

CONTROL BOARD MAY NOT HOLD COL. BARTRAM

Superintendent of Flax Industry Faced With Cut in Salary.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 15. (AP)—Whether the state board of control will be able to keep Colonel W. B. Bartram as superintendent of the state flax industry was a question here today.

State Treasurer Kay, a member of the board, denied that Bartram was to be released at the end of the present flax season, but asserted that he would not be retained at his present salary of \$500 a month. Whether Bartram will consent to stay at a reduced salary was a matter of doubt.

Salary Not Contested

Until about two weeks ago Bartram was in the joint pay of the state and the Oregon linen mills, the state paying him \$350 a month and the mills \$150. When the board of control voted without protest to employ him at full time service for the state there was scarcely any discussion of the salary question. Bartram said he did not want to accept a smaller salary and after his manner of living, and, without protest, the board voted to pay him the full \$500.

Colonel Bartram considers his work in developing the state flax industry about half completed, and estimates that about three more years will be required to get the industry to the point of development where he thinks it should be before he lets go of it. For some time Bartram has been training other men in the managerial and supervisory end of the department.

State Treasurer Kay intimated that a change in policy should be made whereby more of the revenue from flax products should go into current expenses and less in added equipment and improvements.

Home Demolished By Terrific Blast

CLEVELAND, Aug. 15. (AP)—The pretentious home of Raymond Porrello, who has been two of his brothers meet death in the strife over control of Cleveland's corn sugar trade, was demolished by a terrific explosion early today.

Porrello, however, escaped the death which police believe was marked for all seven of the Porrello brothers. He and his family were at the home of his mother. The explosion was caused by gas, second assistant fire chief James Nimmo said.

Old Cabin Draws Curious Visitors

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 15.—Queer conditions noticed by visitors to an old cabin on Sardine creek, once the home of a prospector, have caused many persons to go there. Among those who have taken considerable interest in the case is H. R. Cady. He says he thinks the conditions are caused by the force from a gas fissure nearby. Others assert that the conditions probably are due to an unlocated radium deposit.

Persons who enter the rooms are said to feel a strange pressure of some kind, as though propelled by a giant hand. One cannot stand erect in either room. It is said. Still others assert that the feeling experienced is due to an optical illusion. At any rate, quite a few curious persons have visited the old place.

President Hears Terse Tales Of Suffering Due to Drought

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15. (AP)—Terse stories of drought disaster were told before President Hoover's conference of governors. Some of the worst, relayed from county agricultural agents through Secretary Hyde, follow in part:

Holivar county, Mississippi: "Feed for 14,000 mules needed. Local resources exhausted. Human suffering already seen. Hundreds of families going from place to place hungry and ill-clad."

Carroll county, Mississippi: "No water. Livestock cannot last much longer. Conditions serious."

Morehouse county, Louisiana: "Distressing situation: 3200 families will be furnished feed and food by banks and merchants on monthly basis."

Webster county, Louisiana: "Urgent need of food supplies for 3,200 human beings."

\$1,000,000 Needed
Columbia county, Arkansas: "Local authorities will be unable to make further advances. The 2,500 families will be without food. One million dollars will be needed."

Conway county, Arkansas: "One thousand families without food and in many cases without water. Six hundred thousand dollars needed."

Lawrence county, Kansas: "One million dollars necessary to supply feed. Majority of farm families are in dire need of food at present."

Polk county, Arkansas: "Wholesale stealing of food already started among poorer tenant families."

Davies county, Ky.: "No local agencies can possibly take care of existing condition. Probably over 1,500 families will need food furnished this winter."

Nelson county, Kentucky: "Conditions frightful. Have let hope go, no prospect of feed—3,000 people starving this winter."

While many other counties reported conditions almost as bad, a majority were more optimistic.

Forest Hills Golf Course is Latest Pastime Novelty

A pleasant surprise is in store for golf enthusiasts of the city in the way of a novel miniature golf course. The Forest Hills course, located under Moe's store in the former location of the Grey Goose sandwich shop, is to be opened tomorrow evening at 7 o'clock.

Most unusual decorations have transformed the large room into a forest den. Real golf greenways are used which will be an incentive to many more players to try their skill here. Moss has been attractively placed surrounding the greenways.

Hazards consist of rolling greens, ice caves in which hidden lights have been placed, a miniature Lost River which winds through the course, and other clever fixtures. A special feature is the waterfall placed at one side of the course, surrounded by huge rocks and at the side of this is a tiny mill.

The posts in the room have been camouflaged as trees while the ceiling is a mass of painted limbs and leaves of trees. A beautiful scene has been painted on each of the walls, one representing a view of Crater Lake.

The course consists of eight holes and will probably be one of the most popular in the city since it is located inside and suitable for summer and winter play. In the summer time a cooling system will chill the air, while in the winter it will be warm enough for all.
