Midget Car to Be Distributed By Local Firm

The midget Austin cars will be on display beginning today at the Pelican Motors garage, Fourth and Klamath, it was announced yesterday by C. R. McKee, manager, who brought a delivery and two coupes here from Portland Wednesday evening.

The cars will be sold in conjunction with the company's sales of the DeSoto and the Graham cars in the higher price range class.

The Austin is sold here for \$550, on the usual terms for cars, fully equipped and ready for the road. It is the first time this noted little car which has been sold for the past eight years in other places, has been on display or for sale in Klamath.

On the trip to Klamath Mr. McKee made the 476 miles on nine gallons of gasoline. A check of 143 miles of the trip gave a mileage on gasoline of 41 miles to the gallon. The check was regular highway, up and down, curves and straight.

Mr. McKee was highly pleased with the performance and has asked all who have not seen an Austin to visit the display rooms of the company to view them.

Logger Pays For Crime on Gallows

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 29, (AP)—Denying his guilt to the end, Arthur Schafer, young Shelton, Wash., logger, died on the gallows at the state penitentiary here today. The trap was sprung at 4:07 a. m. and he was pronounced dead at 4:21.

Schafer was hanged for the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Kirk in their home near Shelton on the night of September 6, 1928. He shot them down through a window shortly after they had returned from a dance. No motive for the crime was ever established.
