

Many Records Destroyed In Capital Fire

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Through which flames raced today. Filing cases, many containing important records of industrial cases pending before the trade commission, were destroyed by the fire or water soaked.

Data belonging to the children's bureau of the labor department also were lost. At one end of the building was stored some photographic equipment. Fear of an explosion was voiced by firemen.

The most valuable records, it was said, were locked in safes too heavy to move from the building. Some of the smaller safes were taken out by soldiers and policemen.

Among the hundreds of records in the building were many dealing with the protracted investigation of public utilities.

Hundreds of government workers who had taken their usual half holiday watched the fire fighters. Traffic was blocked.

One fireman, J. W. Laughlin, suffered a cut hand while knocking unbroken window panes so that water could reach the flames.

The building was a two-story structure built in the shape of a figure "8." Except for a thin veneer of rough concrete on the sides it was built entirely of wood.

A brick structure housing some gasoline stores of the army lay across the street. Most of the gasoline was stored underground, but firemen kept water constantly playing upon the building itself.

A rising wind caused some apprehension.

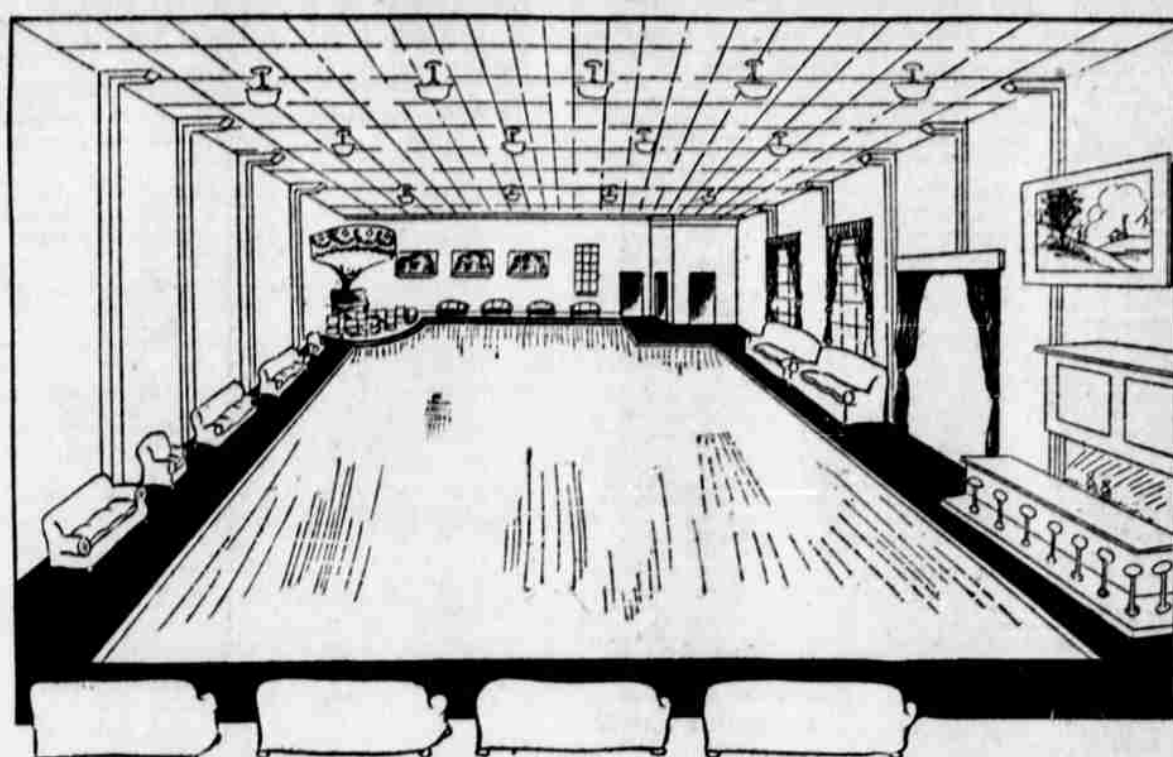

Sheriff Low and local officers have received word to be on the look-out for Vio Sutherland, who shot and killed two officers and wounded two others in an attempt to prevent the arrest of his son and himself in Eugene Friday morning.

Sutherland's description is given as follows: Six feet tall, between 65 and 70 years old, stooped, very thin, wrinkled face, and toothless. He is thought to be wearing blue overalls, a blue shirt and a brown hat. The fugitive is wounded, officers believe, in his right hand.

STATE DEPARTMENT STUDIES GROW CASE
WASHINGTON, Aug. 30. (A. P.) — Acting Secretary Castle said today the state department was studying the case of Harold B. Grow, American naval reserve aviator, reported facing court martial in Peru, but had reached no decision as to what action would be taken.

Ferdinand Mayer, American charge d'affaires at Lima, cabled the department today concerning Grow, but did not say the airman definitely would be court martialled.

The acting secretary of state said the situation presented a complicated case in international procedure and that both Mayer and the state department were studying the facts.

Castle said the department probably would send a note of instructions to Mayer today but he could not say what course would be taken.
