PORTLAND, Aug. 21. (AP)—Butter and butterfat prices took another advance at the Portland Produce Exchange today. Butterfat went up 1c to 35c delivered Portland, butter extras stepped up 1c to 35c, standards 1c to 37c, prime firsts 1c to 36c and firsts 2c to 34c. Receipts of butter are reported lighter and coolers have been called on to supply the demand.

Egg prices were fairly steady with supply ample for all needs. The cantaloupe prices declined with heavy receipts from Yakima.

Good green corn is scarcer at \$1.25 per sack of six dozen ears. The first Medford peas, of quality said to be superior to any others, have reached the market.

Market peaches are reported scarce, and many Lovells are being sold for home-canning.

MILK: Butterfat can higher; raw milk (4 per cent), \$2.80-2.90 cwt., delivered Portland, 2.40 cwt.; grade B milk, \$2.55. Butterfat delivered in Portland, 38c.

CHANGES: Fairly steady, unchanged. SUGAR (sacked basis): Steady. Cane, fruit or berry, \$1.40 per cwt.; beet sugar, \$1.50 cwt.

WHEAT: Family, delivery prices: Steady. Family patents, 49c, \$4.40 whole wheat, 49c, \$5.50; arhus, 49c, \$5.50; bakers' hard wheat, 98c, \$6.20; bakers' Rimeston patents, 98c, \$6.40; pastry flour, 49c, \$5.50.

Motor Association Made Agency for Coast Air Service

Wednesday the Klamath Falls branch of the Oregon State Motor association was appointed an agent for Coastwise and Transcontinental air travel. According to Earl T. Reynolds, manager of the local branch, word has been received to this effect from J. E. Shelton of Portland, manager of the state association.

Authentic information may now be had and reservations may be made locally for travel over the Varney Air lines and Boeing Air Transport lines, extending from Portland to Chicago, via Boise, Salt Lake City and Omaha. Over the Pacific Air Transport coastwise system extending from Seattle to San Diego via Portland, Oakland and Los Angeles.

Seven-hour service is offered to Salt Lake City from Portland and two and one-half hour service to Chicago from this point. One hour and a half service is offered from Portland to the Puget sound section. Eleven-hour coastwise service, Seattle to San Diego. This combination of air transportation offers nearly 20,000 miles daily. In the past it has been necessary for local people to write to some distant point for information regarding air travel and in most cases even then to the wrong places for information wished.

THAT IS ODD
