

THINK GERMAN AVIATOR HEADS FOR AMERICA

Direction Taken From Iceland Indicates Westward Flight

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Aug. 22 (AP)—The German aviator Captain Gronau took off from Reykjavik harbor at 6:35 o'clock this morning (2:35 a. m. E. S. T.) and his course indicated he was heading for the United States.

When he reached Harkjarkv Wednesday it was reported that he intended flying to America. Later, however, both he and the German government denied this, saying the flier would head back toward the Faroe Islands and then go to Scotland or Norway.

Takes Westward Course—An hour and thirty-five minutes after he took off this morning, Captain Gronau radioed Reykjavik that his position was 65.50 north and 26.20 west. That placed him as traveling west, about midway between Iceland and Greenland.

Aviation Student—Captain Gronau is a student of the German government aviation school at Wargumunde, and early this week left the island of Sylt, on the German north sea coast, in a training flight to Iceland.

After the aviator had landed at Reykjavik he was quoted as saying that he was going to America by way of Frederiksdal, Greenland, where a supply of fuel had been assembled for him.

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, Aug. 22. (AP)—Butter prices remained unchanged on the Portland wholesale market today with some storage withdrawals being made in face of shortage of fresh receipts from the country.

Egg prices also remained the same with good demand for fancy stock. Increased arrivals of understocks were noted.

First Elberta peaches from Yakima were selling to retailers at \$1 to \$1.15 a box.

Tomatoes have declined 5c a box daily this week, with a large volume expected on the market in a few days, according to U. S. D. A. market news report. Yakima cantaloupes were also weak.

Pears were also unsettled with good ungraded local Bartlett's available at 75 cents to \$1.00 a box.

"The manufacturing position seems to have changed very little if at all during the week and evidently is mostly making time. The trade looks for better business after the turn of the month."

"Foreign markets are dull and prices largely nominal, with Merinos firm and crossbreds slightly in buyers' favor."

"Mohair still is very dull, with quotations hardly more than nominal."

Mule Deer of Modoc County Holding Their Own Against Progress of Civilization

ALTURAS, Aug. 22.—In spite of the encroachment of civilization in the form of new railroad lines and road construction, the mule deer of the Modoc country seems to be a little more than holding their own. At least, such is the report of forest service officials and game wardens stationed in this territory, who state that mule deer are more plentiful this year than they have been for the past three or four seasons.

The opening of the deer season in fish and game district No. 13 on the 16th of September, will see at least 5,000 hunters in the Modoc woods, say the forest rangers, and although the fire danger is exceptionally high this year, it is not likely that the Modoc forest will be closed to hunting since a strict system of patrol is maintained by the U. S. forest service in lieu of closing the forest to recreational use.

To Enforce Rules—F. P. Cronmiller, Jr., supervisor in charge of the Modoc forest, however, states that all forest rules will be rigidly enforced and the luckless hunter found without a camp fire permit, shovel and axe equipment or caught smoking away from camp is liable to have his hunting vacation badly spoiled.

In 1929 approximately 1,000 bucks, practically all of the mule deer species were bagged on the Modoc national forest. Forest officials look for an even larger bag in 1930, basing their estimates on the increased number of deer.

These big bucks often dress out over 200 pounds and have a spread of horns more resembling an elk than a true deer. Their range in the northern part of the state is practically confined to Modoc county and adjacent areas in Lassen, Shasta and Siskiyou.

One of the reasons advanced for the increase of mule deer in the extreme northeastern part of the state is the existence of four large game refuges, strategically located within the Modoc forest. Another reason given is the reduction of the bag limit a couple of years ago to one buck, as well as other legislation designed especially for this section.

Migrate Westward—Then, too, the Modoc mule deer country is flanked on the east by the immense semi-desert Nevada ranges which formerly supported a large deer population. Fencing and development in that section, coupled with several years of drought have forced a deer migration westward.

In the South Warner district of the Modoc forest where 15 or 20 years ago Buck mountain was the only locality in which a deer might be bagged, the animals are exceedingly numerous and last season over 120 big bucks were bagged in that section.

Accessible by Auto—All of the mule deer country in this section is accessible by auto, and one can rarely be over five miles from a passable auto road. The recent extensive railroad development in the region seems not to have disturbed the mule deer at all. In fact, the animals may often be seen quietly feeding in plain sight and hearing of railroad trains.

Last fall and winter heavy deer losses occurred by deer crashing into fences along the main Southern Pacific right of way. The railroad, after many conferences with game officials, stopped the loss by the simple expedient of fastening white metal strips to the top wire which had the effect of making the fence visible to the animals, where formerly they
