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CORONER JURY PLACES BLAME ON THOMPSON

Evidence Points to Too Much Speed When Car Struck Glasco

A coroner's jury returned a verdict that George L. Thompson of Altamont Acres was exceeding the speed limit at the time his car struck Roy Glasco on South Sixth street, Saturday night, following an inquest held over deceased's body last night. No testimony was given by Thompson.

Frank and John Uhrin, both brothers-in-law of Glasco, who were eye-witnesses to the tragedy, gave damaging testimony to Thompson while on the stand.

Was Behind Glasco
Frank Uhrin stated he was accompanying Glasco across the street to their car after they had called on a friend at the Clark hotel, and that his brother-in-law was walking with his head down, talking, when he (Uhrin) noticed Glasco's car approaching and called out a warning to Glasco, who was walking slightly in front of him.

Uhrin said Glasco glanced up and just at that instant the car struck him.

According to his testimony the car was traveling between 40 and 50 miles an hour, and he heard no horn nor did he hear any brakes applied before his companion was struck, but he distinctly heard the compact of Glasco's body against the car.

Says Speed 40 Miles
John Uhrin said he was sitting in the car waiting for the two men when Thompson's car passed; he saw his brother in the street but could not see Glasco until after the car struck him and dragged him a short distance before the body fell to the pavement. He also judged the speed of the car at 40 miles an hour, and was certain that the driver did not apply his brakes until after it struck the man in the street. He estimated that Glasco's body was dragged about 50 feet.

In estimating the speed of the car which crashed into Glasco, Grady Johnson was an important witness, since he had stopped in the process of making a turn into Broad street. He estimated the speed of Thompson's car as between 25 and 40 miles an hour, and said he noticed when the brakes were applied on the other car, the back end swerved about 10 feet, which would have part of the brake had not caught right.

Ambrose Testifies
Keith Ambrose, chief of police, and one of the first to arrive at the scene following the accident, quoted figures made while testing Thompson's car Monday afternoon, to find out its facility for stopping. In company with Walter Foster, he tried the car's blackout paving and stated it skidded about 30 feet when brakes were applied at a speed limit of 25 miles an hour, and on concrete paving the skid marks measured 45 feet at the same speed. He estimated that the skid marks at the scene of the accident measured 84 feet.

Dr. George H. Merryman, who examined Glasco at the Hillside hospital after he was struck and who performed the autopsy on the body Monday, stated that cerebral hemorrhage caused by a fractured skull was the cause of death. He described the minor abrasions on the body, but said none of them would have proved critical.

Testimony Differ
Hugh Currin, who was driving down South Sixth street and passed the scene of the accident shortly before it occurred, was called to the stand and gave the only evidence at the inquest which was in Thompson's favor.

Currin said he had planned to turn into a service station and was watching a car back of him. He said he was traveling slowly and judged this car was going about the same speed, since it came no closer. However, he did not watch it constantly, since he changed his mind about turning and could not be sure that it was the same machine which struck Glasco.

Patrolman Coons was the only other witness to take the stand. His testimony was similar to that given by Chief Ambrose.

The inquest was conducted by Earl Whitlock, coroner, and Harry D. Bolvin, deputy district attorney.

The coroner's jury was composed of Gus Eckman, Charles Riley, W. J. Kennett, C. L. Roberts, John Kenney and Ed Bloomington.

Glasco died at the hospital about 4 o'clock Sunday morning without regaining consciousness.
