

DR. IRIGOYEN UNDER ARREST

Ex-President Detained by Order of General Jose Uriburu

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 12. (A. P.)—An official government communique today said the deposed president, Dr. Hipolito Irigoyen, was under arrest and would not be allowed to abandon the country.

The communique cleared the status of the aged former official, who was taken from prison last Thursday and placed aboard the cruiser, General Belgrano, presumably for transportation to Montevideo or other place of exile.

Cruiser Anchors.
The General Belgrano did not reach Montevideo despite official notification of the government there from its ambassador to Buenos Aires that it was enroute to Uruguay. Late outgoing steamers reported the cruiser was at anchor off Buenos Aires roads.

Arrest of the deposed president aroused some speculation as to an ostensible change of heart in the new chief executive, General Jose Francisco Uriburu, who in earlier interviews had said Dr. Irigoyen would be allowed to go where he wished.

Court Recognizes Change.
The national supreme court issued an extraordinary decree today affirming legality of the de facto government and endorsing its use of the military as necessary to assure peace and order in the nation. The government was said to have dedicated itself to maintenance of the constitutional and fundamental laws of the state.

The finance ministry said today a \$50,000,000 loan from the Chatham Finance Corporation of New York, expiring October 1 would be renewed.

The letter largely was a reiteration of views expressed by Jones several months ago. Asks Additional Fund.
While these statements were being made public, Director Woodcock of the prohibition bureau besought the budget bureau for an increase of \$2,500,000 for the work of his office during the coming year. The money would be used to add 500 agents to his staff of 1475 and would bring the total cost of all dry enforcement agencies, including the coast guard and the industrial alcohol bureau, to well over the \$15,000,000 now provided.

Was Candidate for Bench.
Kelly has prior to this been a candidate for the supreme bench. While he has long been recognized as supreme court timber, he has on several occasions been the victim of what is known as the "breaks" of the game.

When Judge Kelly was first elected to the circuit bench in 1929 his district comprised the five counties of Marion, Linn, Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook, with two judges presiding. This later was reduced to two counties, Marion and Linn, with two judges. Judge Kelly has presided over department No. 1, the law division of the court, and whoever is appointed his successor will take that department.

NEW JUSTICE 90

ALBANY, Sept. 12. (AP)— Judge Percy B. Kelly, 60, appointed to the state supreme court-bench by Governor Norblad to fill the position left vacant by the death of Justice McBride, has practiced law in Oregon 35 years and has been a circuit judge for the past twenty years.

He was born in Arlington, Iowa, in 1870, and was only six years old when his parents moved to Albany. He was educated in Albany schools and graduated from Albany college in 1887. A year or so later he began studying law in the office of the late Charles E. Wolverton who later became a federal judge.

Admitted in 1892.
Judge Kelly was admitted to the bar in 1892. He was elected to the state senate in 1898, serving one term. Later he became city attorney of Albany. In 1910 he was elected circuit judge and he has been re-elected at every election since.

Judge Kelly is prominent in Masonic circles and is grand principal of the Oregon Lodge of Royal Arch Masons. In 1925 he was made grand master of the Oregon Masonic lodge.

Mrs. Kelly is active in Eastern Star circles.

Open to October 20.

The season extends until October 20. For many years deer hunters have been in quandry as the opening day of the hunting season arrived, since they have not known whether the season would open or not, or how long it would continue. But this year, thanks to the governor's early announcement, hunters can get ready to take their annual vacations and spend it in pursuit of their favorite sport.
