NATIONAL RACE PARADE DOWN TO GAMES IN EAST

Giants' Hopes Raised by Possibility of Cubs Taking Slump

The National League pennant race depends on the final inter-sectional series western clubs playing in the east and this raises the hopes of the third-place Giants.

The Giants have done well so far this season in entertaining westerners, while the Cubs have turned in about as many victories in the east as their stay-at-home rivals.

The St. Louis Cardinals now hold second place and are closer to the league leading Cubs than any team has been for some time.

Cards Sweep Series
A double victory over the Cincinnati Reds yesterday, 11 to 5 and 4 to 2, made seven straight victories and a clean sweep of the eleven home games against Cincinnati.

While Rhem and Haines were holding the Reds in check, the latter with a five hit performance, four Cub pitchers failed to stop Pittsburgh. The Cubs overcame one Pittsburgh lead only to have the Pirates score six runs in the last three innings for a 9-7 triumph.

Two Close Games
Two teams which are clear out of the running put the leaders to shame in yesterday's performance as the Phillies and the Boston Braves split a double header. Philadelphia won the first 1 to 0, although Ed Brandt allowed only two hits while Phil Collins gave the Braves seven.

Boston turned the tables in the second, winning 2 to 1 although Ray Benge outpitched Harry Seibold to the extent of five hits to eight.

A's Get Setback
The Philadelphia Athletics were all set to put the American League pennant away in their locker after two innings against Washington, but the Senators, after losing a game on Saturday, scored two runs in the sixth to win, 7 to 6.

The New York Yankees tottered on the verge of mathematical elimination from the race as they dropped the first game of a twin bill to the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 3, while the A's were ahead, but they recovered by winning the second game 5 to 2, and retained the bare possibility of beating out the leaders.

The Detroit Tigers and St. Louis Browns ended their season's play all square when the Browns pounded out a 9 to 6 victory in their rain-hampered final clash. Backed by timely hitting, Walter Stewart outlasted five Detroit pitchers. The Chicago White Sox won their last clash with the Cleveland Indians, 5 to 2, behind the six hit pitching of Rookie Jim Moore, but did not fare so well in the year's play. Cleveland won 12 of their 23 games.

Big League BASEBALL "Warming Up"

"Warming up" before pitching a ball game does not mean simply throwing a number of balls in the general direction of the catcher.

Limbering and tuning up the pitching arm is of course the main objective, but practicing control of both the fast and curve balls, and change of pace is also very necessary.

After you have thrown a few fast balls, have your catcher hold his glove in various positions for high, low, inside and outside balls. Try and place both your fast and curve balls where he calls for them.

Ten minutes is long enough to warm up. After you are thoroughly loosened up and just before the bell rings, cut loose with a few fast balls, but do not under any circumstances, put everything you have on every ball you throw during your "warm-up" before the game.

Many pitchers use up most of their "heat" before the game starts and have no reserve force left when called upon to stop a batting rally or pitch themselves out of a critical situation.

Never throw a careless ball, but try to place it some particular place as if an imaginary batter were standing before you.

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SIX WEEKS OF COAST LEAGUE LEFT UNPLAYED

Six more strenuous weeks of baseball remain for the Pacific coast league this season, and the opening of this week's series tomorrow finds the Hollywood Stars with a lead that can hardly be overcome for a couple of weeks, at least.

The Stars ended its series with the Hollywood Missions yesterday by splitting a double-header, winning the first 13 to 2, and dropping the second, 3 to 1, in a seven inning game, thereby taking six in a row from the Missions who have dropped to the bottom of the league.

Angels Lose Series
Los Angeles fared less well, losing its series, four to three to the San Francisco Seals, but maintained second place in the league. The Angels split yesterday, dropping the first 7 to 5 to the Seals, and winning the second, 5 to 4, in seven innings. The Seals are now only one game behind the Angels in the battle for second.

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When Roll Call of 20-Game Winning Pitchers Is Made, Only Half Dozen Men May Answer, Including Lefty Grove

There may be half a dozen pitchers in the major leagues this year whose season record will show 20 victories. There again, there may be only three, whereas a decade back there were 17 men who won 20 games or more, and 20 years ago the number was 19.

This is not intended to show that the horsehide of today has more non-stop in it than its 10 or 20-year-old brother. Neither will it reveal the present day twirler a nobody compared with Mathewson, Brown, Bender, Coombs, Johnson, Alexander, Hagby and Mays of another period. About the only thing it does prove is that big league teams today feel the necessity of carrying more pitchers, alleged or otherwise, and as a result the victories, if any, are divided among more moundmen.

Lefty Grove, ace of the world champion Athletics, and Wesley Ferrell, star of the fourth-place Indians, have passed the 20 mark and may go even beyond the 25-mark. Both are American League hurlers. George Farnshaw, also of the A's, pitched his 20th victory in his latest start. These three are likely to be the only American League

pitchers among the 20-game winners.

At this stage of the season it appears exceedingly doubtful that more than two National League pitchers will wind up the year with 20 victories. The two are Ray Kremer of Pittsburgh and Pat Malone of the champion Chicago Cubs. Recent averages showed that Kremer had won 17 and Malone 15.

Ted Lyons tried for weeks to win his 18th game. Consider the fact that he does his pitching for the lowly White Sox and you easily can understand that he may not go beyond the 20 mark, or even reach it. Malone's chances with the Cubs are better, for neither Lyons' or Kremer's, for Malone is fortunate enough to be with a pennant-contending aggregation.

Ten years back there were seven in the National League and 10 in the American League who pitched 20 or more victories. They were Alexander, Grimes, Cooper, Dock, Barnes, Toney and Neff in the senior circuit and Shawkey, Coveleskie, Shocker, Hagby, Faber, Mays, Clotte, Kerr Caldwell and Williams in the American. Hagby of the pennant-winning Cleveland Indians topped the group with 21 victories. Incidentally, Hagby was

Contender five times since 1929, the stocky, hard driving entrant from Honolulu reached the end of a long trail yesterday with a smashing 10-9 victory over Fay Coleman, young Los Angeles star, in the 36-hole finals.
