

MAYOR TO OPEN LIGHT SYSTEM

Klamath Avenue Lights To Be Turned On Saturday

Upon a report from Councilman W. D. Butler that the Klamath Avenue lighting system which has been under construction for the past several weeks would be completed by Saturday night, a motion was passed by the City Council last night to have Mayor T. B. Watters press the button to illuminate the street.

Butler also stated that a committee has been formed of Klamath Avenue property owners, that is making plans for a program to include several short talks, band music, and possibly a street dance. The council was assured that the crews are working hard in order to have all the work completed by that date.

Ready for Poles
The contract for installation of the lighting unit was awarded the California Oregon Power company about the first of June and was sub-contracted to the Link River Electric company, with which Councilman Butler is affiliated. The cable has been laid under the paving on both sides of the street, and six poles on both sides of each block are in readiness for the ornamental poles and fixtures. The unit extends from Second to Eleventh street.

Boundaries Changed
An ordinance was passed to first reading which changes the boundaries of city ward 4. All property abutting on the north-east side of the city which comes into the municipal limits are a result of the special election held August 12 will be added to this ward, thus changing the lines.

Resolution Passed
A resolution was passed fixing September 15 as the date for hearing objections to the proposed assessment roll of improvement unit 34, Hot Springs.

May Condemn Plant
Following a request from officials of the Klamath Heating company that they be allowed to use two boilers in the old building after the new one is erected, the condemning of the plant which is now located on Klamath Avenue was discussed.

Requests Estimates
Councilman Van Camp requested that the city engineer's office provide estimates on the cost of a new fence around the city cemetery and rest rooms. It was reported that the office is now working on a plan of the cemetery which will show the ownership of the lots.

Want Poles Replaced
The matter of having the electric light and telephone poles removed from Main street was again discussed. It was stated by the mayor that the California Oregon Power company has already signified their willingness to remove their poles providing rights-of-way for the electric lines can be secured through alleyways.

Councilman Butler Stated
Councilman Butler stated he discussed the matter with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and learned it would be impossible to remove the telephone poles this year, but the company plans to do so next year.

Committee Appointed
The budget committee will again be composed this year of O. O. Smith, first ward clerk, second ward Harry Politz, third ward J. A. Gordon, fourth ward, and Alfred Collier, fifth ward, according to appointments made last night by the five councilmen. A meeting will be called soon after the first of the month, it was announced.

May Revoke Licenses
Following a suggestion by A. W. Schupp, city attorney, a motion was passed to adopt an ordinance revoking all building permits which were allowed previous to passage of the city zoning ordinance. The city attorney was authorized to draw up an ordinance covering this matter.

Engine Whistle Bother
Fourteen residents of the industrial addition within the council to eliminate the nuisance of O. C. & E. locomotives whistling for the crossings on South Sixth street and Wantland Avenue, especially at night. The city attorney was of the opinion that the council could not issue a restraining order and could not pass an ordinance because the state law says locomotives must whistle at crossings. The matter was referred to the mayor for investigation.

To Sell Lots
The mayor and finance committee were authorized by the council to sell or bargain for sale lots owned by the city on which titles are clear.

Asks Improvement
O. P. Anderson asked the council if the road running east of the government bridge on Main street could be graded and prepared for a layer of crushed rock. Mr. Anderson stated the road is now almost impassable and those residing in the district wish to make repairs before winter. The matter was referred to the street committee and street commissioner.
