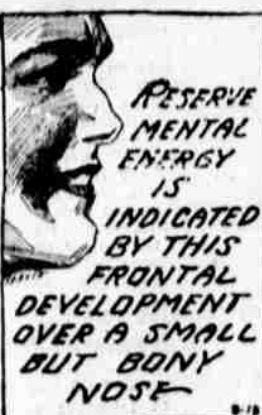


## NEWS IN BRIEF

## AT THE PELICAN

"Shadow of the Law," William Powell's new picture, opened a two-day run at the Pelican theatre last night, and it made a sensational hit from the start. It is one of the strangest, most surprising melodramas that Powell has ever played in, and when one con-

siders "Streets of Chance," and the thrilling S. K. Van Dine murder mystery in which he carried the lead roles, that's saying a whole lot.

Powell in "Shadow of the Law" is a new Powell, stronger, more forceful, more winning. Perhaps it is because the plot gives him so much opportunity for the exercise of his compelling personality. The character wins friends from the start, and sympathy mounts with the thrills in ever increasing crescendo until the happy ending.

Powell, a young engineer, is tricked by a scheming woman, convicted of a murder which he didn't commit, sent to prison, and after three years escapes. From then on, his life is one of hide and seek, hiding from the law, seeking the woman who can prove his innocence. Things are complicated by Powell's romance with a wealthy girl from whom he hides his secret. Then, the black-mailing woman finds him out, and, in order to escape her clutches, he is forced to betray himself. But this is not the end. Powell is resourceful, and, in one heroic scene, he wipes out his past and frees himself to claim happiness with the girl he loves.

## AT THE PINE TREE

Barking dogs and bare-knuckle fights, hair-trigger situations and hair raising suspense, all woven into a real drama of the old west combine to make "The Fighting Legion," Universal-Ken Maynard picture, now showing at the Pine Tree theatre, one of the most gripping and stirring westerns ever produced.

Maynard outdoes himself in this smashing picture, based on a real life chapter in the history of the Texas Rangers. He plunges over embankments into rivers, has rough and tumble fights against odds and again displays that horsemanship which stamps him as an outstanding western star.

Romantic interest is furnished by beautiful Dorothy Dwan, who is delightful as the girl whose love Maynard captures when he cleans up a typical "bad town" of the old west. Excellent, robust comedy is provided by Les Bates, Charles Whittaker and Bill Nestell, the three singing "Hook Brothers" and by Frank Rice as "Cloudy Jones," Maynard's pessimistic pal.

Pictures of the class of "The Fighting Legion" are never tiring, and Maynard seems to possess a peculiar knack of being able to maintain a breakneck action throughout a story without allowing the speed to detract from the story itself. The picture has many scenes that establish it as genuinely western, notably the sand storm with which it opens.

Others supporting Maynard are Harry Todd, Ernest Adams, Stanley Blystone, Jack Fowler, Bob Walker and the ever-courageous "Tarzan," Maynard's champion trick horse.

## AT THE LIBERTY

HOOT GIBSON lives up to his old reputation for riding slambang into all sorts of entertaining trouble in "Trigger Tricks," his latest western action picture for Universal, which opened at the Liberty theatre Sunday.

## Mt. Shasta Alpine Club Sponsors Trip To Mountain Top

Sponsored by the Mt. Shasta Alpine club, a party of more than 130 people from Mt. Shasta city, Dunsmuir, Yreka, Ashland and Klamath Falls started the arduous climb of Mt. Shasta on Saturday afternoon. Six Klamathites left this city on an early train Saturday morning and joined the rest of the party at Mt. Shasta city.

Those in the party from this city were Margaret Taylor of Massachusetts, who is visiting her family at 1425 Pacific terrace; James P. Floyd, A. A. Austin, Mrs. McKenzie, Don M. Chambers and Omond J. Hauke.

On Saturday afternoon the mountain climbers hiked from Mt. Shasta city to the horse camp at the timber line of the mountain, an elevation of 8,000 feet. They spent the night there, and started were made up the mountain from 2 a. m. until late in the morning. Out of the approximate 135 that

started the climb only about 40 reached the top to register.

From the horse camp to the top of the peak is only about four miles, but it is hard going over shale, gouged ice and snow fields. It required about five hours and a half steady climbing to cover this last four miles.

According to a report from one of the climbers who made the trip, the thermometers registered one degree below zero at the peak.

The elevation of Mt. Shasta is 14,380. The Mt. Shasta Alpine club is making plans for another climb during the month of August.
