All southern Oregon is hot for the main event offered the Klamath fans at the American Legion arena Monday evening offered under the auspices of the Central Labor Council. Never a better match than this light-heavyweight clash between two of the best boys at their weight—Gene O'Grady and Frankie Warneke.

Gene O'Grady, a big time attraction, arrived yesterday and worked out before the biggest crowd to ever attend a boxer in training here, and how good he looked! A different fighter than when he showed here a year ago. He's a fearless, tearing-in, take a chance scrapper. The fans are more than pleased with his big improvement. Gene will tip the scales at 172 pounds, is in the pink of condition and ready to go.

This Ashland farmer boy is a popular chap and a large following will be at the ringside Monday evening to root him on to victory.

Warneke Going Good
Warneke, after a week of careful training under the watchful eye of manager Jack Capri, shows wonderful condition and as much confidence as any boxer ever carried into the ring. Just 20 years of age, this German born fighter is facing the acid test when he enters the roped arena with O'Grady. Frankie as a middle weight defeated such stars as Chick Devlin, Pete Meyers, Gilbert, Aital and other tough boys. He has since grown into a light-heavy weight and in his eight bouts has lost only one decision. This youthful cousin of the heavyweight champion of the world, Max Schmeling, is no mean fan pleaser himself. Like O'Grady, he starts mixing it right from the first and unless all signs fail, some one is going to hit the canvas hard when these two real batters come together.

A lot of wagering is being done on this stellar event. The boys who like to pick their favorite with Uncle Sam's O'Grady have made O'Grady a 10-3 favorite with plenty of takers on both ends.

The boys will complete their training today. Open house at the arena.

Only Lights Work
Frankie will do just light exercise as manager Capri doesn't want to take any chances of his protegee going stale. O'Grady will box about six rounds. All interested are invited to be at the ring side after 5 p. m. to see the boys in action and get a line on the favorite.

For the opening events, "Tex" has scheduled some of the hardest fighting boys of this vicinity. To open with, Mark Willis of Chiloquin will endeavor to blight the hopes of Louie Webster, Dorrie find. These boys will start a 4-round bout in the 130 pound class.

Second—and here's something to con over—Johnny Jackson, tough redskin from Modoc Point, will fight 4 rounds with Yankee Tom Bessler at Klamath Falls. Two tough boys at 135 pounds.

Third—Red Handsaker of Chiloquin vs. Chris Pennell of Pellac City. Two boys who fight all the time. Weight, 145 pounds.

Fourth—Johnny Fugate, pride of Merrill against that sterling fighter from Fort Bidwell, Leo Burns. A good card all the way through.

The struggle for supremacy in the National League is showing few signs of letup as the four first-division clubs approach the ends of their "crucial" series. Brooklyn and New York, with only today's game left, are locked in a first for second place while the league leading Chicago Cubs and the St. Louis Cardinals are even after two overtime struggles.

The Giants have regained second place, but are not yet back to their starting point of a 1 1/2 game margin over the Robins. A 3 to 2 victory yesterday placed them a half game ahead.

Cubs Stage Comeback
Chicago made a comeback to triumph over St. Louis, 9 to 5, in a 12 inning struggle that put the Cubs 5 1/2 games ahead of New York and six in front of the Robins. They assaulted Haines and Herman Bell for five hits and as many runs in the ninth to tie the score.

In the eleventh Jim Bottomly clouted a home run for St. Louis with two on base but the Cubs made it 5-3 with four effective hits. The end came when "Old Hoss" Stephenson opened the Cub half of the thirteenth with a triple off Grimes and scored on Lester Bell's single.
