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ENTERPRISE TAKES LEAD FROM START

American Sloop Rounds Thirty Mile Course In Just 4:25:50

LIGHT AIR REDUCES TIME TO FIVE KNOTS

Fog Holds Up Race For Time, Leaving Almost Lifeless Atmosphere

U. S. S. KANE, Off America's Cup Course, Sept. 13 (By Radio to The Associated Press)—Enterprise, the defender of the America's cup, won the first race of the series today from Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock V.

Enterprise crossed the finish line at 3:57:50, just 4 hours, 2 minutes and 50 seconds from the start.

Leads All Way The white hulled Enterprise, skippered by Harold S. Vanderbilt, American sportsman, led from start to finish.

The race was sailed in light variable winds, which never blew at more than eight or nine knots. Fog, which delayed the race for over an hour, lifted as it progressed and the finish was in clear, almost lifeless air.

Whistles Tied Down Whistles on the fleet of spectator yachts were tied down as the Enterprise, her tall masts standing almost perpendicular to the water, slipped across the finish line.

Enterprise's margin of victory was estimated at more than 1000 yards.

Had Mainmast Spread The Enterprise bore down on the line bearing mainmast, balloon and jib top sail while Shamrock V, in addition to her heliometer, had her stay sail set.

Shamrock V was first to break out her spinnaker and she began to foot faster with this wing set.

Enterprise broke out her spinnaker a minute later and the two boats bore away rapidly in the light wind.

Whistles of the huge fleet around the starting line shrieked encouragement to the sloops as (Continued on Page Five)

ANGUS CATTLE PRIZE WINNERS

Fifteen head of the famous DEA Aberdeen Angus cattle from Klamath county carried off both junior and senior championships, and also the grand champion steer calf over all breeds at the California state fair held at Sacramento recently, according to D. E. Alexander, who made the announcement at the Herald office today.

This string of DEA cattle is now on the way to the Fresno county fair, and will return to Klamath Falls in time to be shown at the Klamath county fair.

To Show at Salem. After the Klamath fair these purebred cattle will be shown at the Oregon state fair at Salem, at the Pacific International Livestock Exhibit in Portland, as well as in Los Angeles and Oxnard.

Aberdeen Angus stock from the DEA ranch has won prizes in the California Baby Beef and Livestock Exhibition at San Francisco, at the Pacific International Livestock Exhibition at Portland, at the Los Angeles Livestock Show, and at the Western National Livestock Show at Denver.

In addition to other prizes, Mr. Alexander has won three grand championships with steer calves. The first was at San Francisco two years ago, last year at the Pacific International, and also at the San Francisco show, and this year the DEA steer calf runner-up seems to be in a fair way to bring home some laurels of his own.

LETTER FROM JONES CAUSES STATEMENT

Woodcock Asks Bureau For \$2,200,000 Extra For Coming Year

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. (AP)—Fresh talk of submitting the prohibition question to the states or the people for a new decision, caused the Anti-Saloon league today to reaffirm its opposition to any such project.

F. Scott McBride, superintendent of the dry organization, characterized such a proposal as "impossible and ridiculous."

"We'll oppose resubmission of prohibition to the states or the people," he said. "Any such proposal would be impossible and ridiculous. It would take a two-thirds vote of the senate and house for congress to propose such an amendment and the congress is now more than two to one dry. Three-fourths of the states would never ratify such an amendment."

PLANS THREE WAREHOUSES

Ferguson Company To Prepare for Big Potato Crop

D. W. Ferguson of the Ferguson company, potato operators, announced today that in order to keep pace with the rapid increase and expansion of the potato business in Klamath county, and to cope with the new markets which are anticipated, that three new potato warehouses will be constructed immediately. They are to be located at Merrill, Stukel and Tule Lake.

Invest \$40,000 The Ferguson company's investment will approximate \$40,000 in the building of the three warehouses, each of which will have a capacity of 150 carloads of the product. The warehouses will be conveniently situated on the Southern Pacific tracks in order to secure the widest distribution possible.

Men will be put to work Monday morning on the warehouses in order that they will be completed early enough to take care of the fall crop, which is already being marketed. Storage facilities for the large potato crop will be available by the time cold weather sets in, Mr. Ferguson stated.

Pershing Happy He Is Just a Soldier

By KIRKE SIMPSON WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. (AP)—For all the gossip of the years since the war as to his political hopes, General John J. Pershing entered on his seventieth birthday today supremely happy he is and always has been "just a soldier."

"I can say with all sincerity nothing gives me more happiness than that I have never been drawn into political life," he said. "I have watched what happens to holders of high political office. I have seen their every word distorted and twisted to find some hidden meaning. I have seen their political supporters praise them as prodigies of wisdom and statesmanship while their opponents at the same time set them out as stupid scoundrels. And I have known them, and known they were neither the one nor the other, just average Americans."

So Pershing looks back over those 70 years. During and since the war there have been many times when his availability as a presidential candidate was talked of among his friends, never with his assent.

He recalled today that once in France, even in the heat of making his army ready for battle, some one said to him that his overseas assignment might make him president someday.

McBRIDE'S SUCCESSOR APPOINTED

Judge Percy R. Kelly Of Albany Elevated By Norblad

HAS SERVED TWENTY YEARS IN DISTRICT Governor Has Two More Appointments to Fill in Linn County

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 13. (AP)—Percy R. Kelly of Albany, who 20 years ago this fall was elected circuit judge for one of Oregon's largest and most important judicial districts, and who has served continuously since that time, is the selection of Governor Norblad to succeed the late Thomas A. McBride as justice of the state supreme court. He will take office at once.

It was virtually certain that today or Monday the governor would appoint J. G. Lewelling of Albany, present district attorney for Linn county, as Kelly's successor on the circuit bench. This will leave the way for a third appointment, that of a district attorney in Lewelling's place.

To Serve Until January Under constitutional and statutory provisions the appointments for the short period between now and January. It is required that the offices be filled by election in November. While—since the primaries are past—it is not mandatory upon the state central committee to nominate a candidate for supreme court justice, or the district committees to nominate for the circuit bench, (Continued on Page Five)

TO RAISE GAS PRICE A CENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13. (AP)—Gasoline distributed by the Standard Oil Company of California will go up one cent a gallon Monday.

This will raise the retail price to 21 cents in the San Francisco district, maintaining the four-cent differential between the wholesale and retail prices. Arizona will not be affected by the increase.

Simultaneously the company will reduce the price it pays for crude oil of average grade by eight cents to 12 cents a barrel. The detailed schedule of new prices is to be issued later.

The new prices meet recent reports of independent refiners with a lower price for the raw material and a higher return for the finished product.

CONVENTIONS TO ASSEMBLE

Major Parties To Name Candidates for State Supreme Court

PORTLAND, Sept. 13. (AP)—Two state conventions will be held next week to nominate candidates for the position on the supreme court bench made vacant by the death of Justice McBride. The Republican state central committee will meet Saturday, Sept. 20, and the Democratic state committee will meet Thursday, Sept. 19.

The appointment late yesterday by Governor Norblad of Circuit Judge Percy R. Kelly of Albany to the vacant bench is expected to give the Albany jurist "the inside track" when Republican nominations are called for. Judge Kelly will serve by reason of appointment only until January.

At least 9 Republican committeemen must attend the meeting here Saturday to constitute a quorum. Proxies have not status unless the quorum attends.

BROMLEY HOPS OFF

FLIGHT OF 4532 MILES LAYS AHEAD

Pilot and Companion Leave Samishiro Beach at Noon

PLAN NO-STOP HOP JAPAN TO TACOMA

Adventure Considered One Of Most Hazardous Ever Attempted

SAMBONGI, Japan, Sept. 14. (AP) (Sunday)—Beginning a flight of 4532 miles across the Pacific ocean, Pilot Harold Bromley and Navigator Harold Gatty took off today at 5:08 a. m., for Tacoma, Wash.

The time was 12:08 p. m., Saturday at their destination when they lifted the monoplane City of Tacoma from the beach at Samishiro, near here, and started from Japan's main island on one of the most hazardous flights ever undertaken.

The journey, planned as a non-stop adventure over seas subject to sudden heavy storms and typhoons, may be interrupted by landing at Nome or other Alaskan port to refuel.

Follow Shipping Course The aviators' course lies along the Kuriles chain of northern Japan islands, and generally follows the great circle of shipping across the Northern Pacific.

Thousands of miles out over the ocean, they planned to reach the Aleutian Islands, extending far out from Alaskan shores.

Although a non-stop flight was planned, the Aleutian chain, rocky and wind swept, offered a precarious haven. Their land plane, however, might have difficulty in landing at Nome or other Alaskan port to refuel.

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GERMAN POLICE GUARD BOOTHS

BERLIN, Sept. 13. (AP)—Election eve saw the police in many cities actively engaged in putting down outbreaks of violence. Half a hundred arrests have been made and a score injured. One policeman was stabbed at Chemnitz in a clash between communist and fascist factions.

Every available policeman was ordered for duty during tomorrow's polling for Reichstag members. After a conference of the authorities this afternoon it was decided that extra precautionary measures should be taken in all population centers.

CAROLINA HIT BY HURRICANE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. (AP)—An intense tropical hurricane which yesterday struck the lower North Carolina coast with great force today apparently was speeding northward along the shore with indications winds of gale force would be felt by noon as far north as Atlantic City.

Storm warnings were posted from Hatteras to Sandy Hook but expectations were it would miss part of the Virginia shore at least. The weather bureau reported the disturbance small in diameter and moving northeastward about 15 miles an hour.
