## GIANTS WIN FIVE GAMES TO GAIN LEAD

### Split Double Header On Sunday With Cards; Lack Half Game

Noted for their strong finishes, the New York Giants have climbed in the National League pennant race.

The Giants were a half game behind the second place Brooklyn Robins and only three games behind the league leading Chicago Cubs after Saturday's games. The Giants won 22 out of 32 games in the last month.

Win Five Straight

"They" extended their straight winning streak to five games in the first half of yesterday's twin bill by pounding Wild Bill Harkness of the Cards and three successors for 17 hits and a 13 to 4 victory. A seven run rally in the sixth settled the matter. Burleigh Grimes turned the tables in the second game and the Cards won 14 to 4.

Chicago and Brooklyn turned in single victories to gain a half game on the Giants and continue their race 2 1/2 games apart. The Cubs had difficulty with the humble Phillies but took advantage of their one opportunity when Earl Colard developed a streak of wildness in the eighth. The Cubs then scored two runs to win, 5 to 4.

The loss of Charley Grimm, injured Saturday, did not prove serious as Lester Bell filled in with three hits in three times at bat and drove in two tallies.

Vance Harris Shouted

The Robins played a home game against Pittsburgh and sent out Dazzy Vance to enter into the flatbush fans. He fanned nine and hurled an eight hit shutout. The score was 5 to 0.

The Boston Braves supplied Cincinnati's fans with enough thrills for a world series in a double header between the two clubs headed deep in the second division. The Braves barely edged out a 4 to 3 victory in the first game, then went 13 innings in the nightcap to win, 9 to 5, as 27 players, eleven of them pitchers, strove for a victory.

Tiger Upset Senators

Washington's attempt to overhaul the Philadelphia Athletics in the American League pennant chase was halted yesterday after the Senators had taken six straight games. Detroit's Tigers staged an uprising in the first two innings and scored eleven runs to win by a 15 to 1 count.

Babe Ruth and Charley Ruffing gave the New York Yankees a ten inning victory over the Chicago White Sox, 5 to 7, in the first half of a double bill, but the Sox came back behind Red Faber's pitching to win, 6-1, in a second game which was stopped by rain after five innings. Ruth clouted his 44th home run in the seventh inning to tie the score, then made the winning run in the tenth or Ruffing's pinch single.

With the Athletics and St. Louis idle, Cleveland made the day's only important American League game and remained in fourth place 3 1/2 games behind the Yankees. The Indians won both games from the Boston Red Sox with a pair of effective pitching feats, 3 to 2 and 2 to 6 counts.

## Rosenberg Has Opportunity To Become Big League Star

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18. (AP)—Every rookie dreams of the day when he will be a headliner under the big baseball tent of the major league. A few succeed, more fail.

Harry Rosenberg, young Jewish outfielder who went up to the New York Giants after three months of professional ball with the San Francisco Missions, is or recruit who will be given every chance to make good. A few million Jewish citizens of the big city have waited long for one of their decent who could step up to the plate and belt out home runs, a la Babe Ruth.

John McGraw, Giants manager, thought his trouble over when he picked up Andy Cohen, second baseman, but that young man failed to click. While he played, however, the turnstiles hummed from increased attendance. Money talks in any language and McGraw never has been accused of not being a good interpreter. Therefore, when he heard that a 21 year old youth, whose name was Rosenberg, was pounding the apple around a .400 clip out in the Pacific Coast league, he promptly laid out \$40,000 cash and players.

Rosenberg is far from being the greatest prospect to graduate to the majors but certainly he is one of the most fortunate. From sand lot ball to the New York Giants in a few months is considerable of a jump. Such is the magic of a name, necessarily coupled with some ability. It was a windfall for the Missions and a golden opportunity for Rosenberg who will be tutored by one of the greatest leaders the game has had.

In his first letter home, young Rosenberg unknowingly reveals why Mr. McGraw was so anxious to obtain his services. He says in part:

"This is some town alright. I never saw so many Jewish fans in all my life. I'm going over big with them and they wait after the game, thousands of them to look at me. It is a lot different up here. We have to punch the clock in the morning before 10 o'clock and McGraw comes out just when the game starts and runs the club with a white collar. What a man. You can hit two or three over the fence and he won't look at you but make the least "boner" and he will haul you out. They (the players) have to answer 'yes sir and no sir'."

## COOPER WINS IN ST. PAUL

ST. PAUL, Aug. 18. (AP)—Once again "Light Horse" Harry Cooper comet of the fairways, has definitely established himself as a power to be reckoned with in the realm of golf.

The diminutive Chicago professional, one of the game's great stars of yesterday, stepped up another rung on the comeback ladder yesterday by conquering a brilliant field with par shattering golf to win St. Paul's first \$10,000 open championship over the wind-tossed Keller county course.

280 for 72 holes

To accomplish his triumph, Cooper toured the 72 hole stretch in 289 strokes, eight under par, and three strokes better than his closest rival, Tony Manero of New York. It was one of the smartest cards the game has ever known.

A sensational 31, five strokes under par, on the second hole holes of his third round, pushed the dashing caballero over the top. He took a 37 on the outward trip of the round for an 18 hole total of 68 strokes that gave him a one stroke lead over Manero, which he stretched two more strokes with a fine 70, two better than par, on his final round.

Horton Smith finished third with a 285 total. The renowned New York professional finished the three quarter mark seven strokes behind Cooper but ended with a 68 that brought him the \$1,500 third place money. Manero's score netted him \$7,000. Walter Hagen landed fourth with a 286 score.

Gene Sarazen, New York professional finished in a fifth place deadlock with Charles Lacey, the young Briton from Clementon, N. J., who upset the National open field at Interlachen by tying Bobby Jones at the end of the second round. Each scored 288.
