PLANE CRASH FATAL TO TEN

Klamath Contractors To Build Eleven Miles of Grade

FINISH FIRST UNIT IN EIGHT MONTHS

Guthrie Company Letting Contracts on Balance Of 88 Miles

Two immense gas shovels will bite the dirt of Tule lake early Monday morning and the Great Northern will have its first taste of California soil. The Johnson Brothers company of Klamath Falls have been awarded the contract for grading eleven miles of the route in the Tule lake district, several miles south of Malin, and are already shipping carloads of equipment to the location in preparation for the event which will be realization of Jim Hill's dream.

FAMILY FEUD STILL BREWS

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22, (AP)—The controversy which has raged between Almee Sample McPherson, evangelist, her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, and officials of Angeles Temple, continued today with Mrs. Kennedy announcing through a nurse at her sanitarium that she is not connected in any official capacity with temple affairs.

Plans of a "committee of four" from the temple to confer with Mrs. Kennedy and present her an ultimatum to cease discussing affairs publicly, met with failure when a nurse refused the committee entrance.

Mrs. Kennedy also sent word she would see no one "but the head of the temple," her daughter.

Klamath Potatoes On Way to Market

Two Carloads Shipped During Past Week; Prospects Bright for Bumper Crop This Fall.

Two cars of Klamath grown potatoes were shipped out of this city during the past week, the first shipment of the 1930 season. It is estimated that shipping will be heavier this year than in 1929, with between 1,000 and 2,000 cars moving out of Klamath during October and November. Present local storage is not adequate for the enormous crop expected, and even with heavy shipments, storage space will be filled to capacity.

"The condition of Klamath's potato crop at present is excellent," County Agricultural Agent C. A. Henderson, stated today. "Indications are that the average yield this year will be even better than last year, when yields were the largest ever reported."

"It is reasonable to expect that Klamath county will ship 40 to 50 per cent more potatoes this year than last."

Quality of the potato crop this year is excellent. In some of the fields the vines are beginning to show maturity, and it is believed that in these advanced fields harvesting will start shortly after October 1. However, the general harvest will probably not start until October 15. There will be some shipments to markets during September, and already two cars have been shipped out of Klamath Falls.

The general price situation is better for potatoes than for any other farm enterprise at this time. The United States estimate on potato production is (Continued on Page Thirteen)

BRIGANDS LOOT CHINESE TOWN

Slay 500 Persons And Hold 800 Others For Ransom

SHANGHAI, Aug. 22, (AP)—A carnival of looting and killing in Hangchow, Western Hunan Province, was reported by Chinese press dispatches today, which said Brigands had slain 500 persons, looted 300 shops and kidnapped 800 persons whom they are holding for ransom.

The press dispatches said the Brigands, numbering more than 3,000, fell upon the virtually defenseless city two weeks ago, and as a result of their fortnight's occupation, the town is practically in ruins.

Leave Looted Town Yesterday, the reports said, the Brigands left Hangchow, taking with them their captives. The bandits were said to be making their way toward the west, and seeking hide-a-ways in the mountains of Eastern Shensi Province.

With the bandit army went practically everything of value (Continued on Page Thirteen)

AIRMAIL PILOT ESCAPES DEATH

BAKER, Aug. 22, (AP)—With a fire burning in the cockpit and one wing burned practically off, Abe Warner, veteran Varney air mail aviator, brought his plane to ground near the municipal landing field and escaped with slight injuries as flames burst forth.

Warner, who suffered a cut above his right eye when the machine struck the ground, said gasoline, from a line leak, began spraying in his face 30 miles from here. He said he was twice nearly overcome by fumes and fire finally broke out in the cockpit and one wing.

Mrs. McCormick Pledges Support of Party in Illinois Fight

MAINTAINS SHE IS STILL DRY, HOWEVER

SCHNEIDER ON WAY TO RECORD

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Aug. 22, (AP)—Eddie Schneider, 18, holder of the junior transcontinental east-west flight record, left Albuquerque at 7:55 a. m. (mt) for Wichita, Kan., after spending the night here. He will stop tonight at Wichita and hopes to complete the flight to New York Saturday and lower the west-east record of 28 hours and 55 minutes.

Schneider's elapsed time from Los Angeles to Albuquerque was seven hours 28 minutes. He lost half an hour in circling to get over the San Bernardino mountains because of his heavy load of gasoline. His magnetic compass also failed him and he was forced to fly by dead reckoning.

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SCIENTISTS OF NORWAY FIND ANDREE'S BODY

Expedition Exploring in Nansen Land Comes Upon Body of Explorer and Remains of Companion; Party Lost Thirty-Three Years Ago.

OSLO, Norway, Aug. 22 (AP)—A thirty-three-year mystery of the Arctic has been solved by the finding on White Island, Firdstjof Nansen Land, of the body of the Swedish balloonist-explorer, August Andree, by a Norwegian scientific expedition.

Andree took off in a balloon from Danae Island, Spitzbergen, in July, 1897, intending to fly to the north pole.

He and his two companions never were seen or heard of again.

The expedition which found Andree's body reported also the finding of the body of one of his companions. Both were fully dressed and well preserved.

The explorer, born in Gretna, October 18, 1854, is believed to have perished within a very short time after the take-off for the north. His companions, K. Frankel Anden, Strindberg, doubtless perished with him, but today's dispatches, coming from the expedition aboard the ship, Brattvaag, did not say which was found with him.

For years there have been periodic rumors the balloon had been found in Siberia and messages purporting to be from Andree had been washed ashore upon northern coasts.

At least two of the victims of the grim north got down safely to earth from the Andree balloon, for the bodies which the expedition is bringing back were found in the remains of a camp which the aeronauts had made on White Island.

Not Far From Pole. White Island is a small body of land about forty miles north of Rudolph Island and one of the northernmost known lands within the Arctic circle.

A report reaching Oslo this evening said that the Norwegian ship, the Brattvaag, which came upon a camp behind a cliff not far from shore.

The log book of the balloon, inscribed "Andree's Polar Expedition," was found in the camp, the dispatches stated. Andree's (Continued on Page 12)

WOMEN RESENT GERARD'S LIST

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22, (AP)—Former Ambassador Gerard's list of 64 men who "rule the United States" was protested here today by the women folk. They objected to his omission of any woman power.

"I am afraid Mr. Gerard's long residence in Germany has rather given him an un-American viewpoint regarding women's contribution to the life of the United States," remarked Mrs. John F. Sippel, president of the General Federation of Women's clubs.

Several refused to accept what they termed the "obvious money magnate basis" of Gerard's opinion of this country's control.

Names of women regarded by women as potent in the nation's welfare were cited.
