## JACKSON AND KENTWORTH ALL SET FOR BOUT

### Whole Card Looks Like Give and Take From Sound of Gong

The return match between Steamboat Jackson and Jack Kentworth has plenty of color. The thing the fans like is giving the home boys a chance, and that is what is being done on tonight's card.

Take the case of Steamboat Jackson. Arthur is just 22, and came to Klamath Falls a little over a year ago. A novice in the fight game, he had many preliminary bouts, always holding his own. Not a fast thinker, and the type that improves slowly, he has worked hard, and in his last three fights he won via the knockout route.

Steamboat battled Jack Breedlove in the main event at Chillicothe, and it can be authentically stated that it was some fight, and to climax it, Steamboat knocked the pride of Beng cold in the middle of the tenth round.

Dempsey Praised Swede  
Then on the Dempsey card, Jackson was matched with Red Barkus, a youngster who had the sports scribes of Portland talking about his good bouts. Well, the Swede stopped him in three rounds, and Jack Dempsey praised him for his clean-cut workmanship. Then the match with Kentworth. This Portland youth, fresh from a long string of victories in the north, was expected to take Steamboat by the fifth round. He had just battled Frisco McGale, colored sensation, veteran of 200 fights, and still a top-notch, and what a punelling this Kentworth gave Austin Bishop's prize stable boy. He had him in a bad way at the finish.

Then came the memorable battle here. Kentworth thought he had a soft one and just played along for six rounds, winning nicely. But the Klamath Falls youth was not wearing down like he was supposed to and suddenly cut loose with some blows to Mr. Kentworth's midriff that made that young gentleman take stock of the situation. But he had played along too long and the Swede had raised the upper hand in the fight and from there on it was plain to be seen that Jack would be lucky to stay the ten rounds. Had Jack not knocked Steamboat's teeth loose he might have gotten by, but that tap made the Swede fighting mad and he went in for all he was worth. At the end of the sixth Kentworth went down for the count and the gong saved him. Coming back in the 9th he attempted to stage a rally but Jackson was going too good and in one of the most thrilling rounds ever seen here, one that had the fans on their toes, the pride of Klamath Falls knocked the Portland boy cold.

Kentworth Seeks Return.  
The cry from Portland was for a return match. Dutch Schwambot, Kentworth's manager, begged for a return fight. He wanted to stage it in Portland but Tex got on the job and had it staged here. Kentworth wants a chance at Andy Divrod and his showing here tonight will tell the tale.

When you put two boxers who have exhibitions in the ring you are bound to see action. It isn't like showing a washed up veteran who just takes a match for the money and figures it is just another fight. There isn't a bout on tonight's program with a veteran on it. All youth and boys who try to please.

"Ladies and gentlemen, Brown and Jones is the battery for the local club. Smith and Sullivan for the visitors, and as usual the umpire will slightly favor the home team!" was an old-time announcement that some of the humorous umpires used to shout to the grandstand.

But there was more of an element of truth in it than the spectators imagined. The umpires in old days literally had to favor the home team as a matter of self-protection.

When I broke into baseball twenty years ago, it was an accepted fact among ball players that you receive the worst of the umpiring on the road. Even the umpires acknowledged it.

Even the players themselves were not safe. As late as 1913 the Giants were mobbed in Philadelphia and a crowd of several thousand fans chased them from the ball park to the depot. John McGraw, himself, was only saved from serious injury by a feminine fan who shielded him and herself from rocks and sticks by carrying an opened umbrella over their heads.

Often the hapless umpire was chased right into his own hotel and assaulted in the lobby or in his room.
