## CUBS REAGIN MARGIN OVER BITTER RIVALS

### Champs Must Win Rest Of Series to Retain Title Hopes

The struggle for first place in the National League between the champion Chicago Cubs and the ailing New York Giants is back where it started, but the Cubs cannot lose the lead in the current series.

Chicago squared the series with a 12 to 4 triumph yesterday. DeCett left the Giants three games behind the leaders with only two more to play in Chicago. The climax came when Gabby Hartnett clouted his 27th home run of the year with the bases full in the eighth. Charley Root fanned six Giants.

### Giants Lost Nothing

So far as second place was concerned, the defeat cost the Giants nothing. For the Brooklyn Robins took their fifth straight defeat from the Cincinnati Reds, 4 to 1, and dropped to four and one-half games behind first place with three and one-half ahead of the St. Louis Cardinals.

St. Louis gained a game by coming from behind to beat the Phillies, 10 to 4, after giving away a five run lead.

Timely hitting against Tom Zachary, much of it done by Pie Traynor, gave the Pirates a 10 to 3 victory over the Boston Braves. Traynor's three hits drove in four runs.

### Three Leaders Lose

The American league games produced no gains or losses among the leaders as the holders of the first three places in the standings were defeated. But it brought the champion Philadelphia Athletics one game nearer the end of the season without reducing their eight and one-half game lead.

The Athletics took a 7 to 1 trouncing from the Detroit Tigers as Vic Sorrell held them to seven hits and fanned seven batters while Detroit pounded George Barnshaw for all its runs in the first five innings. But at the same time, the St. Louis Browns took a 10-inning decision over Washington by a 4 to 3 count and the Cincinnati Reds won their string of victories to seven by defeating the New York Yankees, 5 to 4.

The Chicago White Sox defeated the Boston Red Sox, 6 to 4. Ted Lyons turned in his 15th victory of the season.

## Fourteen Year Old Boy Takes Shoot Honors

VANDALLA, O., Aug. 23 (AP)—A 14-year-old boy whose iron nerve held steady while his veteran competitors faltered has swept the trapshoot world.

The boy, Alfred Ruffus King, Jr., of Wichita Falls, won the grand American handicap, the greatest honor in trapshooting, here yesterday from a field of 44 of the country's best marksmen.

Young King not only finished with one of the four best scores in the large field, but unperurbed by the eyes of 5,000 spectators, outshot three far more experienced marksmen in the shoot-off of the tie for the championship.

King and three middle-aged Ohioans, J. L. Scott, and Dan Casey of Toledo, and Lawrence H. Crampton of Dayton finished with 27 out of a possible 100 targets to top the field. The youngster broke 24 of 25 possible targets in the shoot-off, while the three men were unable to keep up the pace.

It was the first time in 31 years of tournament that a boy won the championship, and Young King has been shooting only two years. He shot from scratch at the 16-yard line, Casey from 17, Scott from 18 and Crampton from 21.

Mrs. George Peter of Phoenix, Ariz., won the women's championship by breaking 93 targets from the 17-yard mark.

Miss Ravior's victory earned for her first prize money of \$5,000 while \$2,500 went to Mrs. Corsan, a former Denver resident.

## Kaye Don Near Death In Race Car Accident

BELFAST, Ireland, Aug. 23 (AP)—Kaye Don, one of Great Britain's noted motor racers, suffered a broken rib and his mechanic was seriously injured when their car overturned and caught fire in the 410 mile Ulster tourist trophy race of the Royal Automobile club today.

The British driver, who only a few months ago went to America in an attempt to establish a new world's speed record, narrowly escaped death in the crash.

Another accident marred the race over the tortuous ards circuit of thirty laps, when Captain A. C. R. Waite received a severe concussion as his car mounted a bank and overturned.

Thirty-six cars started in the event, driven by experts from Germany, Great Britain and Italy. Three Italians were leading at mid-afternoon in the hair-raising event.

## Wrigley's Free Tickets To Women Starts New Kind of Sex War on Lake Michigan

CHICAGO, Aug. 23 (AP)—There is a new sort of sex war being waged at this end of Lake Michigan. It is over whether women know enough to be allowed alone at baseball games.

It all started because William Wrigley, Jr., owner of the Cubs, has seen fit to hand out 17,500 free tickets to women every Friday.

The men aren't going for the idea at all, judging from the letters they are writing to the Express-Youself columns in the Chicago Daily newspapers. But the women are handing it right back—and are continuing to pack the two top tiers especially reserved for them in the grandstand at Wrigley Field.

### Enthusiastic Fans

Wrigley set out to promote interest among women in baseball. Today the women are the most enthusiastic fans in the grandstand. They cheer lustily, clap and stamp their feet. The men say they screech and applaud whether the home team scores a home run or bats out.

Every age of woman from high school girls to grandmothers can be found in the crowd. Down in front at the Chicago Cubs-New York Giants game yesterday sat a gray-haired old woman peering through her spectacles and holding her false teeth in her hand. She cheered with the rest. Nearby was a woman with a tired old-young face forgetting for the moment that perhaps all was not well. Next to

her was 200 pounds in a flowered chiffon, yelling louder than anyone in her neighborhood.

### Some Take Lunches

And despite no male escorts for entertainment or interpreters the women are having a very good time and did not seem confused. They drank pop, munch ed peanuts and ate sandwiches. Some had brought their lunches.

As for understanding what it was all about—which the men claim they don't—well, every woman questioned said she knew exactly what was happening.

And an usher was overheard to ask a woman, who was pitching.
