Laura Vitray, First of Her Sex to Win This Post on a Metropolitan Daily, Finds "Orders" Aren't Needed!

By Julia Blanshard (NEA Service Writer) NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—Gotham is being introduced to the first woman ever to hold down the city editor's desk in a large metropolitan newspaper.

Meet Laura Vitray, city editor of the New York Evening Graphic! She is not a feminist who feels that all women are winning a victory by having one of their sex elevated to a position of such authority. She isn't even high hat about having won the distinction for herself.

"What is the difference whether a woman or a man has a job, just so it is done well?" is her attitude. A slender woman in her early thirties, with dark bobbed hair, a rather gentle manner, pleasant voice and very feminine clothes, she has a bit of the aloof student look as she bends over her desk working, but a quick understanding manner brings attention, and you engage her attention, and as a merry smile as ever warmed any office give you indications of her genuinely comradely spirit.

Enjoys Her Work. "I don't know how I happened to be lucky enough to be made an editor," she said, with an easy little laugh. "I only know I wanted to be badly enough and so far am enjoying it tremendously."

Sitting at her desk looking over the latest edition, with the huge room filled with men—men reporters grinding out stories, men artists finishing layouts, men on the copy desk writing headlines, men phoning in about the latest murder or love scandal—Mrs. Vitray seemed peacefully impersonal and utterly unconscious of the novelty of being the first woman in her position.

"Do men take orders readily from a woman editor?" I asked her. "Or do they resent her authority?" "Orders?" she repeated, then hurriedly answered: "I don't order anybody, I don't have to. Everybody is so interested in his own work there is a marvelous feeling of co-operation. They all are doing everything to make it easy for me."

Mrs. Vitray came to the Graphic last September from the staff of the Columbia School of Journalism.

Her Graphic job was also an innovation. She was put on the copy desk, the only woman, so far as is known, to edit copy and write heads for a large paper.

"I loved the copy desk," she told me. "It is the closest thing to a gambling game I know. It requires the gambling spirit to take a 'story' that is handed to you and choose that part of it."

NEW YORK, Aug. 21. (AP)—Tommy Armour, golf professional, technically is without a wife today as a result of a supreme court decision granting his first wife a divorce and declaring invalid his marriage to Estelle Andrews.

Mrs. Consuelo Carrera Armour, in her suit named Estelle Andrews, as co-respondent. She and Armour were married after Armour had obtained a Mexican divorce two years ago. The decree nullifies the Mexican divorce and declares he can not marry again without consent of the New York supreme court.

Armour's marital difficulties have lasted several years. After his Mexican divorce, his first wife sued him for \$270,000, but out-of-court settlement was made. The supreme court decree gives his first wife custody of Thomas Armour, Jr., seven, and awards her \$250 a month alimony.
