MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, Aug. 20, (AP)—Egg values continued firm today following Tuesday's advance. Top grades were almost at a premium with the supply scarcely ample.

The butter market was about steady with receipts light and demand limited.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

"First arrivals of Dillard, Oregon, catamounts met with excellent demand at prices about 50 per cent above the current selling values of Yakima cats. Carloads will move from Dillard in a few days.

"Peaches were a bit stronger today, especially for Elbertas. This is a between-season period for Elbertas, with present offerings representing the last of the California crop, and Yakima not expected for a few days yet.

"Good green corn is higher at \$1.00-1.25 per sack of 60 bushels. Movement of fresh produce from the Walla Walla-Milton district reached very heavy proportions yesterday, with some 60 cars. A family basket quality grade is being shipped this year due to shippers withholding their tradings until a fair degree of maturity is attained."
