LOS ANGELES, Aug. 28, (AP)—A boy's search for adventure in the artificial jungle of Luna Park zoo brought death last night to 12-year old Alfred Hill. The boy was severely clawed by a tiger in the zoo yesterday afternoon. Alfred's injuries at first were thought not to be serious, although the tiger's claws had ripped his arm and scalp deeply. Melvin Koonits, lion keeper at the zoo, shot the big cat as it crouched over its victim's body. Attendants at the zoo said the tiger was so old it had lost all its teeth, else young Alfred might have died almost instantly.

The boy had climbed the high wire fence surrounding the jungle. He was "hunting" with a small knife in his hand when the tiger pounced upon him from a screen of thick brush.
