RAY McQUILLAN FIGHTS WILLIE FELDMAN 17TH

Tex Arranges "Natural"
As Headliner For
Stellar Card

After a week or more of rest, Tex Bickstaff has resumed normal activity and succeeded in signing Ray McQuillan, popular and highly successful colored fighter, and Willie Feldman, pride of Klamath Falls, to top a stellar card at the Legion pavilion on Wednesday, September 17. This match is considered a natural and one that will put the fight fans on their toes.

It required much dickering with manager Joe Wolf to get him to sign for this bout, but after Tex satisfied him in regard to the finances, Willie's weight, the referee and numerous other items entering into fight contracts, the Portlander finally agreed to bring his boy here the 17th.

Ray Colorful Fighter
Ray is a colorful fighter—a knockout puncher. In his last two bouts around here he showed some good boys tricks about the same, flattening Steamboat Jackson in five rounds, and previously at Chillicothe, giving away 12 pounds he gave Frankie Warkne a sweet boxing lesson, winning easily in 16 rounds.

McQuillan's greatest feat was the knockout of Herman Ratcliff in a Portland ring a short time ago. In over 200 fights this was the first time anyone ever stopped this rugged, iron-jawed Dutchman. Ratcliff beat George Dixon twice and did it easily, too. A lot of local fighters are of the opinion that McQuillan is a better fighter than Dixon.

Willie in Shape
Willie Feldman, fresh from a victory over Battling Slim Ryan, which he won on a foul in the sixth round, has taken a new lease on life and is in great shape. He tipped the beam at 163 pounds for Ryan. In the opinion of some who witnessed the fight, Ryan fouled Willie purposely to avoid being knocked out. Willie sure had Ryan staggering around the ring when the referee stopped the bout. Willie looked like himself again in that fight. There is no question as to the ability of this Jewish boxer when he is in shape.

Not a dissuader, Willie is a clean living chap who hasn't had proper training, but since Jimmy Mann has taken him in tow he is getting back into the shape he was in when he first came here—a great, clever ring man.

Both Post Forfeits
Both boys have posted forfeits of \$100 to weigh in at 2 p. m. the day of the match.

Tex is going to give the fans a treat for he is negotiating with Tom Loutitt, the ace of referees, to be the third man in the ring for this star bout. McQuillan will arrive Saturday morning and box at 5:30 p. m. at the arena. Feldman can be seen every afternoon going through the paces of strenuous training.

Newsboy Brown Again Contender

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 10. (AP)—Newsboy Brown, veteran fly-weight boxing campaigner who ranked in these parts as a strong contender for the 112 pound title when Fidel La Barba was king of the midwest, today once more is being hailed as a potential champion. In ten fast and furious rounds here last night, he decisively defeated Chato Laredo, Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico, one of the few fighters to beat him in recent years.

Brown was awarded five rounds by referee Jack Kennedy, who points out the round winner after each bell. Laredo was given one, and four even.

NATIONAL RACE GROWS TIGHTER

Cubs Holding Lead By
Slim Margin; Robins
And Cards Threat

The National League race was tighter than ever today.

Brooklyn took a 3 to 0 triumph over the Cubs and New York won 2 to 1 over St. Louis yesterday.

Cincinnati's latest losing streak went to six games as the Phillies defeated the Reds 3 to 6. Frank O'Doul, acting as a pinch hitter, clouted a home run with two on base in the sixth to tie the score and two more runs of Larry Benton in the eighth won out for Philadelphia.

The American League race remained unchanged although Washington's Senators had a long hard struggle to keep from losing ground. It was not until the twelfth inning that the Senators put on one of their characteristic rallies, scoring five runs to defeat St. Louis 8 to 1. The Browns had knotted the count at 3-3 in the ninth of a close duel between Hadley and Collins.

Yank Chance Slim
The New York Yankees clung to their slim chance of overtaking the A's by combining some of their 16 hits with gifts from Cleveland pitchers to defeat the Indians, 8 to 6. Five hit batsmen were among the features of the game which was notable principally for its poor pitching.

The Chicago White Sox combined the day's biggest collection of hits, 19, with a five-hit pitching job by Pat Caraway to defeat the Boston Red Sox, 10 to 1.
