TAYLOR'S HOME STEAL GIVES CUBS SERIES

Chicago Now Has Five Full Games Lead in National

By his brilliant work as substitute for "Old Hoss" Riggs Stephenson, young Danny Taylor has just about won himself a regular place in the Chicago Cubs outfield. Taylor, who finished the Cubs' triumph over Brooklyn a week ago by driving in the winning run in the final game, did the same thing in the New York Giants yesterday in a more sensational fashion and put Chicago five full games ahead in the National League pennant struggle with a 2 to 1 triumph.

Taylor stole home in the ninth inning when the score was tied, the bases full, two men out and two strikes on the batter.

Robins Beat

The Cubs' triumph with a bit of rain in Brooklyn which gave the badly-worn Robins a day of rest, added a few more complications to the National League struggle for all the leaders except the Cubs. The Giants dropped a half game, remaining only 1 1/2 games ahead of Brooklyn while the fourth place St. Louis Cardinals placed themselves only one game behind the Robins by winning a double header from the Phillies, 3 to 4 and 6 to 4.

In the clash between two of the league's promising winning streaks at Cincinnati, the Pittsburgh Pirates extended their series of triumphs to seven games by defeating the Reds in the first game, 9 to 8, as Ray Kremer's pitching stopped Cincinnati. Ray Kohn had the better of a dual with Steve Swetlow by a 2 to 0 count, each five hits.

At Memphis Reduced

Opening their new series against the eastern stars of the American League, Washington wonced Philadelphia, 7 to 3, and reduced the leader's margin to 7 1/2 games.

The New York Yankees fell further back in third place as they divided a hard-fought double header with the Cleveland Indians. The Yankees won the first game, 5 to 2, in eleven innings. Wes Ferrell hurled his third victory for the Indians and his eleventh in succession in the second game. Allowing the Yankees only six hits for a 4 to 1 triumph.

The St. Louis Browns checked Earl Whitfield's series of pitching successes at eleven when they pummeled him for 15 hits in eight innings and defeated the Browns, 7 to 2. The Chicago White Sox split a pair of pitcher's battles with the Boston Red Sox. Boston won the first game, 2 to 0 on Milton Gaston's three hit hitting but Chicago gained a 2 to 1 victory in the eleventh inning second clash as Pat Carraway outplayed Eddie Dierham.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 25. (AP)—Wilson Charles, Crow Indian from Haskell Institute, led the field of contestants for the National Amateur Athletic Union Decathlon championship after two of the ten events, the 100 meter dash and the broad jump, had been run off today.

Charles had 1651.05 points, Ernest Utterback, former University of Pittsburgh athlete, was second with 1621.25, and Howard Jones of N. Y. A. C., third with 1542.29. Utterback runner up at this stage, suddenly withdrew at the start of the third event, the shotput. The speedster gave no reason for his decision to quit the grind.

WARNEKE AND O'GRADY BOUT TITLE AFFAIR

Popular Light - Heavies Who Started Here To Give Fans Treat

Gene O'Grady and Frankie Warneke, both of whom started their climb up the fistic ladder of fame in Klamath Falls under the promotion of Joe Bickerstaff, local matchmaker and promoter, will meet for the championship of the northwest in the light-heavyweight division in a Klamath ring on Labor day night, September 1, under the auspices of the local labor unions.

The match has been approved by the city boxing commission and Joe Bickerstaff last night announced that he had signed the fighters. O'Grady, former pride of Ashland, will weigh in at 172, while Frankie Warneke, the Flying Dutchman, now of Portland, will tip the scales at 170.

Warneke recently stopped Roy Smith, Los Angeles sensation, in two rounds in a main event scheduled to go 10 rounds in the Klamath ring.

Gene O'Grady has won his last five starts in Oakland, Cal., where Jack Linkhorn and Max Baer are the pick of the fight fans. Gene just walked into the ring and gave Linkhorn a fine trimming, taking the fight all the way and knocking the favorite down four times in the battle.

Oakland tried to sign O'Grady and Warneke without success. Joe Bickerstaff succeeded, partly because it was he who gave them their start into "the money" when they fought here.

Both have since climbed into the spotlight. But the boys like Klamath and they like Klamath fans, they told Bickerstaff, so they signed for the fight at less money than they might have gotten had they met someone else on Labor day in a larger city.

It will undoubtedly be a whale of a card if there isn't another bout on it—Klamath fans know the main events and they know they can fight and are willing. The Legion arena will be a "sell out" for that night. Bickerstaff has not yet announced when tickets will go on sale.

New Ordinance Given Support Of Dairymen

Dairymen and creamerymen of Klamath county who attended a meeting at the chamber of commerce Saturday afternoon expressed themselves as favorable toward the proposed city "milk" ordinance which is now before the council. It is expected the ordinance will be adopted within a week or two.

The ordinance was discussed paragraph by paragraph with Dr. E. D. Lamb acting as chairman. There was very little criticism and even this had been extinguished by the time the meeting closed.

The only change which was made was lowering the temperature of class A milk from 60 to 50 degrees.

Although the ordinance is adopted this fall, it will not become effective until January 1, and in the meantime the dairymen will concentrate on improving and raising the price of milk sold.

Chicago Fans Given Genuine Baseball Thrill as Cubs Win Final of Series From Giants

CHICAGO, Aug. 25. (AP)—The fan who likes his baseball close and "inside" had his inning yesterday. It was the ninth in the final game of the Cubs-Giants "crucial" series and it ended with Danny Taylor stealing home to give the National League champions a 2 to 2 victory.

With the score tied, two out and the bases full, Taylor started with Joe Heving's pitch and slid under Bob O'Farrell with the winning run. There were two strikes on Guy Bush the batsman and the pitch was wide, but had it been over, Bush would have struck out and Manager Joe McCarthy's strategy would have failed. It didn't however, and the old-timer who tires of home runs and big scores, had his moment.

Thrill of Season

Regardless of what style of baseball yesterday's customers preferred, probably none ever re-lived the greater thrill than the steal which gave the Cubs three victories out of four games with the Giants, and a lead of five games in the National League pennant race.

"It was a natural" Manager McCarthy said of the audacious winning steal. "I knew Bush couldn't hit. It was 100 to 1 shot he wouldn't get the ball out of the infield. Heving goes through a long delivery. Unless he shortens it in the emergency he never could get Taylor at the plate once Dan had a good start on him."

"Heving, out of the corner of his eye, seeing Taylor flash away from third, probably thought it was the usual bluff in an attempt to worry the pitcher. Too

late he realized Taylor wasn't fooling. And he apparently didn't have presence of mind in that moment to shorten his wind-up and pitch wide of the plate."

BETTY NUTHALL NEW AMERICAN TENNIS CHAMP

English Girl Favorite Of Forest Hills Court Patrons

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 25. (AP)—Betty Nuthall, 20-year-old British girl with a smile famous on two continents and a blistering forehand drive, is the new tennis champion of the United States.

She wasn't considered good enough to have a place this year on the British Wimbledon Cup team and she was a disappointment at Wimbledon, but before an American gallery that has made her its darling, she scored a double triumph in the finals of the National women's championships on the rain-drenched courts of the West Wise tennis club.

Succeeding to the title forfeited by Helen Wills Moody just before the tournament started, Miss Nuthall captured the singles championship by defeating Mrs. Anna Virginia McCune Harper, San Francisco left-hander and fifth ranking American, 6-1, 6-4.

Courts Slippery

Returning to the courts after a heavy downpour and playing on slippery turf through intermittent showers, Miss Nuthall teamed with a 17-year-old American girl, Sarah Fairley of Boston, to win the doubles honors. They came from behind to defeat Mrs. Harper and Edith Cross, also of San Francisco, 3-6, 6-3, 7-5.

For the first time in 43 years, the American woman's singles championship goes abroad in Miss Nuthall's possession, but few victories by homebred stars have been received with any more applause than was Betty's triumph.

Favorite All Week

She was a favorite all week in the tournament, with Mrs. Moody out of the competition, and she completed her march of conquest in impressive fashion against Mrs. Harper. Except when she staged a strong rally in the second set, leading at one time by 4-2 on games and 30-0 on points, the California woman was outclassed by hard-hit drives.

Mrs. Harper, her mere 116 pounds and slim build a contrast to her rival's size and strength, had neither the service nor the striking battery adequate to combat Miss Nuthall.

The English girl was extended in only one match in the entire tournament. That was in the semi-finals when she defeated Marjorie Morrill, 6-3, 6-4, 5-2.

The Portland Ducks took Los Angeles for a 9 to 6 trouncing, and the Angels were coming back strong in the second game, leading 10 to 2 when it was called in the third to allow the Ducks to catch their train to Portland. Consequently, it was no contest, and the series was divided, three to three.

The San Francisco Seals also ended the week with a six game series, the odd game having been called yesterday morning in the twelfth. Playing Seattle, the Seals won the series, four to two, and defeated Seattle 16 to 9 in a ten inning afternoon game. The morning game score was 6 to 6.

Sacramento pulled into fourth place with a five to two win for the week over the San Francisco Missions. The two teams split a double-header yesterday, the Angels winning 3 to 7 in the morning at Stockton, and the Reds 7 to 1 in the afternoon at Sacramento.
