

BOBBY JONES IS OFF AGAIN WITH HIS PAR SCORE

Jones took the lead away from 19-year-old Sidney W. Noyes, Yale freshman, who carried a sensational 38-32-79, even par.

The triple champion was in fine form and experienced trouble only on four holes. Twice he was in traps and twice in the rough but recovered sensationally. He was over par on only one hole. The 273-yard 11th, where he drove deep and rough and he failed to find the green with his second. He offset this with birdies on the 10th and 12th, sinking putts of 24 and 12 feet respectively.

On five other greens Jones tipped the cup with long putts, otherwise he would have administered a fine beating to old man par.

The great Georgian played easily and had all his shots well under control, satisfied he did not need to take any chances. He was exactly even with par on every one of the first nine holes, missing several birdies by inches.

Jones out, 543, 544, 443-36. Eddie Hogan of Portland, Ore., setting the pace for the strong contingent from that city, broke away with a 37.

Hogan out 453, 545, 533-37.

MERION CRICKET CLUB, ARDMORE, Pa., Sept. 22, (AP)—Published reports that he intended to retire from competitive golf after this tournament and sign a \$100,000 motion picture contract were flatly denied today by Bobby Jones shortly before he teed off in the first qualifying round of the National Amateur Golf championship.

"You can say their is nothing to it," declared Jones, after expressing surprise that such a story had been published. He declined, however, to say whether he had been approached on the subject of appearing in motion pictures. Then he added with a smile: "Maybe they want me to replace Lon Chaney."

It has been understood motion picture interests have been seeking Jones for some time. Super-slow pictures already have been taken of him in connection with an educational series designed to show his style of play in detail, together with the methods of Harry Vardon and Joyce Wethersed.

Odds on St. Louis To Win the Big Go

Brooklyn Robins Dropped Fifth Game—New York Giants Showing Poorly—As End Is Near.

Odds in favor of St. Louis capturing the flag are lengthening. The Cards were idle yesterday.

Brooklyn's Robins dropped their fifth straight game. The New York Giants lost everything but a mathematical chance of tying the league leaders, as they divided a double header with Cincinnati. Chicago regained half a game and took a clear hold on second place by beating the Boston Braves, 4 to 2.

A home run by Gabby Hartnett with Cliff Heathcote on base was required to win for Chicago, as Pate Malone and Ben Cantwell pitched an even battle. The victory left the Cubs 2½ games behind the league leaders with the others trailing at one-game intervals in this fashion:

Pittsburgh required two innings to ruin Brooklyn's hopes with a 7 to 6 victory. Trailing 2-0 after the first two innings, the Pirates assaulted Watson Clark for four runs in the third and drove him from the mound with three more in the fourth.

The Giants pulled out a neat 6 to 4 triumph over Cincinnati in the first half of their double bill, but had one bad inning in the second, and lost 6 to 5.

The American league turned itself into something like a testing ground for new material. Five youngsters, including three infielders, helped the St. Louis Browns win an 8 to 4 decision from the champion Athletics. They failed to keep up the pace in the second game, as the A's eluded Sammy Gray and his two successors for 17 hits, to gain a 10 to 4 triumph. Goose Goslin did his bit for the Browns with a homer in each game.

The New York Yankees tossed 21 players into the fray against Chicago's young White Sox, to slam out a 15 to 7 triumph.

The last-place Boston Red Sox slammed out five home runs in the tenth to defeat Cleveland, 9 to 4.

CHICAGO, Sept. 22, (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. Cub baseball fan today divided their attention between the club's very faint chance of overtaking the St. Louis Cardinals, and reports that Joe McCarthy will be done as manager of the Bruins at the close of the season.

In a copyrighted story today the Herald and Examiner declared that "win, lost or draw," McCarthy, whose contract will expire January 1, and owner William Wrigley, Jr., and President William L. Veeck, have agreed to disagree. The story also said that Wrigley and Veeck favored Rogers Hornsby, incapacitated second baseman, as McCarthy's successor.

Both Wrigley and Veeck, however, stuck by the story they have told every time they have been approached on the subject. Each said he had no comment to make, other than that the contract question had not been discussed with McCarthy and would not "until the season is over."

Hornsby, who cost owner Wrigley \$120,000 and five players in a deal with Boston two years ago, was a huge factor in the Cubs' 1929 national championship success, but this year was of little use. He reported with an ailing right heel, and on Memorial Day suffered a fracture of his left ankle which kept him off the field until last month. More recently a "Charley Horse" has kept him from playing regularly.
