

All Star Boxing Card Awaits Sound Of Gong

CROWDED HALL FORECAST FOR FIGHT CLASSIC

Main Event Has Rabid Fans All Agog; Ray McQuillan Arrives.

If Klamath Falls fight fans are interested in good bouts they will demonstrate their appreciation by lining up on hand at tonight's card at the American Legion arena. It is a foregone conclusion that the house will be packed, for there are few around this ballfield who do not appreciate the work of Ray McQuillan, starting fighter from Portland, and Willie Feldman, Klamath Falls favorite.

McQuillan arrived from Portland this morning in prime condition to deliver the fight of his life, if necessary. He has undergone a period of special training for this bout for he realizes the necessity of putting up his best against an adversary of Willie's ability.

Willie's Big Chance
The same may be said of Feldman, for in this fight he has an opportunity to reestablish himself with the fight followers and so much is at stake that he has taken every precaution to guard against a possible breakdown. Willie is too young a boy to go out of the game before meeting some of the big shots. But for the reason that he was worked too hard in the east when a boy in his teens he doubtless would be traveling with the big gate crowd today. He has met and defeated some of the cleverest boys in his weight but was not given rest enough between fights, or because of his boxing ability, was shoved in to fill a card for some other fighter and in so doing took an unnecessary amount of pounding. Since coming west he has been without a handler most of the time and only recently Jimmy Mann took the Jewish boy under his wing and has been making him work as a fighter should. To what extent Jimmy has brought his boy out of the kinks will be shown tonight. If Willie takes McQuillan he will be in the running for other good bouts. If he fails, well, the rest of it will be up to Willie. There is but one thing lacking in Willie's fighting and that is punch. He can stay in the ring with the boxer but the slinger is another proposition. If he has developed more punch he will make it hard going for McQuillan; that's about all there is to it.

Ray Has Good Record
McQuillan comes with a record of some 56 battles to his credit. Many of these are by the knockout route. His most notable recent victory was over the Iron man from Dakota, Herman Ratslaff, whom he disposed of in five rounds. Another fight to be remembered was his victory over Frankie Warneke at Chiloquin about a year ago. This colored boy is heading straight for a big reputation and it won't be long until he is battling the best boys in his weight.

Both Confident
Both boys are confident of winning. That means plenty of scrap for the cash customers. Willie's backers see in him an improved fighter—hot, just a boxer—and with his old-time confidence there is nothing in the way of a real fight.

There will be nothing lacking in flatness when the semi windup is opened. Ted Kid Evans and Tony O'Dell will carry a feud which has been brewing for two years into the ring with them and that means that two tough boys are going in for a killing, figuratively speaking.

Then, don't overlook that special three-round bout between Skinny McMillan and Wally Stich. The fans may think this is only a joke but you can't make Skinny and Wally think so. Unlike Evans and O'Dell, these two fellows are pals, but there is a matter of pride which must be defended and will they defend it? Just watch'em.

The first bout goes on at 8:30. Tom Loutitt, popular Portland referee, will be the third man in the ring.

WILSON FRIEND DIES AT HOME IN MINNESOTA

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 19. (AP)—John Lind, 74, personal diplomatic representative of President Woodrow Wilson to Mexico in 1913, and former governor and congressman from Minnesota, died at his home here last night after an extended illness.

Prominent in affairs of the Democratic party in Minnesota, Mr. Lind was selected by President Wilson to make an investigation of conditions in Mexico. Mr. Lind declined to discuss his mission or what it accomplished. He was the first Democrat to be elected governor of Minnesota, serving from 1899 to 1901. He served three terms in congress from the second Minnesota district, beginning in 1886. He was nominated and elected to congress on the Republican ticket. He was a member of that party in his early political career, but the free silver movement appealed strongly to him and he joined the Democrats in 1896, and in 1902 was elected from the fifth district as a Democrat.

A widow, two sons and a daughter survive.

CONNIE MACK AGAIN LEADS PENNANT RACE

Athletics Have But To Wait for Another World's Series

Once more Connie Mack, the tactician of Philadelphia, has led the Athletics to the point where they have nothing to do but look forward to a new world series in which to conquer—or to be conquered, and from current indications in the race for the National League flag, it appears that the St. Louis Cardinals will be their rivals in the struggle for the world's championship.

The Athletics made a formal settlement of the American League pennant race yesterday, clinching the title beyond the last shadow of doubt by downing the Chicago White Sox, 14 to 10, for their 39th victory of the season while Cleveland ended Washington's chances with a 3 to 2 triumph over the Senators. At the same time, the Cards were drawing farther ahead of their rivals in the senior circuit, defeating Brooklyn for the third straight time, 4 to 2, to gain a two lead game over the Robins.

Cards Appear Winners
A third stirring triumph in as many games, placed the Cardinals in a fairly safe position as they left to start a five game series in Philadelphia. Brooklyn and Chicago, their only remaining rivals of importance, have three more games in the lost column and little hope that the Phillies and Pittsburgh will upset the Cards. The New York Giants are out of the race for all practical purposes, being 5½ games behind despite yesterday's 6 to 2 triumph over Chicago.

Mack's Eighth Pennant
The principal figure again was Connie Mack, Philadelphia's 65-year-old leader, who reached his eighth championship and his seventh world series since he took charge of the Athletics. Before this season, Mack had led teams to league championships in 1902, 1905, 1910, 1911, 1913, 1914, and 1929. Four times the Athletics have won the world's title, in 1910, 1911, 1913, and 1929.

Mark Koenig, Detroit shortstop, made an appearance on the pitcher's mound against Boston, and although the Tigers lost 4 to 3, the blame could not be laid at his door. The Red Sox had completed their scoring against Bridges in the earlier innings.

Ruffing Good Batter
Charley Ruffing, New York Yankee hurler, proved more successful as a batter than on the mound. He did not get credit for the Yanks' 7 to 6 ten-inning victory over the St. Louis Browns although he contributed two home runs toward it. Chuck Klein, youthful slugger of the Phillies also hit two homers, but they were not enough to beat

Pittsburgh's Pirates, who slammed out five runs in the fourth inning for a 6 to 5 victory. The Boston Braves and Cincinnati were not scheduled.

JOHNSTON WILL FIGHT TO HOLD AMATEUR TITLE

Thinks Grand Slam By Jones Would Be Fine Thing, However

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 19. (AP)—Harrison R. Johnston is ready to battle to the last hole in defense of his United States amateur golf championship in the tournament at the Merion Cricket club next week. But he said he could not help but think it would be a glorious performance for Bobby Jones if Jones should put over the grand slam in golf by winning the amateur title.

The St. Paul star showed in his first practice round over the championship course yesterday he is prepared to give Jones and the other national and international stars in the field plenty of trouble. Playing in a foursome with Richard A. Jones, of New York, as his partner,

Johnston went out in 38 and returned in 33 for a card of 71, one over par.

Outstrokes Bobby

This was two strokes better than the incomparable Bobby has done in either of his two practice rounds. The Atlanta harrier, who is seeking his fourth major title this year, was not shooting so well yesterday, taking 40-38-78. On Wednesday he negotiated the course in 73.

Johnston believes a score of 142 will be a strong bid for medalist honors in the tournament and 156 probably will be the highest score to make the 32d place in the qualifying round.

Women Pitted Against Men In Bullfights

ALGIERS, Sept. 19. (AP)—A bullfight hold here a group of women bullfighters, for the first time, were pitted against a strong team of men "Toreadors" in a test of pluck and skill.

After the "Darsimen" have finished with the bull, a group of "Forcados" (pitchforkers) entered the arena, and while one seized the bleeding bull by the horns, the others held it fast by sheer weight. This is called a "paga" or catch. The secret of the "paga" lies in good team work, and the women Forcados so far out did the men in this contest that they were awarded the honors.

Bullfights recently have suffered an eclipse. All kinds of improvements and side-shows failed to stimulate interest in a game which the majority of the Portuguese condemn as cruel and unsportsmanlike. The appearance of women bullfighters drew crowds and have added a new lease on life to the national game of the peninsula.
