CUBS RETAIN SLENDER LEAD WITH 17-4 WIN

Giants Now Four Games From Top, Losing to Cardinals, 5-2

The National league pennant race became even more thrilling today. Chicago, St. Louis and Brooklyn, all triumphant yesterday, remained just where they were before while the New York Giants, who suffered a third straight defeat at the hands of the Cardinals yesterday, have dropped to four games behind first place.

The 5 to 3 triumph of the Cardinals over the Giants in the final game of their series yesterday gave the New Yorkers a setback that will be hard for them to overcome.

Chicago's slugging Cubs had little trouble in holding their slim lead against the attacks of their rivals. They hit early and late in their first game against the Phillies and with Hack Wilson's 49th home run in the second and a six run rally in the sixth as the high spots, they came out with a 17 to 4 triumph.

Brooklyn downed Cincinnati almost as easily. The Robins made a fast start against Ray Kopp and finished their part of the scoring in their 7 to 3 victory in five innings as Lopez and Wright hit timely homers. Ray Moss had only one bad inning as he held the Reds to eight hits, four of the blows and all the Cincinnati runs coming in the sixth.

Babe Ruth continued his pursuit of Wilson in the season's home run race and furnished the one ray of light for the New York Yankees as they dropped completely out of the American league pennant chase. The Babe hit homer 46 in the third inning, but his teammates errors enabled the Detroit Tigers to stay in the running and finally win out in a sixth inning rally, 5 to 2.

Washington gained the same amount of ground and once more is 4 1/2 games behind the leaders. Off to a six run lead in the first two innings, the Senators barely staggered through to an 8 to 7 victory over the Chicago White Sox, who scored five runs in the seventh with a homer by Carl Reynolds as the finishing touch.

No games of no particular importance in the standings went to the bottom and both were decided by 3 to 4 scores. The Boston Braves came from behind to defeat the Pittsburgh Pirates by that margin as Chatham and Spohrer found Larry French for doubles in the tenth.

And then the slugging little fly chaser develops into the Babe Ruth of the National league and is setting a new record for home runs in the older circuit.

The Giant manager has let many good men get away from him and made some bad trades, but he also has made his share of good ones and won his share of pennants in that uncertain game they call baseball. It's a tough game to guess right in.

Valuable Cargo Of Logs Breaks Loose From Tug

ASHLAND, Wis., Sept. 12. (AP)—Lumberjacks with hand spikes and saws twirling ropes today fought waves and slippery logs in Lake Superior in attempts to capture a \$170,000 log raft that broke loose from its tug boats off Stockton Island.

The raft, said by lumbermen to be the largest ever towed from Canada, was made up of about 17,000 cords. Three tugs, the Butterfield, the Whalon, and the Puckaway, were needed to pull it. Usually, one tug is all that is necessary to handle the log rafts.

High winds sprang up as the raft was pulled by Presque Point at the head of Chequamegon Bay.

The raft, made up of as valuable pulpwood as Canada has to offer, piled against the point. Fog made impossible the task of floating it last night.

Proposed Bond Issue Reduced by Budget Committee

Further details of a \$70,000 bond issue, voting funds for an armory, added fire facilities, and

a special levy this year was discussed at a meeting of the city budget committee held Friday afternoon at the city hall.

The bond issue was lowered \$5,000 by the committee, since it is believed \$70,000 will be adequate for construction of a sub-station and the land on which it will be situated.

Klamath residents will be asked to vote on the proposed bond issue in the November election, as well as a \$45,000 bond issue for an armory, and a \$45,000 special levy, of which \$25,000 will be placed in the fire fund, \$10,000 in the street fund and \$10,000 for lights and water.
