Without doubt this boy has stepped into the place held by Georgia Dixon and there are many admirers who are touting him to go much higher in listiana than the Portland favorite. When Joe brings this high class boy to Klamath Falls he is giving his public an opportunity to see some big time fighting. For, against a clever boxer like Willie Feldman, McQuillan will have to extend himself and when that is done the fans will receive a treat.

Willie in Condition
For the first time in many months, Willie Feldman, Jewish fighter who gained and held the admiration of Klamath fans through numerous bouts last winter, is in fighting condition. For a while the idea that he might make the light heavy class, Willie has gotten down to business in his training and the over-weight waist line has disappeared. If he uses the skill at his command tomorrow night, McQuillan will know that he has been in a fight. Willie is punching harder and he has developed wind and muscle with the idea of going fifteen rounds so that he will be going strong for the regular ten rounds. In some of his recent bouts, Willie has shown a tendency to weaken after the ninth round. Slowing down then is dangerous and he is prepared to go the route with the hope of taking the decision, if unable to score a knockout.

McQuillan Due in Morning
McQuillan and his manager, Young Joe Wolcott, will arrive from Portland early Friday. Ray stayed at home to do his training and will be ready to enter the ring tomorrow night in the best of condition.

When one considers that McQuillan was one out of 57 fighters to knock out Herman Ratcliff, the Irish man, and to do it easily, it is not difficult to figure that he is no set up for any boy in the 160 pound class. With the skilled Feldman as an opponent, these boys will give the cash customers plenty of excitement.

A Show Stealer
There is more than a faint possibility that the semi windup may steal the show, for in Tony O'Dell, the fighting Irishman of the north, and Ted Kip Evans, the much improved Klamath Falls fighter, the fans will witness an honest-to-goodness grudge fight. This feud started two years ago in Eugene when both boys were boxing around the university town. Herb Owens matched them for a main event and Ted was taken ill the day of the match and to this day Tony feels Evans was afraid to meet him and ran out of the fight.

So the boys will meet and have it out tomorrow night and the way they have both trained and the great shape both are in it should be a whale of a scrap. Both boys have a lot of admirers and betting is brisk with O'Dell a slight favorite.

And now for the evening's outstanding event! The special attraction of three rounds—the popular clubman, Skinny McMillan and the fighting brick layer, Wally Stich. Both finished training for their bout yesterday and from reports around the gym this Stich, under the watchful eye of six managers, ten rainers and a host of advisers, will step in the roped arena a favorite to "take" Skinny. And Skinny is just as confident that he will stop the "brick layer" as Art Shires and says he will turn the trick in one round. Many fans will be at the ringside rooting for their favorites and this fight should be a wow.

**First Floodlight Game
Of Season to Start
At Corvallis**

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 18.—Williamette university, northwest champion, will meet Oregon State here Saturday in the first night intercollegiate football game of the season. The game will start at 8:15 o'clock.

Coach Paul J. Schissler with only five days of practice in which to prepare for Williamette is working his men double shift. The Orangemen are working out in the morning and also, under the recently installed lights at night. Indications are the night game is going to draw a record crowd for the season's opener.

Field Improved
Several improvements have been made in the field and the stands. The main one being the boarding up of the sides and back of the main grand stand to prevent the chill fall winds from interfering with the pleasure and comfort of the fans.

Much speculation is at hand regarding the possible first string lineup. Coach Schissler will run on the field against Williamette. Seventeen lettermen are on hand but nevertheless a couple of stalwarts from last year's freshman squad are almost sure to break into the starting lineup. These are Frank Little, fullback, and Wayne Harn, tackle. Both these boys have been on the first string since practice started Monday.

Williamette Bearcats who had little trouble winning the northwest championship last year have had a weeks start on the Orangemen and are reported as having another good team this year. A close, tough game is expected.

Sacs Within a Game of Third Position Seals

Sacramento was within a game of the San Francisco Seals for third place in the Pacific coast league, today, and if the Senators can continue their assault on Oakland while the Seals lose to Hollywood the leading three standings will be changed for the first time in quite a while.

The Senators won yesterday, 5 to 3 when they hammered six runs off Phebus, rockie hurler, in the first inning. They then had to protect the lead during the rest of the game. Oakland took eleven hits off Bryan, but failed to make them count.

San Francisco again lost to the Hollywood Stars, 5 to 4, and the league leaders led the series two to nothing today. Page lasted one inning for the Stars when Wetzel went on the job and held the Seals to one run in eight frames. The Stars got busy and slapped the offerings of Jimmy Zinn, making their hits count.

Los Angeles again beat the Missions, this time 4 to 3, with Baecht taking his 32nd victory of the season. He is now tied with Zinn in the matter of wins. Aside from pitching good ball, Baecht took two hits and drove in two runs.

Three Portland errors helped the Seattle Indians win, 5 to 1, over the Ducks. The Indians touched two Portland pitchers for a total of 12 hits.

Freberg Tumbles Zikovich in Two Straight Falls

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 18. (AP)—John Freberg, Minneapolis heavyweight wrestler, had little trouble defeating Martin Zikovich in straight falls in the main event here last night. Freberg took the first fall in 20 minutes 35 seconds with a body slam, and crashed the Russian for the second in 14 minutes with a combination crab and backward body slam.

Al Karasick and Bob Kruse went 45 minutes to a draw in a sensational and rough preliminary, neither scoring a fall. Although outweighted by over 20 pounds, Karasick not only held Kruse to a draw, but was on the aggressive most of the time. Kruse jumped out of the ring several times to save himself from punishment.

Andy High and His Trusty Bat Bring in Bacon for Cardinals

There isn't very much to Andy High as ball players go—only 5 1/2 feet of him—but today he can wear the biggest hero's garland St. Louis has to offer. Andy does not even rate as a regular on the Cardinals this season, yet he is the one who has given them two successive triumphs over their rival Brooklyn Robins as a clear hold on first place.

On Tuesday Andy went into the game as pinch hitter in the tenth inning and cracked out a double that led to the game's only run and a virtual tie with the Robins. Yesterday High hit a double in the ninth and brought a 5 to 3 triumph for the Cards and a full game margin. He hit with the score tied and two men on base.

Sylvester Johnson pitched a fine game for the Cards against Adolfo Luque. Al Grabowski, who got credit for the victory and Jim Lindsey, did well in relief roles, and Chief Hafey's home run in the fourth gave the Cards their first tie.

Hack Wilson clouted a pair of home runs on his first two times at bat against the Giants and sent the Cubs off to an easy triumph. The homers, both of Jim Chapin's delivery, gave Wilson a total of 52 for the season and produced a new major league record for hitting in runs as he brought his total to 176.

The former mark was 175 for a season, made by Lou Gehrig in 1927.

Reds Bump Braves
Cincinnati broke its losing streak by defeating the Boston Braves, 6 to 4, behind Red Lucas' pitching in the second game of a double header, after it had run to 13 straight through Boston's 6 to 3 triumph in the first clash, and Pittsburgh's Pirates slammed out 12 runs in two innings to defeat Philadelphia 13 to 5.

The formality of ending the American League pennant race was delayed for a day or two as the Philadelphia Athletics went down before Red Faber's six hit pitching and lost a 4 to 2 decision to the Chicago White Sox while Washington rallied after a bad first game and won the second from Cleveland, 6 to 4. The Indians hammered out a 13 to 7 victory in the first as Earl Averill tied the modern major league home run record. Averill hit three homers in successive times at bat. Barely Missada, fourth and grounded out, then cracked out another his first time up in the second game.

The St. Louis Browns outlasted a seven run rally by the New York Yankees to win out, 9 to 8, while the Detroit Tigers gained a 9 to 7 victory over the Boston Red Sox as each team cracked out 15 hits.
