## Young Bill Stribling Wants To Meet Best Heavyweights in Game, Especially the Champion

BY EDWARD J. NEIL Associated Press Staff Writer NEW YORK, Aug. 16, (AP)—Young Bill Stribling is back from Europe with Phil Scott's scalp dangling from his belt and a gleam in his eyes that bodes no good for the rest of the heavyweights who think they can fight some.

Travelling alone, a young man of 25 who has suddenly developed a punch and a desire to use it on all the heavyweights he can reach, the curly-headed Macon boy came in on the liner Aquitania yesterday with an English brindle bull up "Scrap" and a bad left hand as mementoes of his conquest of the British champion.

Bill would like to get rid of the injured paw but nothing could pry him away from the bull pup, an infuriating little fellow four weeks old, gift of a British admirer. The bad hand, broken in three places five months ago in a match with Pietro Corri in Tampa, Fla., will keep young Stribling out of the heavyweight picture he dominates for the next six weeks at least. Although the breaks have healed, the hand is so tender that injections of novocaine were necessary in both his one-round knockout in Chicago of Otto Von Porat and his two-round victory over Scott. Once the hand is right again, Stribling is ready to fight any man in the world.

"I had a great time," Stribling announced in his slow southern drawl as he sat on the bed in his stateroom while the liner slowly crept up the bay from quarantine. "I wish Scott could have been a better fighter but that couldn't be helped. "I knew I was going to knock him out in two rounds just like I told you before I left. I'm punching harder than ever before in my life. I'm heavier. I'm old enough now so I feel that I can slug it out with any heavyweight in the game. That goes for Jack Sharkey, Primo Carnera and Max Schmeling. I've been boxing 9 1/2 years and now I'm going to do some fighting. "Boy," he added with a grin as he started a general routine house. "you may not realize it but you're looking at a tiger. When the riot was over the good-looking southerner, one of the nicest youngsters in the fight game, got back to his discussion of the heavyweights. "First, I want to fight Sharkey," he said. "I'll knock him out the next time we meet even though he did send me a nice cable of congratulations after my match with Scott. Carnera is tougher than most of you think and I'd like another shot at him. Both Sharkey and Carnera I believe are better heavyweights than Max Schmeling, the champion. In my first fight I'd like to go back to Chicago for Nate Lewis, the promoter who gave me the chance to meet Von Porat. I may tackle Tuffy Griffiths there. "Scott wasn't much to look. I was careful, every time I belted him in the body, to take a careful sight before I let the punch go. I knocked him down three times with body punches and twice with shots to the head. There wasn't the faintest cry of foul. Scott hit me on the nose with a left jab, the first punch and made me so mad I hit him harder than I ever socked any one before."

## SIR THOMAS ON AMERICAN SOIL FOR 61ST TIME

In High Good Humor as Reception Committee Extends Welcome

NEW YORK, Aug. 16, (AP)—Sir Thomas Lipton came to America today for his fifth attempt to win the America's cup, announcing if he failed this time he would "try again" as soon as possible.

In high good humor, the 51-year-old merchant and yachtsman was taken from the Levizhan at quarantine onto the city tug Macom and brought up the bay with all the fanfare of a hero's welcome. It was Sir Thomas' sixty-second visit to the United States, but the first time he had been given an official welcome.

As he phrased it, when he was greeted by former police commissioner, Grover Whalen, head of the mayor's reception committee, "this is the first time I have ever been taken off a ship by the police."

He said in the Shamrock V, he had a yacht capable of winning the emblem of international yachting supremacy.

Sir Thomas asked who would be his rival skipper in the forthcoming race starting September 13, and was especially eager to find out whether it would be Charles Francis Adams, secretary of the navy, who as his last opponent, sailed the Resolute to victory over the Shamrock IV in 1929.

Sir Thomas appeared in good health, although he had been ill before starting the ocean trip. He was dressed in a blue suit of nautical cut with a black yachting cap.

## TIME AT HAND FOR BRUINS TO STRIKE BLOW

With Two-Game Margin They Should Start March to Flag

If the Chicago Cubs are going to win the National league pennant again this season, the time is at hand for them to strike the deciding blows of the battle. The Cubs are in a fine position today to settle the matter for once and for all, having scored a thorough triumph over their closest rivals, the Brooklyn Robins, by winning three of the four games of the series which ended yesterday.

By virtue of their 4 to 2 victory in yesterday's 10 inning struggle which closed the series, the Cubs are out ahead by two full games.

### Taylor Breaks Tie

The final struggle which put the Cubs into their commanding position was all that could be expected of two teams that were fighting for the top. From start to finish it provided one thrill after another for the overflow crowd of 45,000 and it ended in a blaze of glory for Danny Taylor, substitute outfielder, who

broke up the struggle in the tenth inning with a drive into the crowd standing in the outfield.

While the two leading contenders were mauling each other about in Chicago, the New York Giants came up into a position menacing to either one of them by trouncing the Cincinnati Reds, 5 to 0, for their fifth victory in six games.

### American Washed Out

With the entire American league schedule washed out by the rain it remained for the

elder circuit to supply all the day's baseball news. Philadelphia and Pittsburgh divided a hard-fought double header. The Phillies took the first clash, 7 to 5, as Fred Brickett, a former Pirate, walloped two singles and a triple and scored three runs. Pittsburgh went 10 innings for a 3 to 2 triumph in the second.

The St. Louis Cardinals picked up their winning streak where Boston broke it Thursday, defeating the Braves, 8 to 4. Home runs by Hafey and Watkins featured the game.

## Juniors to Have Billiard Tourney
