SUTHERLAND ESCAPES IN DARKNESS

Deadly Aim of Hunted Man Feared by Posses Of Fifty Men

ARMED FORCE TAKES UP MANHUNT TODAY

Machine Guns and High Powered Rifles Added To Equipment.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 30 (AP)—Vic Sutherland, 67, alleged Marcola, Ore., moonshiner, wanted for the murder of Joe Saunders, 37, deputy game warden, and Oscar Dooley, 35, Eugene policeman and deputy sheriff, today was believed hiding somewhere in the fastness of the Mohawk valley. A large posse, armed with high powered rifles and machine guns was combing the hills for him.

Darkness last night brought a halt to the activities of 50 possemen who sought Sutherland throughout Friday. Two men already were dead from bullets said to have been fired by Sutherland, two others were in a Eugene hospital recovering from bullet wounds and the posse feared to face Sutherland's deadly aim in the darkness. Lee Brown and Rodney Roach, deputy sheriffs, were also wounded.

LINER DAMAGED BY OCEAN WAVE

NEW YORK, Aug. 30. (AP)—Captain Reno Rognet of the French liner Paris, arriving today from Europe, told of a 45-foot wave which struck his vessel on Thursday, injuring 40 passengers, 17 of them so severely they required medical treatment.

Mrs. Lillian McDaniel of Seattle, Wash., was the most seriously injured, suffering a broken shoulder. She was taken to a hospital when the ship docked.

Women Bowled Over
The wave broke 60 panes of glass on the promenade deck, uprooted wooden deck stanchions, and swept down the main companion way, bowling over a party of women passengers.

Captain Rognet said the Paris was weathering a 100-mile-an-hour hurricane when the great wall of water struck the vessel amidships on the port side. The ship was 300 miles off New York, between Grand Banks and Newfoundland.

The promenade deck, on which most of the damage was done, is 25 feet above the water line.

Car Crashes Over 125 Foot Embankment

HOOD RIVER, Aug. 30. (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Edmunds and their two daughters and three sons, all of Pendleton, were recovering in a hospital here today when their automobile crashed over a 125 foot embankment near Lindsey Creek on the Columbia highway.

The family were enroute to Salem when the steering gear of their car locked.

Passing motorists took the family to a hospital here. The elder Edmunds suffered a fractured leg. Mrs. Edmunds a broken nose, one girl a broken collar bone and another concussion of the brain. The boys were bruised and cut.

Physicians said all would recover.

FIRE DESTROYS SIX HOP DRIERS

INDEPENDENCE, Ore., Aug. 30. (AP)—Six hop driers on the Grover and John T. Hop ranch, three miles north of Independence, opposite the Kent dance hall, burned down Saturday morning about 10 o'clock. The fire which consumed the six buildings and 100 cords of wood adjacent to the houses lasted about 20 minutes. Fire departments from both Independence and Monmouth responded to alarms, but through lack of water were unable to make headway against the flames. Chemical apparatus saved nearby buildings and prevented a grass fire.

AMUSEMENT CO. HEAD SUICIDES

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30. (AP)—Edwin F. Platt, 55, president of the Lotus Isle Amusement company, was found dead in the office of the island park at midnight. He had been shot through the heart.

At his feet lay a small revolver and on the desk was a note indicating suicide. The note, clipped to a sealed envelope addressed to his wife, Mabel Platt, Portland, said:

"Sweetheart, my Mabel, you know I love you. E. F. Platt; 8:15 p. m."

The body was discovered by Walter McKnight, public relations man in charge of concessions at the park. McKnight, a brother-in-law of the dead man, told authorities he last saw Platt alive when the latter went into his office at 7 p. m. for a rest.

LEGUIA AND SON PLACED IN PRISON

Ex-President of Peru To Stand Trial for Alleged Wrongs

SEVERE PUNISHMENT TO BE HANDED OUT

Lieutenant Grow Also In Line for Court Martial New Chief Says

LIMA, Peru, Aug. 30. (AP)—Augusto B. Leguia, 67-year-old deposed president of Peru, taken from his sick-bed aboard the cruiser Almirante Grau, was placed today in a prison cell on San Lorenzo Isle, Callao harbor, to await trial and punishment for the "misdeeds" of his dictatorship.

His son, Juan Leguia, has been arrested, and was taken to San Lorenzo prison, which is the same in which Sr. Leguia, while president, confined most of his political enemies. Both were placed under strong guard commanded by Lieutenant Alfonso Lloa, one of the men Sr. Leguia imprisoned there. He was released this week.

Lieutenant Colonel Luis M. Sanchez Cerro, new military president of the republic, said severe punishment was contemplated for the former president and others he heads of having misruled the country during his dictatorship.

Sanchez also said Harold B. Grow, American naval reserve officer who has been in charge of the Peruvian air force, would be prosecuted by court martial for his support of Sr. Leguia.

Sanchez accused Lieutenant Commander Grow of being a "mercenary" who has been violating the rules of public right.

In obedience to orders of the overthrown dictator he intended to fly over Arequipa and (Continued on Page Eight)

Columbia Utilities Company Acquires Rural Phone Line

D. O. Hood of Portland, president of the Columbia Utilities company, announced today the purchase by his company of the Tule Lake Telephone company operating exchanges at Merrill and Malin, and serving a wide area adjacent thereto in Klamath county, Oregon, Siskiyou and Modoc counties, California. An announcement was also made of the purchase by the Columbia Utilities company of the Butte Falls & Eagle Point Telephone company. This company operates an extensive local and long distance toll system between Medford and Crater Lake, Butte Falls, Prospect, Eagle Point, Diamond Lake, Fish Lake, Lake of the Woods and surrounding country in Jackson county.

To Extend Properties.
Considerable improvement and extension work will be done Mr. Hood stated. Work has already begun on both projects and will be carried through as rapidly as possible.

The Tule Lake lines are being extended throughout Tule Lake Reclamation district on both sides of the state line, and will also be extended to other surrounding territory within the company's operating area. The Butte Falls & Eagle Point Telephone company recently completed construction of a new metallic line between Medford and Crater Lake National park. A line was also recently extended to Lake of the Woods. This property will also be extended to take in all territory in its operating area, and existing lines will be brought up to modern standards.

Mr. Hood admitted that negotiations are under way for further acquisitions of utility properties in southern Oregon and northern California, but stated that no further announcement could be made in this respect at the present time.

BROMLEY MAY MAKE FLIGHT

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 30. (AP)—Expressing disappointment at the failure of Harold Bromley, pilot, and Harold Gatty, navigator, to lift their plane, the City of Tacoma, from the field at Kasumigaara Japan, Friday, John Buffell, principal backer of the proposed flight from Japan to Tacoma, said he would not oppose a stop in Alaska if such a recourse seems necessary.

"I told them when they left their lives and welfare of their wives and children were the first consideration," Mr. Buffell said. "Any advice I have for them now is the same as then. They may try a two-leg flight to Tacoma, stopping at either Nome or Kodiak, or anywhere else they like. I want them to make the flight if possible, but I want them to come back alive. That's first."

ESPEE FIXES WRECK BLAME

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Cal., Aug. 30. (AP)—Four members of the crew of the Southern Pacific crack train, Lark and Padre, were blamed by a board of inquiry here today for the rear-end collision Thursday in which 25 persons were injured.

The four men blamed were W. E. Smith and V. L. Covington, engineer and conductor of the Lark, and J. McNabb and L. W. Leeman, conductor and flagman of the Padre.

Covington and Smith were blamed for bringing the Padre into the yards ahead of time and for exceeding the 15 mile an hour rule. McNabb and Leeman were found at fault for not protecting the rear of the Padre according to rules.

Wigfall Took Own Life Jury Decides

PORTLAND, Aug. 30. (AP)—A coroner's jury today solved the death of Charles Y. Wigfall, 35, brilliant but eccentric Portland attorney and former Vancouver, Wash., minister, by finding, in its verdict, he had ended his own life.

Wigfall told authorities he had been shot in a scuffle with a robber.

PAYNE TAKES LIFE IN CELL

AMARILLO, Texas, Aug. 30. (AP)—A. D. Payne, Amarillo attorney, who confessed slaying his wife in a devised explosion, ended his own life by the same means early today.

The fatal explosion was believed by officers to have been produced by a vial of nitroglycerin which Payne carried suspended about his neck.

Fellow prisoners in the county jail where the attorney awaited trial for the slaying of his wife were dislodged from their cots. A sleeping cell-mate was uninjured. Payne died lying face down in his cot.

Makes Boast Good
He had frequently boasted he would never stand trial.

Payne's wife was killed and his 11-year-old son maimed by a dynamite bomb which wrecked the family car June 12.

Weeks later he asked Gene Howe, Amarillo newspaper editor, to investigate the case, saying civil authorities were making no progress.

Howe's investigation led to Payne's arrest. He confessed killing his wife because of love for his stenographer, Miss Veronica Thompson. He confessed to four previous attempts to end his wife's life.

They were college sweethearts.

EPITHET WINS \$60,000 PURSE

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., Aug. 30. (AP)—Gifford A. Cochran's Epithet, victorious in his only start this year, today won the \$60,000 Hoppeal, defeating Geo. D. Widener's heretofore undefeated Jamestown by a nose. Jos. E. Widener's Novelist was a nose back for third money. Fifteen started.

Epithet, with a 13-pound pull in weights over Jamestown, which picked up the crushing impost of 130 pounds, covered the six and one-half furlongs in 1:17 3-5, just three-fifths of a second slower than the world's record.

The defeat was Jamestown's first of the year in five starts.

He went to the post well-backed favorite at odds of 7 to 5.

FLIER READY FOR SEA HOP

ROOSEVELT FIELD, L. I., Aug. 30. (AP)—Russell Boardman, piloting the monoplane "American Legion 1930," in which he hopes to fly the Atlantic to Dublin, Ireland, and back, hoped for Boston at 1:13 p. m. today.

Boardman's plane is a Bellanca, with a 200-horsepower motor. He indicated he would not fly from Boston for a week or ten days.

SIVERTSEN DENIES HE RETRACTED

Owner of Sealing Ship Says Capt. Jensen's Story True

BELIEVES ANDREE'S EXPEDITION FOUND

Untrue Stories Not Entered In Log of Any Ship, Skipper States

TROMSOE, Norway, Aug. 30. (AP)—A. Sivertsen, owner of the sealing vessel Terningen, today denied emphatically reports published in Copenhagen that Skipper Gustav Jensen, of the Terningen, had retracted his story about the finding of the bodies and effects of the Salomon August Andree polar expedition by the Dr. Horn Arctic exploration party.

Sivertsen declared that whatever Captain Jensen said is true and that the report of discovery of the Andree expedition is correct. Sivertsen, continued:

"I have known Skipper Jensen for many years and whatever he says you can rely upon. He is very careful and never would tell anything he was not sure of. The message which Jensen brought back from Horn bore Horn's own signature. This message has been preserved here in Tromsoe. Jensen has been sailing north since 1916. TWO BUSINESS MEN SUICIDES

SEATTLE, Aug. 30. (AP)—Two Seattle business men, Philip G. Hilditch, 45, secretary manager of the Retail Lumbermen's Credit association, and Sidney T. McDonald, 50, assistant Northwest division manager of the Fox West Coast theatre, died here last night, both apparently suicides. McDonald collapsed while talking with his wife, Olive, in Dallas, Texas. The first intimation of McDonald's collapse came from Mrs. McDonald herself, who telephoned Dr. E. V. Morrow, the family physician in Seattle, she had been talking with her husband, and that the "line went dead" after he had told her he was going to take poison. Friends said McDonald had been in poor health.

Hilditch was found dead in his home with a bullet wound in his head and a revolver clutched in his right hand.

STORM SWEEPS OVER BRITAIN

LONDON, Aug. 30. (AP)—One of the worst electric and rain storms in the history of British weather records swept northern England and Scotland during the night on the heels of a heat wave which has taken more than two score lives.

Southern England escaped most of the fury of the tempest. Londoners, who sweetered all week, had some rain and a cooling breeze which once reached a velocity of 29 miles per hour, but the city emerged unscathed, except for flooding of low quarters in the east section where the rain was heaviest.

The storm started in the north early in the day and by noon the Edinburgh district was so dark that street lamps and shop lights were turned on. A Glasgow post office official said it was the worst ever experienced.

VALUABLE RECORDS DESTROYED

Temporary Quarters Of Trade Commission Burns Today

FIREMEN STRUGGLE IN VAIN TO SAVE IT

Filing Cases Containing Important Industrial Records Ruined

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30. (AP)—Reams of government records were destroyed today by fire which swept the temporary structure housing the federal trade commission. The building had been vacated by government workers on half-holiday a short time before.

Fireman struggled vainly to save the place. After flames had jumped from the roof in several places, some reaching over 20 feet into the air, efforts were directed toward keeping the blaze from spreading.
