weather conditions are favorable.

Al Watrous of Birmingham, Mich., also was a late arrival, and took one while at the course late yesterday. Wild Bill Mehlhorn of New York has been doing some experimenting with the course, mostly playing without companions.

Tod Morgan Shows Seattle Sports He Is Still Contender

SEATTLE, Aug. 15. (AP)—Tod Morgan, for whom many fight fans have been chanting dirges because he supposedly spent himself so often defending the world junior lightweight crown he wore recently, is being acclaimed today by the same fickle crowd as a real contender in the next heavier division of lightweights.

In the outstanding fight of the season here, he surprised more than 9,000 fans in the civic auditorium last night by showing superb condition after all his campaigning in defeating Leslie "Wildcat" Carter in six rounds.

Carter put up a game fight against the more experienced Seattle boxer but the negro was no match and the decision was easily Morgan's.

The first round was tame, with each feeling their way, but from then on Morgan was master and his left hand continually twisted his rival.

Carter tried gamely to cope with the brilliant boxing of Morgan who opened up in the fourth but the former Everett fighter stayed with him and in the fifth drove Morgan into a corner.

The fight was forecast as having a decisive bearing on futures of both men who have recently entered the lightweight division. Carter had a slight weight advantage, entering the ring at 137 1-4 to Morgan's 136 1-2.

Lakeview Coming To Meet Pelicans Sunday Afternoon
With the intention of taking the lead away from the Pelicans, the Lakeview Shepherds are coming to Klamath Falls Sunday to engage Red Sanders' team in a game of baseball that promises to eclipse anything seen here this season.

Just what Red will do to repulse this onslaught has not been given to the public, but it is surmised that he will recall Earl Hilton to the mound. Hilton, out of the game since going into business for himself, has not let down on his practice and will be ready to step into the box if Red calls upon him. In case Red figures differently, there is Lefty Means who has made a good accounting in his few times in the box.

Bill Baker, former U. of O. star hurler, is slated to do the chucking for the Shepherds, with Big Boy Libby on the receiving end. A good game is in store and as the Klamath fans want the league leadership to remain with the Pelicans it will help a great deal to have the grandstand filled with loyal rooters.

Big League BASEBALL "Fly Ball" Catch

The correct way to catch a fly ball is with the hands cupped outward and the arms partly extended and slightly above the shoulders. Almost all of the fielders of the past and present in the major leagues use this method. Besides being a surer way of catching the ball it also puts the outfielder in a better position for a throw after the catch, than if he caught the ball lower with his hands cupped upward instead of outward.

Occasionally a great outfielder or infielder, noticeably Rabbit Maranville of the Boston Braves, catches a fly ball at his waist with his hands cupped upwards. But these players are freaks in the national game and I would not advise the amateur to try to emulate them.

There have even been major league outfielders who caught a ball with "butter fingers." They were not successful because of this practice, however.

Special trains arriving here brought athletes and visitors from Omaha, Portland, Los Angeles and Idaho points.

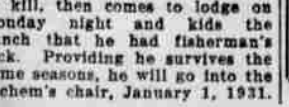
Hack Finds Smith's Curves Easiest Hit

SILVERTON HAS CHANCE TO WIN CHAMPIONSHIP

Defeats Seattle Team Right Handily at Baker, 15-2.

BAKER, Ore., Aug. 15. (AP)—Silverton's American Legion Junior baseball team, its members only recently graduated from the sand lots, today stands within striking distance of the Pacific Northwest regional championship.

The Silverton youngsters yesterday swamped the Rainier-Noble team of Seattle, 15 to 2. Pocastello, Idaho, followed suit by defeating the Billings, Mont., team, 12 to 7. That brought Silverton and Pocastello into the final bracket of the two-day tournament.

Orville Schwab, Silverton's stellar southpaw, held Seattle scoreless throughout the six innings he stayed on the mound. By that time the Oregon boys had run up so great a lead Frisco Edwards, the Silverton manager, put Johnny Perrine in the box to save Schwab for the final game today.

Seattle got its two runs off Perrine in the seventh but Kitchen's wild throw was chiefly responsible for the runs. Perfect support in that inning would have held Seattle scoreless.

Best on Coast
After the game Shirley Boswell, coach at the Lincoln high school, Seattle, and coach of the Rainier-Noble team said:

"Silverton has the best Junior baseball team I ever saw. I figured we had a chance, but it was obvious from the first Silverton was too much for us. If the Silverton team plays like that in all its other games, it can't help but win the national championship."

Race Between Robins and Cubs For National Pennant in Doubt

Unless today's final clash of the "decisive" series between Brooklyn and Chicago finally brings something like a decision, it looks as if their race for the national league pennant might continue indefinitely, or at least until they meet again in September. Despite the big margin they hold over the Robins in their seasons play, the Cubs have not been able to get far ahead in the three games of their current series.

Chicago has won two clashes, and went one full game ahead yesterday, as Pat Malone pitched a fine game for a 5 to 1 Cub triumph. But still the big advantage for the Bruins is that the difference is in the losing column, where Brooklyn is two games to the bad. The future schedules show little possibility of a "break" for either team.

Malone Stays Robins
The Cubs, held in check to some degree through the second game, were completely superior yesterday, as Malone stopped the thunder of Brooklyn's big bats. Bill Clark, Brooklyn's southpaw ace, lasted less than two innings, and Clise Dudley could not check the Cub slugging until the damage had been done.

With four teams kept idle by rain and wet grounds, the National league as a whole made little progress yesterday. The St. Louis Cardinals and Boston Braves divided a close double header. Socks Seibold lost a tough struggle in the first game, as the Cards put on a two-run rally in the ninth to win, 4 to 3. In the second, Old Tom Zachary outlasted Burleigh Grimes, and held St. Louis to six hits, while the Braves pulled out a 3 to 2 triumph.

Three pitchers, Wes Ferrell, Earl Whitehill and Eddie Durham, provided the features of the American League's day. Ferrell won his 20th victory of the season, as Cleveland came back from five straight defeats to pound out a 15 to 9 triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics.

Whitehill won his tenth successive game, setting a major league record for the season, as he beat the New York Yankees, 5 to 1, on a seven hit and eleven strikeout pitching performance. Durham, pitching in a lesser cause, turned in the best hurling job of the day. He shut out the St. Louis Browns

with four singles and without a free trip to first, to give Boston a 3 to 0 victory.

Washington's Senators used three hurlers in their final clash with Chicago, and obtained the best results of them all, so far as the standings were concerned, as though they had something of a struggle to win a 5 to 4 decision.
