

McQUILLAN AND FELDMAN BOUT ENDS IN DRAW

Three Knockouts Serve To Enliven Evening At Legion Hall

Klamath fans are beginning to feel that the main event is something one pays for and doesn't get. This feeling was not lessened one whit by the performance of Willie Feldman and Ray McQuillan in their ten round bout last night. Instead of fighting like two fellows of their ability should, they struck and clinched throughout the entire engagement, Willie leading to the head and Ray counter punching and ducking like a football player carrying the ball through the line.

It looked like a case of two fighters saving themselves for future engagements. In the first place, Feldman failed to get down to the specified weight and it was only the part of good sportsmanship played by McQuillan that the bout was put on. That is much to the credit of the colored boy. And McQuillan didn't count out without some marks to show that he had been in a fight, for despite the slow going, Feldman showed much of his old time form and had the weights been a little more equal it undoubtedly would have been a better fight. Willie used his left and right to the head repeatedly and kept McQuillan on the guard most of the time. McQuillan scarcely made a lead throughout the ten rounds but he hooked Willie in the midriff sufficiently to win a draw. Neither man was in danger at any time and both were moving faster in the tenth round than in any of the earlier rounds.

O'Dell Kays Evans
What promised to be the show stealer was the semi-windup which was not while it lasted, but didn't go very far. Tony O'Dell put Ted Kid Evans out in just 56 seconds. When the going sounded both boys were off like a pair of demons, milling around the ring in a desperate effort to land a knockout punch. The opportunity came to Tony first and he planted one on the Kid's jaw which sent him to dreamland. Referee Tom Loutitt counted Evans out and it was several seconds before the taxi driver could be removed from the floor to his stool in the corner and then several seconds elapsed before he began to revive. His jaw was injured by the blow.

Wally Gets Nod
Skinsy McMillan made Wally Stich look like a ham in the first round of their three round bout, but in the second and third rounds the bricklayer began to throw gloves faster than Skinsky could catch them and the bout ended in Wally's favor. Skinsky didn't appear too badly disappointed over the decision—in fact, he looked relieved that the bout was over. The appearance of these two popular fans in the roped arena was an occasion for a lot of good natured kidding and in reality the special feature stole the show.

Eaton Hits Canvas
Gus Eaton has returned to town after barnstorming some of the arena in the northern part of the state and took part in a scheduled four round encounter with Tommy Ryan of Lakeview. This same Tommy Ryan has a strong resemblance to one Joe Blackwell, erstwhile resident of Eugene, Enterprise and Innisbush and from the way he slapped the colored boy around the head registers strong with the writer that it was Joe Blackwell. He that as it may, Tommy Ryan or Joe Blackwell unwound a haymaker that landed on the black boy's chin and he joined the company of lodgers that featured the card at the arena last night. It required one round and one minute and 10 seconds of the second round to accomplish the trick.

Webster Kays Lister
Another fight that ended in a knockout was a scheduled four minute rounds between Scott Lister of Klamath Falls and Louis Webster of Dorris. Both boys hit with all their might but Lister walked into one when about 53 seconds of the second round was over and he was rocked to sleep.

A curtain raiser was put on by Bill Slaymaker, Evening Herald newswriter, and one of the Jonas boys of Dorris. Slaymaker was making his first appearance in the ring and, as one of his newsboy friends remarked from the sideline, as a fighter he is a good newswriter.

Benny Dotson officiated all but the semi-final and main event.

HUSKIES REAL MYSTERY TEAM OF CONFERENCE

Eyes of Coast Fixed On Jimmy Phelan and Unknown Squad

SEATTLE, Sept. 20. (AP)—A really and truly mystery football team will represent the University of Washington in the Pacific Coast conference this fall with Jimmy Phelan, former Purdue university coach, at the head of Husky grid activities.

Washington is not considered a championship contender but football dopesters have some respect for the Huskies when figuring out the chances of the P. C. teams, despite the fact that the purple and gold eleven failed to win a single conference game last season.

Won Big Tea Title
Phelan won the big conference championship last year at Purdue after 10 years of effort and was signed by Washington to a three year contract at approximately \$12,000 per season.

Spring practice saw Phelan drill the left over Washington players in the famous Notre Dame shift system and upon the team's ability to adopt the new style of play rests the Huskies chance of success this season.

Washington's eleven will be built around Merle Hufford, sensational backfield ball carrier, who was rated with the best in the country last year. Former Coach Enoch Bagshaw declared Hufford the best backfield man he ever coached and he took into consideration the two all-American Huskies, George Wilson and Charles Carroll when he made the statement.

Hufford will hold down one half back post, without a doubt, but the other is open to the whole squad. The likely looking prospects for the vacant half back position are Bill Wilcott, Fred Borden and Clarence Bledsoe, returning non-lettermen.

Bill Marsh, veteran fullback, was drilled at the quarterback post in spring practice and is figured a strong candidate for the signal barking job. Other prospects are Jack Patrick, letterman; Dave Riser, sophomore and Art Oberg and Elmer Martin, non-lettermen.

August Buse, freshman fullback last season and captain of the yearling squad, looks like Marsh's successor for the bone crushing position.

Center Post Week
Washington's line should compare with the average on the coast. The center job is the only weak spot on the forward wall and it may be plugged up by a former tackle who showed well as the position in spring practice. Henry "Gob" Wentworth who stands 6 feet 2 inches and weighs 192 pounds was shifted to the ball snapping post by Phelan and added a lot more strength to the line. The scrap for the center job will likely be between Wentworth and Sam Kraetz, two year letterman.

For guards Phelan has some good talent in Lee Shelton and Bob Foster, one year lettermen; Bob Palmer and Charles Lappenbusch, non-lettermen.

Tackles Strongest
The strongest links in the Washington line will be at the tackles. Al Holmes, captain of the Husky eleven and Pacific Coast heavyweight boxing champion and Paul Schweigler, all coast star last season, make up a pair of mighty linemen. Holmes is 6 feet 7 inches tall and weighs 135 pounds and Schweigler is 6 feet 4 inches high and weighs

Night Football Slated to Open Corvallis Year

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 20 (AP)—Night football will be introduced to Oregon football enthusiasts tonight when the Oregon State Beavers and the Willamette University Bearcats clash in the first night game of the season.

Paul J. Schlatter, Oregon State coach, has announced the starting lineup will include one sophomore, Frank Little, a sensational fullback of last year's football team. Little will start at fullback on the varsity squad. The other 10 players will be lettermen. Schlatter expects, however, to run in nearly his entire squad before the end of the game.

Interest in the game exceeded today that of any previous opening game. This was attributed partly to the novelty of night football and partly to the fact that Willamette university was last year's northwest conference champion.

Dr. Spears said last night he had not completed his starting lineup.

Westervelt, who gained notoriety last year in the Washington-Oregon game when he dashed the sidelines while on his way to the dressing rooms and hauled down an Oregon man who was romping toward a Husky goal for a touchdown, is one of the leading candidates for a wing job.

Anything Could Happen
Pittsburgh's Pirates, who only lost their mathematical chance of finishing first as Cards won yesterday, start today in a two game series with the Robins and finish their season with four games in St. Louis. The Chicago Cubs, who gained a tie with Brooklyn for second place yesterday as they took a close decision from Boston, 5 to 4, find themselves involved with the Braves and Cincinnati for the rest of the season. A sudden spurt on the part of any one of these four trailers could cause serious damage to the hopes of its rivals.
