

INDIANS LEND ATMOSPHERE TO BIG ROUND-UP

Over 2000 From Tribes
Of Northwest at
Pendleton

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 29. (AP)—Gay parade, featured by the presence of more than 2000 Indians, thrilling exhibitions of horsemanship and wild west contests of all descriptions inaugurated the twenty-first annual Pendleton roundup here yesterday. The roundup continues today and tomorrow.

The Indians, drawn from the Umatilla, Walla Walla, Denver and Cayuse tribes, included pretty young maidens, husky braves, wrinkled old squaws and stolid old men. Papagoes were there, too, strapped to their mothers' backs or held tightly wrapped in colorful blankets. The men came into the arena with their faces and bodies brightly painted. Many wore huge headpieces, decorated with buffalo horns or feathers, to denote their rank.

Cannon Opens Show

Immediately after the parade into the arena a small cannon fired the American flag high into the air, the flag descending on a small parachute. That was the signal for the spectacular demonstrations that followed.

Girls rode around the arena, standing on their heads while their mounts raced at break-neck speed; others circled over and under their galloping horses and others, in saddles, performed unbelievable acrobatics.

Wrestling was performed. Mable Strickland, champion cowgirl of the world, showed her skill by roping and tying a steer skillfully by roping and tying a steer champion woman bull-dogger, bull-dogged and tied a steer in 25 seconds.

Twenty-nine events were run off, including calf roping, contests, stage coach races, relay races, Indian races, steer roping contests and others. One hundred ninety-six of the world's best riders, ropers and stunters are participating.

All events will be repeated today and tomorrow.

Carnival Opens As Preliminary To Holiday Fete

Preliminaries to Klamath Falls' Labor day celebration started Thursday night with the opening of a carnival on Klamath avenue between Second and Third streets, which is sponsored by the various labor unions of the city.

The carnival consists of a ferris wheel, merry-go-round and whip, and replicas of these in small sizes for tiny children, in addition to the usual amount of side shows and booths, many of the latter sponsored by local stores. Another attraction is a lot containing Shetland ponies where small children may ride.

The show will be conducted five days, and on several evenings dances will be held in the open-air pavilion located at this site.

Last night only a small crowd milled along the brilliantly lighted street between the concessions and listened to the ballroom from the ticket stands, but as the day approaches for the annual celebration by labor, the crowd will grow considerably.

On the night of Labor day, September 1, a boxing card, also sponsored by the labor unions will be held in the American Legion hall with Gene O'Grady of Ashland entering the ring to match with and blows with Frankie Warko of Portland in the main event. Both men feature as main events in larger cities of the coast.

America's Smallest Auto Begins Scooting Through Traffic

BUTLER, Pa.—The new "Bantam" Austin, America's smallest automobile, will soon be seen scooting in and out of the traffic and parking in the spaces left by larger cars, with its initial appearance today.

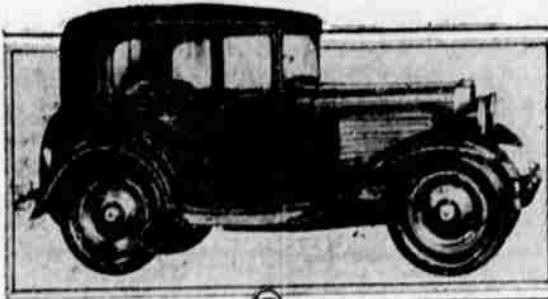
It is the smallest car ever shown, smaller even than the tiny Scripps-Booth that older motorists might recall. Its cost is \$445 at the factory here.

Its appeal, according to its manufacturers, will mostly tend toward the family needing a second or third automobile for

in getting in and out of the machine. It provides for two passengers.

Perhaps most unusual about the car is the tiny motor, a four-cylinder L-head engine about half the size of the regular four now on the market. It develops almost 15 horsepower and is so economical, say its makers, that it will do 40 miles on a gallon of gas and will speed the car up to 45 and 50 miles an hour.

Remarkable about this car is the fact that it is built almost entirely on ball and roller bearings—the crankshaft, transmission shaft and rear axle. It has

shopping purposes, the business man who has to make short runs calls, the small business requiring an appropriate delivery car and the school boy and girl who demand economical transportation that would not take up too much space on the campus.

The Bantam Austin is there for all these, for it has only a 75-inch wheel base, against 103 of the nearest small car, and only a 40-inch tread, against 55 of the average auto.

Copy of English Car

The car that is being shown today throughout the United States for the first time is the American edition of the English Austin. It looks almost like its original, which also has been quite Americanized in appearance, has exactly the same engine and chassis, and the same operating characteristics, but is built entirely in this country.

The car is low, although it has a clearance of 8 1/2 inches, and is rather roomy inside once its or pants get in and settle down. There might be some difficulty, however, for tall or stout people

four-wheel internal expanding brakes and special shock absorbers front and rear.

Cheap to Operate

So light is the car, weighing only 1,130 pounds, that it is declared it will travel from 20,000 to 40,000 miles on one set of tires, while the operating expenses for gas, oil and tires will be less than three-fourths of a cent a mile.

"The little Austin," says A. J. Brandt, president of the American Austin Car company, "is introduced as an auxiliary for every type of automobile."

"Because of its size, weight and ease of operation, the Bantam Austin brings a solution of some of our most urgent traffic and parking problems. Highway experts see in it an important factor that will encourage necessary rather than waste transportation on our roads, for it is clear that motorists who use a five-seated passenger car for two-seated transportation requirements add much to the problem of traffic congestion."
