PROSPECTS FOR TEAM TOLD BY MR. SINCLAIR

Six Lettermen From Last Year Return, Others Enter Klamath

Between 35 and 40 candidates for positions on the Klamath Union high school football team have been turning out nightly for grid practice at the field on the left of the railroad tracks, Al Sinclair, varsity coach, announced last night.

The outlook for the team is not overly bright, as many of last year's lettermen were lost through graduation, including the entire backfield of last year. In some instances there are new men who may develop into good material, Coach Sinclair states.

First Game September 27
A tile drain will make the practice field usable for work-outs, although a two-foot mound over the pipe cuts the field in half and somewhat hinders practice, Sinclair said. Games will probably be played at the fair grounds as they were last year, until the city field is completed and made ready for play.

Practice is starting each evening at 4 o'clock and the boys are working late to get into shape for the first game, which will be played here on September 27 between Klamath and Weed high schools.

Six Lettermen Back
The Wildcats, Klamath team in the league, have not yet been called out for practice because of a shortage of uniforms and other grid paraphernalia. It is stated, Dwight French is coach of the Wildcats. Six lettermen will again try for places on the varsity. These include: Dick Kramers, center and captain; Fred Hale, guard; Merton Coffman, tackle; Ray Padock, tackle; Bill Estes, end; and Wendell Smith, end.

Wildcats Out for Varsity
Wildcat lettermen who are out this year for the varsity include: Bob Elliott, half; Eddie Boyd, fullback; Ray Haskins, quarterback; Glen Reckard, guard; Jack Knight, tackle; Howard Reed, tackle; Charles Cummings, end; Ray Allen, end; George Massey, center; Alfred Carlson, Wildcat end being switched to halfback, and Norton Taylor, a substitute guard on the varsity team last year.

Several lettermen have entered Klamath high from other schools this fall. They include Charles Woodward, guard on the Castle Rock, Wash., high school team; Norman Tabor, who is out for a guard position here and who made a letter at guard on a California high school team last year; Marc Davis, who made a letter at half on a Galveston, Texas, high school team and who is out for the quarterback post here; and Carl Deering, who made a letter at halfback at another school.

Several new men of the local school are out that are fair prospects and may be made into valuable players with good coaching and the proper amount of training. Included in this list are: Robert Parker, guard; Lawrence Bergman, a husky but inexperienced tackle; Gerald Hobe, a fullback candidate who is a senior, has been on the honor roll as a student and who weighs about 185 pounds but has never before played football; and Howard Wakeman, star basketball player who is out for the football team at the half position.

Modoc Line Train Schedule Will Be Changed in Future

Commencing September 21, a substantial reduction will be made in the schedule on trains at Klamath Falls and Reno over the Modoc Northern line, it was announced Monday evening by C. M. Biggs, Southern Pacific district freight and passenger agent.

Train 31 will leave Klamath Falls at 10:30 instead of 8:15 as at present; will arrive at Alturas at 1:35 p. m., instead of 1:15 and arrive at Reno at 9:10 instead of 10:15 p. m.

Westbound train 32 will leave Reno at 6:35 a. m., and arrive at Alturas at 1:50 p. m., instead of 2 p. m., and arrive at Klamath Falls at 5:05, instead of 6:30 p. m.

The change in schedule will allow through passengers from Portland to Ogden more time to spend in Klamath Falls on business or pleasure.

Additional changes on the Ogden line will shorten the schedule of the Pacific limited one hour. The limited will leave San Francisco at noon and arrive at Ogden at 12:30 noon on the next day. Westbound Pacific limited train 19 will be shortened 40 minutes in running time, leaving Ogden at 3:45 p. m., as at present, and arriving at San Francisco at 4:50 p. m., the next day.

A new train to be known as No. 23, will be established and will leave Sparks, Nev., at 7:25 a. m., arriving at San Francisco at 4:10 the same day.

"Big League" Bowling

A short time ago I asked Hank Marino, one of the greatest bowlers in the country, how a bowler could "feel out" or adapt himself to a strange alley.

"Well," said Hank, "I would throw a natural first ball, and watch carefully the route of the ball from the foul line to the head pin. There are various ways of correcting the ball if it did not give satisfactory results. You can start the ball further inside. In fact it is always advisable to play on the inside, as you are more apt to escape the corner grooves caused by inexperienced bowlers dropping the ball. Instead of letting it roll natural."

"If you notice an alley is too fast to take a natural hook ball, it is advisable to move inside and throw the ball out, giving the ball an out and in effect."

"Each alley must be studied separately. Very rarely a pair of alleys run exactly alike, so it is up to the bowler to use his own judgment after the first two or three balls."

Many Birds Die Under Wheels Passing Autos

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Commenting on the campaign of the American Game Protective association to lessen automobile killing of wild life, President Sam G. Anderson of the Minnesota State Game Protective league writes:

"I have found in motoring in the daytime that most wild life and domestic poultry on the highways can be seasonably driven off by sounding the horn two or three hundred feet back of the birds."

This is undoubtedly true and unavoidable killing is chiefly limited to birds that accidentally fly into the front of the car and are killed by the impact or are crushed under the wheels. Carlos Avery, president of the American Game Protective association, relates a recent personal observation of unnecessary destruction. He says: "In driving on a Minnesota gravel road in July I noted a large number of small birds on the road. Slowing up, the birds flew away, all but 100 or more that were dead—killed by previous passing cars. The birds were easily seen for 100 rods in either direction and the killing was inexcusable. Doubtless many were killed by later passing cars."

"Why these birds, tree sparrows, thousands of them, congregated on this spot, I was unable to determine. Apparently they were in migration and found something attractive on this segment of the highway."

"In about 500 miles of travel I tried to keep track of the dead creatures observed on the highway. Many were not seen but the list of those noted was formidable, and included, besides the tree sparrows above noted, 13 redheaded woodpeckers, 9 skunks, 2 chickens, 2 turtles, 3 cats, 2 jack rabbits, 2 blackbirds, 2 pheasants, and one each of muskrat, robin, rat, gopher and ruffed grouse. One hundred or more dead birds were noted that could not be identified in passing."

McSherry Studies California System

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 16. (AP)—Irl S. McSherry, secretary to Governor Norblad, left today for California where he will confer with Governor Young and the board of paroles and pardons. He will make a study of the California system of paroles and pardons as compared with the Oregon system. McSherry will represent Oregon at a western convention of the Salvation Army to be held in San Francisco, and that organization will pay the expenses of his trip.

SIX NORTHERN DIVISION TEAMS OPEN PRACTICE

College Squads Eager To Get Into Suits For Fall Play

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 16. (AP)—The moulding of six northern division football teams of the Pacific Coast conference with more than 300 candidates aspiring for positions was under way today. First turn-outs were held yesterday at the six colleges and additional recruits were expected at all points during this week.

Coach Jimmy Phelan, who coached Purdue to a big ten title last season, had 74 candidates at Washington. Fifty-four answered the call of another new Pacific Coast coach, Dr. Clarence W. Spears, former Minnesota mentor at Oregon, the largest turnout in football history at Eugene.

53 Out at O. S. C.
Fifty-eight turned out for Coach Paul Schisler at Oregon State College. Roy Sandberg, Washington state halfback in 1921, 1922 and 1923, became new assistant coach to Babe Hollingbery at Pullman, where 50 donned suits. Fifty-five turned out at Idaho and 35 at Missoula.

Merle Hufford, sophomore sensation of last fall, back for his second varsity season, and Bill Marsh, fullback, were experienced men for Phelan's backfield while he has veterans for all line positions. Nineteen lettermen were out at W. S. C. and 20 at Oregon.

Sandberg, for four years Ellensburg Normal head coach, started work immediately at Pullman as aid to Hollingbery. They began speeding preparations for two important early games, against California in three weeks and southern California a week later.

Oregon State will miss one lettermen, Fred Schell, tackle, advised by his physician to abandon football, while at Montana. Burns, halfback, was not expected to be in condition until November.

Other lettermen out at Washington were Captain Al Homes, Paul Schwegler and Henry Wentworth, tackles, the latter was a candidate for center. Ham Ketta and Lee Shelton, guards, were expected tomorrow. Westweller, Pautake and Squires were experienced ends on hand.

Spears Hard Worker
True to his reputation, Doc Spears put the Oregon squad through a hard workout. Three veterans out of school two years were back, namely, Steve Fletcher and Al Edwards, ends, and Choppie Parker, quarterback. Other lettermen were Austin Colbert, Irv Schulz and Jerry Little, guards, Bill Anater, Eric Forst and Shirley Carter, centers, George Christensen, Henry Hayden, and Ralph Bates, tackles, Jack Erdley, another end, Ed Mueller, and John Denham, fullbacks, and Wally Shearer, Al Browne, Don Watts and John Londahl, halfbacks.

O. S. C. lined up a first team yesterday with McKalip and Root, ends, Kent and Harn, tackles, Salmons and Thompson, guards, Hammer, center, Kerr and Hughes, halfbacks, Buurke, quarter, and Little, fullback.

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PAGE SETTERS MEETING WITH COMPETITION

Cardinals Are Persistent Threat to League Leading Robins

Once more the pace setters, the Brooklyn Robins, today faced the difficult task of turning back the threatening St. Louis Cardinals, as they did the Chicago Cubs last week, if they are to be the first team under the wire in the boiling National league pennant race.

The Robins, boasting a season record winning streak of eleven games, today held a one-game margin over the Cards and one and one-half game advantage over the third place Cubs.

Cubs Meet Giants
While the Robins and Cardinals are battling in a three-game series, the Cubs will be called upon to meet the Giants, all but eliminated from the race but still clinging to that mathematical possibility.

In turning back the Cincinnati Reds, 13 to 6, yesterday, the Robins won their eleventh consecutive game, beating the Athletics' former 1930 record, of ten straight.

The Cubs lost a chance to gain valuable ground, when they split a doubleheader with Philadelphia, the Phillies taking the opening slugfest 12 to 11 and Chicago accounting for the nightcap 6 to 4 after Hack Wilson had pounded out his fiftieth home run of the season.

With Fred Fitzsimmons giving out only three hits, the Giants stayed in the race with a 4 to 1 triumph over the Pirates.
