Judge W. C. Steel, Father Of Crater Lake, Honored Friday

Program Recalls Historic Trip of Farmer Lad to Oregon in Search of the Gem of the Cascades; Dream Fulfilled.

CRATER LAKE, Ore., Aug. 19. (Special)—In 1870, a young farmer lad, while attending school in southeastern Kansas, chanced to read a short item in the newspaper which was used to wrap his lunch, telling of a wonderful lake with an island in the center of the great crater, that had been discovered in Oregon.

The young man read and reread the article several times and then decided to go west, find the lake, and cross to the island and eat his lunch in the extinct crater. With this determination firmly in his mind he reached Oregon in 1872, and began to seek for the lake. For several years the search was without results.

Gets First View—In 1881 Mr. Steel met Mrs. C. B. Watson of Ashland, who had seen the lake, and finally, on August 15, 1885, Mr. Steel, with a party of companions, obtained the first sight of the lake. As he and his companions viewed the lake he determined that it was his responsibility to save the lake for future generations. For 17 years Mr. Steel spent his time and much money to save the lake for the people, and finally succeeded in his efforts, as President Roosevelt signed the bill creating the national park on May, 1902.

Early the next season a party of about 30 men were sent to the lake to make an investigation, and at this time the first boat, the Cleetwood, was launched, and from this boat the soundings of the lake were made.

Later Judge Steel devoted his efforts to secure a system of roads for the park, and after a long series of struggles his efforts were rewarded, and now his wish, a rim road within sight of the lake, has been authorized.

Knowing all this, the friends of Judge Steel arranged a program at the community house last Friday evening in honor of his first coming to the lake. The program consisted of a short talk by Judge Steel and several musical numbers. At the conclusion of the program the judge was presented with a typewritten table by his numerous friends.
