Lights Make Klamath Ave. Bright Spot

Sixty-four new street lights flashed out upon the twilight on Klamath avenue at 7 o'clock Saturday night while property holders along the street and hundreds of city residents strolled along the avenue making remarks of admiration on the improvement.

Muscle was furnished by the Klamath Falls band which started playing at the corner of Eighth and Klamath, then marched down the street in both directions, playing at each corner, while members of the city traffic squad directed the cars around the musicians.

A street which has heretofore had whole blocks lying in semi-darkness is now as light as the modern boulevard of a metropolitan city. The aluminum globes on tall standards, stand dignified among the red and blue neon signs which merchants of the street have installed in front of their business houses.

The new \$25,000 lighting unit was installed by the California-Oregon Power company and the Link River Electric company, and it will be maintained by the power company for five years.

"I want to compliment the property owners on Klamath avenue for their excellent public spirit, their desire to see Klamath Falls advance and their abiding faith in the future of their district. This light comes to me because of the new ornamental lighting system which will be put into service this evening, and which I, as mayor of the city, officially start by turning on the electric current at 7 o'clock tonight, transforming Klamath avenue into a beautifully lighted thoroughfare," the mayor said.

"It has been remarked that Main street property owners agitated a similar lighting plan two years ago and all necessary steps were taken to bring that section under a lighting system such as Klamath avenue now has. Now Klamath avenue has taken the lead and I congratulate the public spirited men on that street for their untiring energy which

LAWYER SAYS NACKER WILL HAVE DEFENSE

Motive for Slaying to Be Revealed When Trial Opens

That half the story hasn't been told and an admission that the story about chasing a hawk and shooting at what he thought was a bear was a "jail," and that Don Nacker, 29-year-old ex-sailor, has a defense for his action in killing Fred Dunbar, Klamath Falls insurance man, was stated Saturday by a member of the staff of attorneys which have been retained to defend the youth.

"More will come out later," the attorney said. "All facts will be told and verified at the trial," he added.

Hearing Is Tuesday

Preliminary hearing for Nacker who is charged with first degree murder, will be held Tuesday at 10 a. m. before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes, when T. R. Gillenwaters, deputy district attorney, will represent the state; and Ralph W. Horan, of the law firm of Manning, McCulloch and Driscoll and Ralph W. Horan, will conduct the defense on Tuesday. The well known legal firm of Manning, McCulloch and Driscoll and Ralph W. Horan has been retained to defend Nacker. It was learned yesterday.

The arraignment of Nacker was held Saturday morning in the lobby of the county jail as a measure of precaution to the safety of the youth from any friend of Dunbar's or the girl's, Sheriff Low stated.

Arraignment Held

Sheriff Low, Deputy Ross Brown, Assistant District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters, Defense Attorney Ralph Horan, the accused youth, his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. William Brock, and his father Jack Nacker, were present in the jail when Jailer Ed Ross brought the boy from his cell.

Young Nacker showed no emotion when the complaint was read which charges him with first degree murder and which may mean that Nacker will forfeit his life.

Served Navy Sentence

It was learned from Nacker's attorney that after deserting from the United States ship Saratoga at San Pedro, Nacker gave himself up at Leadville, Colo., and was returned to Denver.

From Denver he was taken by navy recruiting officers to Mare Island navy yard where Nacker was court-martialed and sentenced to a year for desertion. He was released eight months later for four months off for good behavior. He has received no discharge.

Tells "Stall" Story

The attorneys did not state what the additional facts which will be brought out at the trial are but stated that Nacker has been told to maintain silence until the trial.

Since he was taken to Sheriff Lloyd Low, Deputy Ross Brown and Prosecutor Gillenwaters at Crescent Lake by his mother and stepfather on Tuesday, Nacker has told the same story of chasing a hawk, seeing something moving through the brush and thinking it was a bear shooting.

Officers Doubt Story

Officers have stated that he had a plain view, that the fact that he carried the rope with which he tied Miss Doris Bacon, companion of Dunbar, and the fact that at least four shots hit Dunbar disproved the hawk and bear story.

It is expected that the state will present no new evidence at the preliminary hearing and that the defense will present none on Tuesday and that no further evidence will be brought out before the trial.
